NOTICE is hereby given, that all carriages coming to Her Majesty's Drawing-Room at St. James's-Palace, on Thursday the 15th of June, are to fall into the line at the top of St. James's-street, come down the left-hand side of the street, round the corner of Pall-mall, and enter at the iron gate nearest to the Palace, set down at the Arcade, return by the iron gate nearest to Marlborough-house, and pass through Pall-mall into St. James's-square. In taking up, they are to come down St. James's-street in like manner, pass through the same gates, and go away through Pall-mall.

No hackney coaches will be permitted to come

within the iron gates, they must set down at the outside thereof, and go away through Pall-mall.

The gate at the top of Constitution-hill will be open only for the carriages of persons having the privilege of the *entrée*, which are to proceed down the Park, and enter the Palace at Stable-yard-gate, turn into the Ambassadors'-court, set down at the Arcade, and go out into Cleveland-row. The carriages of the Cabinet Ministers and Great Officers of State may afterwards wait in the King's-court, those of the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers in the Ambassadors'-court, and those of all other persons having the *entrée* may wait in Stable-yard or St. James's-park till called for; they are then to take up in the same order as they had set down, pass away into Cleveland-row, and up the left-hand side of St. James's-street.

No carriage will be admitted with company a second time with the same ticket, to prevent which, it must be produced at Constitution-hill-gate, and at Stable-yard-gate also, where a corner of it will be torn off by the Marshalmen in attendance; and no person can be allowed the privilege of the *entrée* by any other approach to the Palace than the gates above mentioned.

Tickets for carriages belonging to persons having the *entrée* will be delivered at the Board of Green Cloth, St. James's-Palace, on Tuesday next, between the hours of eleven and three o'clock.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage," reciting, amongst other things, that His Majesty was pleased, on the fourth day of February, and on the sixth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, to issue two several commissions to certain persons therein respectively named, directing them to consider the state of the several dioceses in England and Wales, with reference to the amount of their revenues, and the more equal distribution of episcopal duties, and the prevention of the necessity of attaching, by commendam, to bishoprics, benefices with cure of souls; and to consider also the state of the several cathedral and collegiate churches in England and Wales, with a view to the suggestion of such measures as might render them conducive to the efficiency of the Established Church, and to devise the best mode of providing for the cure of souls, with special reference to the residence of the clergy on their respective benefices; and reciting, that the said Commissioners had, in pursuance of such directions, made four several reports to His Majesty, bearing date respectively the seventeenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and the fourth day of March, the twentieth day of May, and the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six; and reciting, that the said Commissioners had in their said reports, amongst other things, recommended that commissioners should be appointed by Parliament for the purpose of preparing and laying before His Majesty in Council such schemes as should appear to them to be best adapted for carrying into effect, amongst other things, the following recommendations; and that His Majesty in Council should be empowered to make Orders ratifying such schemes, and having the full force of law; and that the diocese of Ely should be increased by the counties of Huntingdon and Bedford, then in the diocese of Lincoln, by the deanries of Lynn and Fincham, in the county of Norfolk and diocese of Norwich, and by the archdeaconry of Sudbury, in the county of Suffolk and diocese of Norwich, with the exception of the deanries of Sudbury, Stow, and Hartismere, and by that part of the county of Cambridge which was then in the diocese of Norwich; and that the diocese of Norwich should consist of the counties of Norfolk and Suffolk, except those parts which it was proposed to transfer to the diocese of Ely; and that all parishes which are locally situate in one diocese, but under the jurisdiction of the bishop of another diocese, should be made subject to the jurisdiction of the bishop of the diocese within which they are locally situate; and that such

variations should be made in the proposed boundaries of the different dioceses as might appear advisable, after more precise information respecting the circumstances of particular parishes or districts; and that in order to provide for the augmentation of the incomes of the smaller bishopricks, such fixed annual sums be paid to the Commissioners out of the revenues of the larger sees respectively as should, upon due inquiry and consideration, be determined on, so as to leave, as an average annual income, to the Archbishop of Canterbury fifteen thousand pounds, to the Archbishop of York ten thousand pounds, to the Bishop of London ten thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Durham eight thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Winchester seven thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Ely five thousand five hundred pounds, to the Bishop of Saint Asaph and Bangor five thousand two hundred pounds, and to the Bishops of Worcester, and Bath and Wells respectively five thousand pounds; and that the bishops who should, on the then existing vacancies, succeed to the sees of Durham and Ely, should be relieved from the excess beyond their due proportion payable for first fruits, and that the residue of the sums due should be paid by the Commissioners out of the surplus funds arising from those sees; and that none of the proposed alterations affecting the boundaries or jurisdiction of any diocese, or the patronage of benefices with cure of souls, or the revenues belonging to any see, the bishop of which was in possession on the fourth day of March one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, should take effect until the next avoidance of the see, without the consent of such bishop; and that the limits of the other existing deanries and archdeaconries should be newly arranged, so that every parish and extra parochial place be within a rural deanry, and every deanry within an archdeaconry, and that no archdeaconry extend beyond the limits of one diocese; and that all the archdeaconries of England and Wales should be in the gift of the bishops of the respective dioceses in which they are situate:

