Earl Marshal's-Office, June 21, 1837.

HIS day Her Majesty Queen Victoria was, in pursuance of an Order in Council of the 20th instant, proclaimed with the usual ceremonies.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon, Her Majesty having arrived from Kensington-palace, the Officers of Arms habited in their tabards; the Serjeants at Arms with their maces and collars; and Deputy Serjeant Trumpeter in his collar; the Trumpeters; Drum Major; and Knight Marshalmen; being assembled at St. James's-palace, the Proclamation was read in the Grand Court by Sir William Woods, Clarenceux King of Arms, Deputy to Sir Ralph Bigland, Garter Principal King of Arms, in the presence of Her Most Excellent Majesty the Queen, His Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex, the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Privy Seal, the Earl Marshal of England, Her Majesty's Ministers, with Lords and others of the Privy Council, and several personages of distinction. Deputy Garter having read the Proclamation, the guns in St. James's-park and Tower of London were fired, and Her Majesty, attended by the Great Officers of State, retired.

Then the Officers of Arms having mounted on horses of the Life Guards, a procession was formed in the following order:-

The procession, flanked by the Life Guards, moved from St. James's-palace to Charing-cross, where-Somerset Herald read the Proclamation.

From thence it moved to Temple-bar (the gates of which were closed), and Rouge Dragon Pursuivant of Arms advanced between two trumpeters, preceded by two of the Life Guards, to the gates; and after the trumpets had sounded thrice, demanded, in the usual form, admission into the City to proclaim Her Royal Majesty Queen Victoria; and, being admitted, and the gates again closed, Rouge Dragon was conducted by the City Marshal and his Officers to the Lord Mayor, who was in attendance in his state carriage, when Rouge Dragon delivered to his Lordship the Order in Council; which the Lord Mayor, having read, returned, and directed the gates to be opened; and Rouge Dragon being re-conducted to his place in the procession, it then moved on into the City; the Officers of Westminster filing off at Temple-bar.

At the corner of Chancery-lane, York Herald read the Proclamation, then the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Recorder, Sheriffs, Chamberlain, Common Serjeant, Town-Clerk, and City Officers fell into the procession, immediately after the Officers of Arms; and moved on to the end of Wood-street, where the cross formerly stood in Cheapside; the Proclamation being then read by Chester Herald, the procession advanced to the Royal Exchange, where it was lastly read by Portcullis Pursuivant of Arms.

A multitude of spectators filled the streets, through which the procession passed, the windows of which were crowded; and the acclamations were loud and general.

THEREAS by the late Act of Uniformity which establishes the Liturgy, and enacts that no form or order of common prayers be openly used other than what is prescribed and appointed to be used in and by the said Book, it is, notwithstanding, provided that in all those Prayers, Litanies, and Collects whichodo anywise relate to the King, Queen, or Royal Progeny, the names be altered and changed, from time to time, and fitted to the present occasion, according to direction of lawful authority: Her Majesty was pleased this day, in Council, to declare Her Royal Will and Pleasure that in all the Prayers, Liturgies, and Collects for the King, instead of the word "King" the word " Queen," instead of the word " William" the word

" Victoria," instead of the words " our Sovereign

" Lord" the words " our Sovereign Lady," be inserted; and that in all the Prayers, Liturgies, and Collects, so altered, such change of the pronouns " He," " Him," and " His," be made, as will be by those alterations rendered necessary.

Her Majesty was further pleased to declare He Royal Will and Pleasure, that in all the Prayers, Liturgies, and Collects for the Royal Family, the words " Adelaide, the Queen Dowager," be substituted for the words " our Gracious Queen " Adelaide.

And Her Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed, but with this amendment; and that in the mean time, till copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates, within this Realm, do (for the preventing of mistakes) with the pen, correct and amend all such prayers in their Church Books, according to the aforegoing direction; and for the better notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take carethat obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

By the QUEEN. A PROCLAMATION.

For the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue, and, for the preventing and punishing of Vice, Profaneness, and Immorality.

VICTORIA, R.

