

Forces. From *Masbricht* they write, that part of the Lid Elector's Army is coming that way from *Zons*, being divided into three or four Bodies; and that a great quantity of Bread is baking for them at *Stickem* and *Mafeycke*: The Marquis de *Castell de Moncayo* arrived here yesterday from the *Hague*, and has had several private Conferences with the Marquis de *Grana*. The Spanish Troops that were encamped in the Neighborhood of this City are separated, and march'd to their several Garisons in *Flanders*, *Haynault*, and this Province. The *Sieur Haist* the Dutch Minister here, has obtained leave from the States General to return home, and is accordingly preparing for his departure. Our Letters from *Lintz* tell us, that the Emperor had received an account from the Duke of *Lorraine*, that he had taken both the lower and upper Town of *Buda*, but whether by assault or composition is not said, and that 5000 Janissaries were retired into the Castle, of which his Highness hoped to be Master within 48 hours: but what was said of the surprizing the Castle of *Mongatz* in *Upper-Hungary* is not confirm'd.

Hague, August 1. The States of *Holland* are adjourn'd till the middle of *September*; It's said they came to a resolution before they separated, concerning the disbanding the Recruits that were rais'd two or three years ago. The Marquis de *Castel Moncayo* having on the 29th past, received Letters by an Express from the Marquis de *Grana*, he parted from hence the same day in great haste for *Brussels*. The Secretary of *Monfieur Staremberg*, Ambassador from this State at *Paris*, arriv'd here on Sunday night, with Letters to the States General. The *Sieur Dieft* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, had yesterday a long Conference with the *Lunenburg* Minister.

Paris, August 2. They write from *Catalonia* that *Monfieur du Quejne*, who was then with the French Fleet under his command in the Bay of *Roses*, having heard a great deal of shooting at Sea, was preparing to sail, to see what was the occasion of it; It is conjectur'd there may have been some rencounter between the Squadron command'd by *Monfieur de Tourville* and the Gallies of *Spain*, but we must expect more certain advice. On Friday last arriv'd a Courier from *Germany*, who brought an account that the Duke of *Lorraine* had again defeated a Body of 30 or 35000 Turks, who came to the relief of *Buda*; It's said this Action hapned after that the Imperialists were Masters of the Lower Town; we shall be glad to have it confirm'd.

Plimouth, July 22. His Majesties Ships the *Diamond* and the *Tiger* sail'd from hence the 20 Instant, the first having on board *Sir Richard Dutton* who is returning to his Government of the *Barbadoes*.

Welch Poole, July 21. His Grace the Duke of *Beaufort* arriv'd here from *Ludlow* on Saturday last, having been met in his way by the most considerable Gentlemen of this hither part of *Shropshire*, who conducted him through *Bishops Castle*, where a very handsome Banquet of Sweetmeats was prepared for his Grace by that Corporation, and presented him by the Loyal Bayliff; and the Gentlemen of that County having brought him to their Confinement, his Grace was met soon after by those of this County, and at a convenient place in the Road, our County Troop was drawn up, the Officers being in a very noble Equipage, and advancing farther this way, his Grace found the Foot likewise drawn up with all their Officers at the head of them. His Grace lay that night at *Powis Castle*, from whence on Sunday he came accompanied by a great number of Gentlemen, besides his own Attendants to our

Church; the Foot making a Guard for him through the Town; his Grace and all the Gentry of that County were very nobly entertained at *Powis Castle*, though neither the Earl of *Powis* nor the Countess were there.

Chirke Castle, July 22. Last night his Grace the Duke of *Beaufort* came hither from *Powis Castle* having been conducted to the Confinement of our County by the County Troop of *Montgomeryshire*, and soon after his Grace was received by our County Troop and a great number of our Gentry and conducted to this place, where there was a splendid Entertainment; this day being accompanied by the Gentry, and attended by our County Troop, his Grace went to *Langollen*, where the Militia Foot were drawn up, and after his Grace had view'd both the Horse and Foot, he went to *Sir John Wynne's House* where he was met by the Lord Bishop of *St. Asaph* and a great number of Gentry of this and the Adjacent Counties, who were all very nobly entertained there.