It is enacted, amongst other things that the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being, the Lord Archbishop of York, and the Lord Bishop of London for the time being, John Lord Bishop of Lincoln, James Henry Lord Bishop of Gloucester, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord High Treasurer or the First Lord of the Treasury, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer for the time being, respectively, and such one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as shall be for that purpose nominated by His Majesty, under His royal sign manual (such Lord Chancellor, Lord President, Lord High Treasurer or First Lord of the Treasury, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Secretary of State being respectively members of the United Church of Great Britain and Ireland), the Right Honourable Dudley Earl of Harrowby, the Right Honourable Henry Hobhouse, and the Right Honourable Sir Herbert Jenner, Knt. should, for the purposes of the said Act, be one body politic and corporate, by the name of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and by that name should have perpetual succession and a common seal:

And it is further enacted, that the said Commis-

sioners should, from time to time, prepare and lay before His Majesty in Council such schemes as should appear to the said Commissioners to be best adapted for carrying into effect the thereinbefore recited recommendations, and should in such schemes recommend and propose such measures as might upon further inquiry, which the said Commissioners are thereby authorised to make, appear to them to be necessary for carrying such recommendations into full and perfect effect; provided always, that nothing therein contained should be construed to prevent the said Commissioners from proposing in any such scheme such modifications or variations, as to matters of detail and regulation, as should not be substantially repugnant to any or either of the said recommendations; and, in particular, that it should be competent to the said Commissioners to propose in any such scheme that all parishes, churches, or chapelries which are locally situate in any diocese, but subject to any peculiar jurisdiction other than the jurisdiction of the bishop of the diocese in which the same are locally situate, shall be only subject to the jurisdiction of the bishop of the diocese within which such parishes, churches, or chapelries are locally situate:

And it is further enacted, that when any scheme, prepared under the authority of the said Act, should be approved by His Majesty in Council, it should be lawful for His Majesty in Council to issue an Order or Orders ratifying the same, and specifying the time or times when such scheme, or the several parts thereof, should take effect, and to direct in every such Order that the same should be registered by the registrar of each of the dioceses, the bishops whereof might or should be in any respect affected thereby:

And it is further enacted, that every such Order, as soon as might be after the making and issuing thereof by His Majesty in Council, be inserted and published in the London Gazette:

And it is further enacted, that, so soon as any such Order in Council should be so registered and gazetted, it should in all respects, and as to all things therein contained, have and be of the same force and effect as if all and every part thereof were included in the said Act, any law, statute, canon, letters patent, grant, usage, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding:

And whereas the said Commissioners, pursuant to the authority vested in them by the said Act, have duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of April one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, and which is in the words and figures following, that is to say:

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, appointed and incorporated by an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage,"

have, in pursuance thereof, prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for carrying into effect part of the recommendations in the said Act contained, relating to the bishoprics of Lincoln, Norwich, and Ely.

We humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Lincoln, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that the whole archdeaconry and county of Bedford, and so much of the archdeaconry of Huntingdon as is included in, and co-extensive with, the county of Huntingdon, now forming part of the diocese of Lincoln, shall be detached and dissevered from the said diocese, and shall be and become permanently annexed and united to, and included in, and form part of, the diocese of Ely; and that the said archdeaconry of Bedford, and such part as aforesaid of the said archdeaconry of Huntingdon, and all parishes and places, churches and chapels, within the limits thereof, respectively, and the present and every future Archdeacon of Bedford, and the present and every future Archdeacon of Huntingdon, as to such part as aforesaid of his said archdeaconry; and all rural deans, and the whole clergy and others your Majesty's subjects within the said archdeaconry of Bedford, and within such parts as aforesaid of the said archdeaconry of Huntingdon, shall be exempted and released from all jurisdiction, authority, and controul of the present and every future bishop of Lincoln, and shall be under and subject to the jurisdiction, authority, and controul of the Right Reverend Joseph, now Bishop of Ely, and of his successors, bishops of Ely, for ever.

