To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's faithful, and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Liverymen of

London, in Common-hall assembled, beg leave to approach your Royal Presence with the expression of our deep grief for the loss which your Majesty and the nation have sustained, each of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, who, by his firm support of the constitution and privileges of the people, and by giving his royal sanction to the introduction and passing of the reform bill, and other measures for improving the institutions of our country, attached to himself the warm affections of a grateful and loyal people, and earned for himself the undying title of our patriot King.

Whilst we bow with humility and resignation to the will of the Disposer of events in depriving us, at this moment, of our beloved and patriotic Sovereign, we, nevertheless, see abundant cause for thankfulness that that visitation has been withheld until the period when your Majesty has become qualified by law to exercise the sovereign power of the state in your own Person; born in England, and educated in an attachment to British institutions and British interests, under the superintending care and fond solicitude of an affectionate parent, we hail with lively satisfaction your Majesty's accession to the Throne; and the recent gracious assurances of your Majesty that, associating with all classes, it is your Majesty's anxious desire to extend to all the full enjoyment of their religious privileges and their civil rights; and we fervently pray that, animated by the example of our late lamented King, and rightly appreciating the advantages of our constitutional monarchy your Majesty's life may long be sooured to realise those advantages for the public welfare, and that by a steady attachment to the interests of all classes of the community, a wise and temperate administration of the laws, and a determination to improve, to the utmost practicable extent, the institutions of the country, your Majesty may live to see the accomplishment of your earnest desire, the noblest ambition of Princes, to reign in the hearts and affections of a free, a happy, and a united people.