TITE, most seriously and religiously considering that it is an indispensable duty on Us to be careful, above all other things, to preserve and advance the honour and service of Almighty God, and to discourage and suppress all vice, profaneness, debauchery, and immorality, which are so highly displeasing to God, so great a reproach to Our Religion and Government, and (by means of the frequent ill examples of the practices thereof) have so fatal a tendency to the corruption of many of Our loving subjects, otherwise religiously and virtuously disposed, and which (if not timely remedied) may justly draw down the Divine vengeance on Us and Our Kingdom: We also humbly acknowledging that We cannot expect the blessing and goodness of Almighty God (by whom Kings reign and on which We entirely rely) to make Our reign happy and prosperous to Ourself and Our people, without a religious observance of God's holy laws; to the intent therefore, that religion, piety, and good manners may (according to Our most hearty desire) flourish and increase under Our Administration and Government, We have thought fit, by the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare Our Royal purpose and resolution to discountenance and punish all manner of vice, profaneness, and immorality in all persons, of whatsoever degree or quality, within this Our realm, and particnlarly in such as are employed near Our Royal Person; and that for the encouragement of religion and morality, We will, upon all occasions, distinguish persons of picty and virtue by marks of Our Royal favour; and We do expect and require, that all persons of honour or in place of authority will give good example, by their own virtue and picty, and to their utmost contribute to the discountenancing persons of dissolute and debauched lives, that they, being reduced by that means to shame and contempt for their loose and evil actions and behaviour, may be thereby also enforced the sooner to reform their ill habits and practices, and that the visible displeasure of good men towards them may (as far as it is possible) supply what the laws (probably)

cannot altogether prevent: and We do hereby strictly enjoin and prohibit all Our loving subjects, of what degree or quality soever, from playing on the Lord's Day at dice, cards, or any other gaine whatsoever, either in public or private houses, or other place or places whatsoever; and We do hereby require and command them, and every of them, decently and reverently to attend the worship of God on every Lord's Day, on pain of Our highest displeasure, and of being proceeded against with the utmost rigour that may be by law: and for the more effectual reforming all such persons who, by reason of their dissolute lives and conversations, are a scandal to Our Kingdom, Our further pleasure is, and We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Judges, Mayors, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace and all other Our Officers and Ministers, both Ecclesiastical and Civil, and all other Our subjects whom it may concern, to be very vigilant and strict in the discovery and the effectual prosecution and punishment of all persons who shall be guilty of excessive drinking, blasphemy, profane swearing and cursing, lewdness, profanation of the Lord's Day, or other dissolute; immoral, or disorderly practices; and that they take care also effectually to suppress all public gaming-houses and places, and other lewd and disorderly houses. and to put in execution the Statute, made in the twenty ninth year of the reign of the late King Charles the Second, intituled " An Act for " the better observation of the Lord's Day, com-" monly called Sunday;" and also so much of an Act of Parliament, made in the ninth year of the reign of the late King William the Third, intituled " An Act for the more effectual suppressing of " blasphemy and profaneness," as is now in force, and all other laws now in force for the punishing and suppressing any of the vices aforesaid, and also to suppress and prevent all gaming whatsoever in public or private houses on the Lord's Day; and likewise that they take effectual care to prevent all persons keeping taverns, chocolate-houses, coffee-houses, or other public houses whatsoever, from selling wine, chocolate, coffee, ale beer, or other liquors, or receiving or permitting guests to be or remain in such their houses, in the time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon pain of Our highest displeasure: And, for the more effectual proceeding herein, We do hereby direct and command all Our Judges of Assize and Justices of the Peace to

give strict charges at their respective assizes and sessions for the due prosecution and punishment of all persons that shall presume to offend in any of the kinds aforesaid, and also of all persons that, contrary to their duty, shall be remiss or negligent in putting the said laws in execution, and that they do, at their respective assizes and quarter sessions of the peace, cause this Our Royal Proclamation to be publicly read in open Court, immediately before the charge is given: and We do hereby further charge and command-every Minister, in his respective parish church or chapel, to read, or cause to be read, this Our Proclamation, at least four times in every year, immediately after Divine Service, and to incite and stir up their respective auditories to the practice of piety and virtue, and the avoiding of all immorality and profaneness: And, to the end that all vice and debauchery may be prevented, and religion and virtue practised by all officers, private soldiers, mariners, and others who are employed in Our service by sea and land, We do hereby strictly charge and command' all Our Commanders and Officers whatsoever, that they do take care to avoid all profaneness, debauchery, and other immoralities, and that, by their own good and virtuous lives and conversations, they do set good examples to all such as are under their care and authority, and likewise take care of and inspect the behaviour of all such as are under them, and punish all those who shall be guilty of any the offences aforesaid, as they will be answerable for the ill consequences of their neglect herein.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, this twentyfirst day of June, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, and in the first year of Our reign.