And we further recommend and propose, that the parish of Rickingham Inferior, in the deanry of Blackburne, but united with the parish of Rickingham Superior, in the deanry of Hartismere, both in the archdeaconry of Sudbury, and in the diocese of Norwich, the see whereof is now vacant, shall be detached from the said deanry of Blackburne, and included in the said deanry of Hartismere; and that the said last mentioned deanry, and the deanry of Stow, also in the said archdeaconry of Sudbury, shall be detached and dissevered from the said deanry of Sudbury, and shall be included in, and form part of, the archdeaconry of Suffolk, in the same diocese; and that the rural deans of the said two last mentioned deanries, and the whole clergy thereof, and of the said parish of Rickingham Inferior, shall be exempted and released from the jurisdiction of the present and every future archdeacon of Sudbury, and be under and subject to the jurisdiction of the archdeacon of Suffolk for the time being; and that the archdeaconry of Sudbury, with the exceptions aforesaid, shall be detached and dissevered from the said diocese of Norwich, and shall be and become permanently annexed and united to, and included in, and form part of, the said diocese of Ely; and that the said archdeaconry of Sudbury, with the exceptions aforesaid, and all parishes and places, churches and chapels, within the limits thereof, and the present and every future Archdeacon of Sudbury, and all rural deans, and the whole clergy, and others your Majesty's subjects within the same archdeaconry, shall be exempted and released from all jurisdiction,

authority, and controul of the said see of Norwich, and every bishop thereof, and shall be under and subject to the jurisdiction, authority, and controul of the said Joseph, now Bishop of Ely, and of his successors, bishops of Ely, for ever.

And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall in any manner affect any personal union heretofore granted by any bishop of Norwich, according to the usage of the see of Norwich, for enabling any spiritual person to hold together two livings, as it regards any livings, either both or one only of which will, according to this scheme, be transferred to the said diocese of Ely.

And we further recommend and propose, that, the deanry of Camps, in the said diocese of Ely, and in the archdeaconry of Ely, shall be detached and dissevered from the said archdeaconry of Ely, and shall be included in, and form part of, the said archdeaconry of Sudbury; and that the rural dean, and the whole clergy of the said deanry, shall be exempted and released from the jurisdiction of the present and every future Archdeacon of Ely, and be under and subject to the jurisdiction of the archdeacon of Sudbury for the time being.

And we further recommend and propose, that the right of appointing the archdeacons of Bedford, Huntingdon, and Sudbury shall be vested in the said Bishop of Ely, and his successors, bishops of Ely, for ever.

And we further recommend and propose, that, for the purposes of the said Act, and so as to leave to the Bishop of Ely, for the time being, an average annual income of five thousand five hundred pounds, the said Joseph, now Bishop of Ely, and his successors, bishops of Ely, for the time being, shall pay, or cause to be paid, to our credit, into the Bank of England to an account, intituled "Account with the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," by half yearly payments, on or before the fifth day of April, and the fifth day of October, in every year, the fixed annual sum of two thousand five hundred pounds; and that the first of such payments shall become due on the fifth day of October now next ensuing, and that whenever a vacancy of the see of Ely shall happen on any other day than the fifth day of April, or fifth day of October, the then next half yearly payment shall be apportioned between the bishop making the vacancy, or his representatives, and the bishop succeeding to the see, according to the time that shall have elapsed from the fifth day of April or fifth day of October preceding (as the case may be), to the day of the vacancy, inclusive, and such proportions shall be paid by the respective parties accordingly.

And we further recommend and propose, that two third parts only of the sum heretofore paid by bishops of Ely respectively, on account of first fruits, shall be paid by the said Joseph Bishop of Ely, and that the remaining one third part thereof shall be paid by us, out of the moneys so to be paid, to our credit and account as aforesaid.

And we further recommend and propose, that the fees and stipends granted out of the revenues of the said see of Ely, by the last or any preceding Bishop of Ely, to any secular officer of the isle of

Ely, who held his office by patent for life at the time of the passing of an Act of the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for extinguishing the secular jurisdiction of the Archbishop of York" and the Bishop of Ely, in certain liberties in the counties of York, Nottingham, and Cambridge," shall henceforward during the life of such officer, whether his said office shall have been abolished by the said Act or not, be paid by us out of that portion of the revenues of the said see of Ely which shall be so as aforesaid paid to our credit and account.

And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing other measures relating to the said bishopricks of Lincoln, Norwich, and Ely respectively, in conformity to the provisions of the said first recited Act.

All which we humbly recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council.

In witness whereof we have hereunto set our common seal, this twelfth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council; now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall take effect immediately from and after the time when the same shall have been registered as hereinafter directed; and shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the several registrars of the several dioceses of Lincoln, Norwich, and Ely.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for raising the sum of eleven millions, by Exchequer Bills, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven.

An Act to indemnify such persons in the United Kingdom as have omitted to qualify themselves for offices and employments, and for extending the time

limited for those purposes respectively until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight; and for the relief of clerks to attorneys and solicitors in certain cases.

An Act to amend the Acts for regulating the General Penitentiary at Millbank.

