

**Gottorp** where he has received the Homage of the Gentry of the Duchy of *Solistein*. They write from *Berlin*, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* has given the command of the Troops which he lends to the assistance of the King of *Poland*, to the Prince of *Sourland* his Nephew; and that Orders have been sent to the said Troops to hasten their march.

**Cologne, July 28:** A general review will be held of his Electoral Highness's troops the 31. Instant at *Zons*, after which they will march towards the *Meuse*; and it is believed the French Troops commanded by Monsieur de *Foyeuse*, will join with them. Our last Letters from *Lintz* told us, that they hoped in few days to hear that the City of *Buda* was in the hands of the Imperialists; There was indeed a Garrison of 5 or 6000 Janissaries in the place, but the fear and consternation that was among them, would not, it was believed, suffer them to make the defence, which might otherwise be expected from them.

**Brussels, August 2.** We just now received by an Express the good news of another defeat of the Turks; of which we have as yet only this short account. That on the 22. past in the Morning the Imperialists attacked the Enemy, three Leagues beyond *Buda*, and after a very sharp fight of six hours, entirely defeated them, 4000 were slain, a great many taken prisoners, and the rest fled in great confusion towards the Bridge of *Esseke*. The next day the Duke of *Lorraine* sent word to the Besieged of this Victory, and as a mark of it, caused the Hoises Tail, that was taken in the Enemies Camp, to be shewed them, upon which a hideous Cry and Howling was heard, and in the Evening the besieged began to Capitulate; They demanded at first 100 Boats or Barks to carry off their Baggage, which being refused, they then desired 80, and afterwards 40; but they were told that they must Surrender on discretion.

**Paris, August 5.** On Wednesday last arrived here an Express from *Germany* with the Confirmation of the news we told you in our last, of the entire defeat of a Body of 30 or 35000 Turks near *Buda*; of which we have these Particulars. The Duke of *Lorraine* having received advice that 2500 Turks were advanced within two miles of his Camp, his Highness detached the 19th past a strong Party of Croats commanded by the Count de *Trautmanndorff*, Major-General, who fell upon the Enemy the next day about seven in the morning near *Turbina*, and routed them, killed several hundred of them upon the place, took many prisoners, and pursued the rest as far as *Flatina*; after this the Croats meeting with another Body of Turks, that were to have joined with that abovementioned, they likewise defeated them 1000 of them being slain, and 12 Standards taken by the Christians. The 21. the Duke of *Lorraine* resolved to attack the Enemies main Body that was posted about three miles beyond *Buda*, and accordingly marched with the greatest part of his Horse, and 1000 Foot commanded by the Count de *Esterhazy*, Governor of *Raab*. About break of day his Highness was advanced within half a mile of the Enemies Camp, who perceiving the Christians, immediately put themselves into Batallia, and at first made shew of great resolution, but they were charged so vigorously by the Christians, that at last they gave way, and the Imperialists obtained an entire Victory, 4000 of the Turks being slain, and their Cannon and Baggage taken. The City of *Buda*, it was believed, would not hold out long after the defeat of this Body, in which they had placed all their hopes; The Imperialists had on the 20th attached their Miners to the Wall of the Upper Town in

four several places. On Thursday last very early in the morning Monsieur de *Louvois* parted from hence for *Alsace*, intending to take his journey thither through *Lorraine*. The Marschal de *Schomberg* is, we are told, on his march with 20000 Horse towards the *Rhin*. Our *East India* Company have advice of the arrival of three of their Ships in the Ports of this Kingdom.
