Marseilles, Fuly 14. have advice, that the Chevalier de Tourville arrived there the third Instant with four French Men of War, four Galliots, and three Armed Barks, under his command, and that having taken in Water, he would go and Cruise off of

The Militia of Provence is in Arms to secure the Coasts against any attempt of the Spanish and Genouese Gallies, which are abroad.

Venice, July 15. On Saturday last the Count de la Torre, the Imperial Ambassador, had an Audience of the Colledge to give them an account of the Victory which the Duke of Lorrain obtained upon the Turks the 27th of the last Month near Vaccia, and of his having taken that place on difcretion; and the next day Te Deum was fung in the Church of St. Mark. The Count de Porto railes Church of St. Mark. a Regiment of Cuirassiers to serve in Dalmatia, and will in a short time have it complear. have Letters from Constantinople which teil us, that the approach of the Venetian Fleet filled that City with fear and consternation, the Turks not being in a pollure to oppose their defigns. From Corfu we have advice that General Morofini ha ving taken on board several Troops in Dalmatia, was failed for the Levant to Joyn the Sidur Molino; So that we may now expect to hear in a short time of their having undertaken some great Enterprize. The Senate have hired two great Ships, which will make very stout Men of War; and a great many Veffels are lading with Ammunition and Provisions for the supply of the Fleet.

Vienna, July 17. By an Express that passed through this place, we have an account that the Imperial Army had repailed the Danube and was advanced to Buda, the Turks that were posted near that place, having upon the approach of the Chri-Itians abandoned their Quarters, and retiring in The Count de Vecchi will part great confusion. from hence in few days with the rest of the Gallies and Brigantins; and the Count de Thaun has received orders to march immediately with his Regiment, which is now in Garison here, to joyn the Imperial Army; And it's reported that General Leslie is marching towards the Duke of Lorrain with the Troops under his command. The Prince de Cooy, General of the Artillery, arrived here the 15th Inflant, and will part again to morrow to continue his journey for Hungary. Count Teckeley begins to be abandoned even by those he had greatest confidence in; and what adds to his trouble, is, that he cannot obtain any assistance from the

Lintz, July 19. Yesterday arrived here an Express from Hungary, who brought an account that the Imperial Army had passed the Danube near Vaccia. and having forced the Turks from the fe-teral Camps they had on this fide Buda, they advanced to that City, and belieged it, being when this Express came away, Masters of the Lower Town, and lodged in the Ditch of the Upper Town, against which they had raised several Batteries; It is added that 600 Dalmatians, who were in the Turkish Army, had deserted them, and taken Service among the Christians. And from Hun-

gary they write that the Baron de Saponara had Y a Veilel arrived from Leghorne we, surprized the strong Castle of Monate, having intelligence with the Officer that commanded there, And that he had taken Prisoner the Princess Ragoszt, Wife to Count Teckeley, with their Children and their whole Treasure, which is valued at 13 Millions; It is likewise reported that the Imperialists have defeated Count Teckeley's Troops that belieg ed the Castle of Ungwar, but both these advices will need a Confirmation. The Elector of Bavaria is expected here very suddenly, and we are assured that his Electoral Highness will send part of his Troops for Hungary.

Hamburgh, July 21. The King of Denmark hath withdrawn his froops out of the Dutchies of Mecklenbourg and Saxe Lawenbourg, having received fat slaction concerning the Quarters which were formerly assigned his Majesty upon those Countries

Brussels, Fuly 28. On Wednesday last Monsieur de Breteuil, Intendant of the French Army, came hither, and being conducted to Court, was very kindly received by the Marquis de Grana, and yesterday his Excellency entertained him at Dinner, and this morning he parted again from hence; He came not, as is said, upon any publick business, but took the opportunity of this Cessation to make his Excellency a visit. The Mareschal de Schorsberg is encamped with part of the Army that was at Lessies, at Chastelet near Charleroy; Monsieur de la Trousse is with the Troops under his command on the fide of Nivelle; and Monsieur de Boufflers near Chievre in the Province of Haynault. The Spanish Troops in the mean time continue in the Neighborhood of this City, though they suffer very much for want of Forage: A reform of 40 Troops of Horle is much spoken of, but not yet put in execution. They write from Liege that part of Monficur de Crequi's Army is come into the Province of Limburg to take there Quarters of refreshment, and that they have with them Horses for a Train of Artillery though they have no Train, but many Wagons with Ammunition and Fireworks; and it s believed these T oops will joyn with those of t'e Elector of Cologne, which encrease daily : On the 25th Instant, being St. Fames's day, the Burghers of Liege choic their new Burghermasters, the Election having been carried on very peaceably, and pursuant to the orders of their Prince. Letters from Lintz confirm the account we gate you in our last of the Duke of Lorrain's being advanced to Bude after having forced the Turks from their feveral Camps; and we hope our next Letters

will tell us that Buda is taken.

Hague, July 28. The States General being informed that fix Dutch Merchant Ships, which were bound for Thoulon, have been taken by the Spamards and carried into Cadiz, they have fent or ders to their Ambassador at Madrid to make Complaint thereof, and to demand reparation, seeing the fuld Ships were laden with Goods and Merchandizes, which according to the Treaty of Commerce concluded between the Crown of Spain and this State in the year 1650, bught to pass free and unmolested: And have likewise directed their Deputies for Maritime affairs to make a like representation to the Marquis de Castel Moncayo, the Spanish Munister here.

Prince of Ordnge contines at Dieren, but hath sent hither Monsieur Benting, who will return to Dieren in a day or two. It has, we are told, been proposed in the States General, to send an extraordinary Embassy to France to sollicit the restitution of the Principality of Orange, &c. The Baron de Grotz, Envoy from the Circle of Franconia, hath hall he Audience of Leave of the States, and will part from hence in sew days. The States of Holzand are adjourned till the middle of the next Month. The Count de Solms. Colonel of the Regiment of Foot-Guarde, is gone to his Government of Nimeguen.

Paris, July 29. The Army commanded by the Marcschal de Schomberg, has quitted Leffines; Most of the Foot have been fent to their respective Gatisons, and the Horse are divided into three Bodies, with one whereof Monsieur de Schomberg is encamped between Charleroy and Dinant. The King, it's said has made choice of Monsieur Tambonneau, who is at present his Minister at Cologne, to go his Ambassador to the Swifs Cantons, and he is actordingly expected here to prepare for his Embaffy. The French Army in Catalonia, we are told fuffers very much by the excellive heats; Mousieur du Quesne is recovered of his late illnes; and Monsieur de Tourville has, it's said orders to Joyn the Fleet, which is still in the Bay of Roses, with the Squadron under his command. The Gallies of Spain and Genoua are at Sea, some Men of War having joyned them; and we are told that the Republick of Genous hath borrowed a great fum of Mon y to be employed in the new Levies they have resolved to make; and that the Genoueses have taken several French Merchant Ships. The Algierine Envoy parted from hence on Tuesday last in order to his return home. Our Letters last in order to his return home. Our Letters from Germany tell us that the Duke of Lorrain besieged Bada, and had begun to batter the place And that Count with 30 Pieces of Cannon. Teckeley's Lieutenant · General had deserted him with 5 or 600 Hungarians, and had joyned the Imperial Army.