An Act to discharge His Majesty's manor and demesne lands at Newark, in the county of Nottingham, from any costs of rebuilding or repairing Trent and Markham bridges, and to charge the same on the other hereditary revenues of the Crown.

An Act to explain and amend two Acts relating to trial by jury in Scotland.

An Act to continue, for a limited term of years, the Acts relating to the police of the city of Glasgow, to vest the management of the statute labour conversion money of the said city in the Board of Police thereof, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to continue, for a limited term of years, the police Act for the barony of Gorbals, in the county of Lanark; and for other purposes relating thereto.

An Act to enlarge the powers of an Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for making a railway from London to Greenwich."

An Act for constructing a harbour, dock or docks, piers, and other works at Trinity, in the parish of North Leith and county of Edinburgh.

An Act for better supplying with water the town and borough of Swansea, in the county of Glamorgan.

An Act for making a canal from Stourbridge Navigation, near Brockmoor, in the parish of Kingswinford, in the county of Stafford, to the Oak Farm Colliery, with a branch to the Slandhills, both in the said parish of Kingswinford and county of Stafford.

An Act for making and maintaining certain reservoirs in the several townships of Holme, Cartworth, Austonley, Upperthong, Wooldale, and Hepworth, in the several parishes of Kirkburton and Almond-bury, in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act for better supplying with water the town of Wakefield and the neighbourhood thereof, in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act to alter and amend an Act of the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for making and maintaining a pier, wharf and other works, at Greenwich, in the county of Kent, and to extend the powers of the said Act."

An Act for more effectually draining of certain fen lands and low grounds, in the honor manor and parish of Wormegay, in the county of Norfolk, and other lands and grounds which are now drained by means of or through a certain drain, called Polver Drain, in the said county.

An Act for removing the markets held in the city of Worcester, in the county of Worcester, for the sale of cattle, horses, sheep, and pigs, and for providing another market-place in lieu thereof, and for providing for the better and more effectual draining the said city.

An Act to alter and amend an Act of the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty, for opening

certain streets, in the burgh of Dundee, and for otherwise improving the said burgh.

An Act for building a bridge over the river Tweed, at or near to Mertown-mill, in the county of Berwick, and for making avenues and approaches thereto.

An Act for the uniform valuation of lands and tenements in the county of Waterford, in Ireland, for the purpose of levying the county rates therein.

An Act for the recovery of small debts within the southern division of the hundred of Roborough, and within the hundred of Plympton, in the county of Devon, and within the southern division of the hundred of East, in the county of Cornwall.

An Act to enable the Managers of the Sun Life Assurance Society to appropriate any part of the profits thereof, for the benefit of any persons who have already effected, or may hereafter effect, policies of assurance with the said society.

An Act for repairing and maintaining the road leading from Elland-bridge, in the parish of Halifax, into the Dewsbury and Elland turnpike road, near the Obelisk, in the parish of Dewsbury, all in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act for amending two several Acts of the seventh and tenth years of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, for repairing the road from Ashborne, in the county of Derby, to Leek, in the county of Stafford, and from Ryecroft-gate, upon Rushton-common, to Congleton, in the county of Chester.

An Act for making and maintaining a turnpike-road from Butterhouse-green, in the county of Chester, to Thorneley-lane-end, in the county of Lancaster.

An Act for more effectually amending the roads from Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, through Oldham to Austerlands, in the county of York, and from Oldham to Ashton-under-Lyne, and from Oldham to Rochdale, and other roads, and for making and maintaining new lines to communicate therewith, all in the said county of Lancaster.

An Act for repairing, maintaining, and improving the line of the road from Leeds to Otley, in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act for maintaining, repairing, and amending a turnpike road from Belfast to Lisburne, by Malone and by the Falls, and two turnpike roads leading from the Falls-road, by Dundrod and Castlerobin, respectively, to Crumlin, in the county of Antrim.

An Act for maintaining, repairing, and amending turnpike roads from the town of Antrim, in the county of Antrim, towards Coleraine, in the county of Londonderry.

An Act for making and maintaining a road from the road leading from Glasgow to Carnynte, called Duke-street, to the east end of Blackfriars-street or Regent-street, in the said city of Glasgow.

An Act for more effectually improving the several roads from Newcastle-under-Lyme to Darlston-bridge, Butt-lane, and Linley-lane, and through Trent Vale and Stoke-upon-Trent to Shelton-wharf, all in the county of Stafford.

An Act for better maintaining the road from Gillow Hollow, in the parish of Biddulph, in the county of Stafford, to the Congleton and Leek turnpike road at Park-lane, in the township of

Congleton, in the county of Chester, with the road therefrom at Lick-lane, in the said parish of Biddulph.

An Act for further and more effectually repairing, amending, and maintaining certain roads in the county of Roxburgh, and other roads connected therewith, leading into the counties of Berwick, Northumberland, and Durham.
