The Ladies to wear black silk or velvet, coloured ribbons, fans and tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuffs, with black ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuff waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured swords and huckles.

And on Wednesday the 21st day of June next, the Ccurt to go out of mourning.

SIR, Elsinore, May 10, 1837.

I have the honour of reporting to you, for the information of Viscount Palmerston, that, according to a notice given by the General Board of Customs and Trade at Copenhagen, the coal-fire of Hammer
