Regiments of Foot, which will be brought down

the Danube and fent for Hungary.

Municke, July 4. The Troops of the Elector of Bavaria are marching from Jechfels towards Donaweert, from whence a detachement of 6000 men will be sent for Hungary; and the rest will joyn with the Troops of the Circle of Franconia; But the Train of Artillery continues as yet here. From Linux and Vienna we have advice of the suesessfull Progress of the Imperial Army in Hungary, which we may believe to be now before Buda.

Rasibonne, July 12. The Bilhop of Aichflads and the Count de Winditzgrass, the Imperial Commissioners, have acquainted the Dyet that the Emperor, to procure the General Peace and Tranquality of the Empire, is willing to accept the Truce upon the Conditions proposed by France for 10 years or longer, provided all his Allies be included

in it.

Cologne, July 14. The Troops of our Elector which were in Rhinberg, except two or three Companies, marched from thence on Monday last to the Camp at Zons. The 12th Instant the Troops of Munifer were to pass the Rhin at Wesel, the Regency of Cleve having granted them passage through that Country & When these and the other Troops appointed to Rendezvous at Zons shall be together. which will be in few days, they will, as we are affured, make a Body of 18000 men; and the common report is, that they will march towards Liege; His Electoral Highness being, it's faid, very much distatished with that City for that they refuse to ratific and execute what was some time since agreed and concluded by their Deputies. They write from Francfort of the 12th Instant, that the Troops of the Circle of Franconia were encamped between Wertheim and Miltenbourg, commanded by the Prince of Bareith.

Hamburg, July 14. Our Letters from Berlin inform us, that the Elector of Brandenburg hath fent 3000 men to the affifiance of the Poles, commanded by the Count de Denboff. The Island of Heylige Landt hath submitted to the King of Den-

marke.

Brussels, July 18. Monsieur de Chanley, who returned hither on Sunday, had yesterday a very long Conference with the Marquis de Grana, and we are told that they have setled the matter of the Contributions, and have agreed, after having defalked what we pretend of the Subjects of France, that these Countries shall pay 600000 Crowns, and that they shall have ten years given them to pay the same at several Terms, in consideration whereof they shall be freed from all pretentions of Contributions which the French may have upon them; and which it's faid amount to almost four To morrow Monsieur Chanlay will part again from hence, having been very Nobly Entertained here by the Marquis de Grana. The French Army decamped on Sunday last, as we have already told you from Liffines, and separated into three Bodies, one of which is marched towards Dinant, and Monfieur de Bretuil, Intendant-General of the French Conquells, hath orders to follow them, Our last Letters from Lintz are of the 9th Instant, and tell us that they were expecting an account from the Duke of Lorrain, that he was let down before Buda; and that all their advices say there is a great fear and Consternation among the Turks.

Hague, July 18. The French Ambassador has acquainted the States General that he has received the King his Master's Ratification of the Treaty Signed here on the 29th past, and that he is ready to exchange it with that of this State. The Sieur Campricht, the Imperial Minister, declared, as we

are told, to the Deputies of this State in a late Conference he had with them, that the Emperor had resolved to accept the Truce proposed by France upon condition it be General. Two days agone arrived here the Prince of Orange's Regiment of Foot-Guards from Brabans, and all the Troops of this State that were in Flanders, are returned to their respective Garisons.

Paris, July 22. Our last Letters from Catalonia ave an account, that the French Army commanded by the Mareschal de Belfonds, was encamped the 6th Instant at Castillon not far from Roses, and that the Ships and Gallies under the command of Monsieur du Luesne, continued in the Bay of Roses. the Duke de Bournonville Vice-Roy of Catalonia, who was encamped with the Spanish Troops near Gironne had upon the Marcichal de Belfond's approaching to Roses, advanced to Selva, and had retrenched himself at the foot of the Mountain behind the River Ter. Here has been a report for several days of another defeat of the Turks by the King of Poland, but it needs a confirmation. Letters from Germany tell us the Emperor hath accepted the Truce.