A PROCLAMATION,

Requiring all Persons, being in Office of Authority or Government at the Decease of the late King, to proceed in the Execution of their respective Offices.

VICTORIA, R.

HEREAS by an Act, made in the sixth year of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled "An Act for the security of Her

" Majesty's Person and Government, and of the " succession to the Crown of Great Britain in the " Protestant Line," it was enacted, that no office, place, or employment, civil or military, within the kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, dominion of Wales, town of Berwick upon-Tweed, isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark, or any of His Majesty's plantations, should become void by. reason of the demise of Her said late Majestv, Her heirs or successors, Kings or Queens of this realm, but that every/person and persons in any of the offices, places, and employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective offices, places, and émployments for the space of six months next after such death or demise, unless sooner removed and discharged by the next successor to whom the Imperial Crown of this realm was limited and appointed to go, remain, and descend; and whereas by an Act, made in the fifty-seventh year of thereign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for the continuation of all and " every person or persons in any and every office, " place, or employment, civil or military, within " the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ire. " land, dominion of Wales, town of Berwick-" upon-Tweed, isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alder-" ney, Sark, and Man, and also in all and every " of His Majesty's foreign possessions, colonies, " or plantations, which he or she shall hold, " possess, or exercise, during the pleasure of the " Crown, at the time of the death, or demise of " His present Majesty, until removed or dis-".charged therefrom by the succeeding King or " Queen of this realm," it was enacted, that all and every person and persons who, upon the day of the demise of His said late Majesty, should hold any office, civil or military, under the Crown during pleasure, should, under and by virtue of the said Act, and without any new or other patent, commission, warrant, or authority, continue and be entitled, in all respects, notwithstanding the demise of His said late Majesty, to hold and enjoy the same; but, nevertheless, the same should be held or enjoyed only during the pleasure of the King or Queen who should succeed to the Crown upon the demise of His said late Majesty, and the right and title to hold and enjoy the same, under the authority of the said Act, should be determinable in such and the like manner by the King or Queen who, upon the demise of His said late Majesty, should succeed to the Crown, as the right or title

to any office, place, or employment granted by William Wells, Gent. to be Cornet and Subsuch succeeding King or Queen during pleasure, would by law be determinable; We, therefore, with the advice of Our Privy Council; declare Our Royal will and pleasure to be, and do hereby direct and command, that all and every person and persons who, at the time of the demise of Our late Royal Uncle, of glorious memory, duly and lawfully held, or were duly and lawfully possessed of or invested in, any office, place or employment, civil or military, within our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, dominion of Wales, town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or any of Our foreign possessions, colonies, or plantations, do, severally, according to their places, offices, or charges, proceed in the performance and execution of all duties belonging to their respective offices, whilst they shall hold the same respectively during Our pleasure; and We do hereby require and command all Our loving subjects to be aiding, helping, and assisting at the commandment of the said Officers and Ministers, in the performance and execution of their respective offices and places, as they and every of them tender Our utmost displeasure, and will answer the contrary at their peril.

the port of Dublin, &c. give notice, that two light-houses have been built on Oyster-island, Sligo-bay, from which lights will be exhibited on the evening of the 1st of August 1837, and thenceforth from sun-set to sun-rise.

Specification given of the Position and Appearance of the Towers, by Mr. Halpin, Inspector of the Irish Light-houses.

The two towers erected on Oyster island, in Sligo-bay, bear from each other N. N. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. and S. S. E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. distant 496 feet, and kept in line will lead in the deepest water over the Bar, and clear of the Bun Gar Bank.

The lights will be fixed bright lights, visible from S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. to N. W. by N.

The Northern Light-house bears by compass (var. 28° 30') from the Wheaten Rock, S. E. distant 3 sea miles; from the Black Rock, S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

distant $1\frac{3}{4}$ sea mile; from the Perch Rock, S.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. distant $\frac{1}{4}$ sea mile.

The Northern Light-house, shut on the north point of Coney-island, will clear the Wheaten Rock.

The towers are circular, coloured white, and the lanterns elevated over the mean level of the sea.

North Light-house, 43 feet. South Light-house, 53 feet.

The North Light-house may be seen at a distance of 11 miles, and the South Light-house at a distance of 12 miles, in clear weather.
