WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage," reciting, amongst other things, that His said late Majesty was pleased, on the fourth day of February, and on the sixth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, to issue two several commissions to certain persons therein respectively named, directing them to consider the state of the several dioceses in England and Wales, with reference to the amount of their revenues, and the more equal distribution of episcopal duties, and the prevention of the necessity of attaching, by commendam, to bishoprics, benefices with cure of souls; and to consider also the state of the several cathedral and collegiate churches in England and Wales, with a view to the suggestion of such measures as might render them conducive to the efficiency of the Established Church, and to devise the best mode of providing for the cure of souls, with special reference to the residence of the clergy on their respective benefices; and reciting, that the said Commissioners had, in pursuance of such directions, made four several reports to His said late Majesty, bearing date respectively the seventeenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and the fourth

day of March, the twentieth day of May, and the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six; and reciting, that the said Commissioners had in their said reports, amongst other things, recommended that commissioners should be appointed by Parliament for the purpose of preparing and laying before His Majesty in Council such schemes as should appear to them to be best adapted for carrying into effect, amongst other things, the following recommendations; and that His Majesty in Council should be empowered to make Orders ratifying such schemes, and having the full force of law; and that, in order to provide for the augmentation of the incomes of the smaller bishopricks, such fixed annual sums should be paid to the Commissioners, out of the revenues of the larger sees respectively, as should, upon due inquiry and consideration, be determined on, so as to leave, as an average annual income, to the Archbishop of Canterbury fifteen thousand pounds, to the Archbishop of York ten thousand pounds, to the Bishop of London ten thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Durham eight thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Winchester seven thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Ely five thousand five hundred pounds, to the Bishop of Saint Asaph and Bangor five thousand two hundred pounds, and to the Bishops of Worcester, and Bath and Wells, respectively, five thousand pounds; and that out of the fund thus accruing, fixed annual payments should be made by the Commissioners, in such instances and to such amount, as should be in like manner determined on, so that the average annual incomes of the other bishops respectively should be not less than four thousand pounds, nor more than five thousand pounds:

It is enacted, amongst other things, that the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being, the Lord Archbishop of York, and the Lord Bishop of London for the time being, John Lord Bishop of Lincoln, James

Henry Lord Bishop of Gloucester, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord High Treasurer or the First Lord of the Treasury, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer for the time being, respectively, and such one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as should be for that purpose nominated by His Majesty, under His royal sign manual (such Lord Chancellor, Lord President, Lord High Treasurer or First Lord of the Treasury, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Secretary of State being respectively members of the United Church of Great Britain and Ireland), the Right Honourable Dudley Earl of Harrowby, the Right Honourable Henry Hobhouse, and the Right Honourable Sir Herbert Jenner, Knt. should, for the purposes of this Act, be one body politic and corporate, by the name of "the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," and by that name should have perpetual succession and a common seal:

And it is further enacted, that the said Commissioners should, from time to time, prepare and lay before His Majesty in Council such schemes as should appear to the said Commissioners to be best adapted for carrying into effect the therein-before recited recommendations, and should in such schemes recommend and propose such measures as might upon further inquiry, which the said Commissioners are thereby authorised to make, appear to them to be necessary for carrying such recommendations into full and perfect effect; provided always, that nothing therein contained should be construed to prevent the said Commissioners from proposing in any such scheme such modifications or variations, as to matters of detail and regulation, as should not be substantially repugnant to any or either of the said recommendations:

And it is further enacted, that when any scheme, prepared under the authority of the said Act, should be approved by His Majesty in Council, it should be lawful for His Majesty in Council to issue an Order or Orders ratifying the same, and specifying the time or times when such scheme, or the several parts thereof, should take effect, and to direct in every such Order that the same should be registered by the registrar of each of the dioceses, the bishops whereof might or should be in any respect affected thereby:

And it is further enacted, that every such Order should, as soon as might be after the making and issuing thereof by His Majesty in Council, be inserted and published in the London Gazette:

And it is further enacted, that, so soon as any such Order in Council should be so registered and gazetted, it should in all respects, and as to all things therein contained, have and be of the same force and effect as if all and every part thereof were included in the said Act, any law, statute, canon, letters patent, grant, usage, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding:

And whereas the said Commissioners, pursuant to the authority vested in them by the said Act, have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and thirty-

seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, appointed and incorporated by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage," have, in pursuance of the said Act, prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for fixing the annual sum to be paid by us for the augmentation of the income of the bishoprick of Hereford.

We humbly recommend and propose, that in order to raise the average annual income of the Bishop of Hereford for the time being, to the sum of four thousand two hundred pounds, as near as may be, there shall be paid by us to the bishop next succeeding to the see of Hereford, which is now vacant, and his successors, bishops of Hereford, for the time being, out of such moneys as shall from time to time be standing to our credit and account in the Bank of England, being part of payments from the larger sees respectively, towards the augmentation of the incomes of the bishops of the smaller sees, the fixed annual sum of one thousand four hundred pounds, by equal half yearly payments, on the first day of March and the first day of September in every year; the first of such payments to be made on the first day of March next; and that whenever hereafter a vacancy in the said see of Hereford shall happen on any other day than one of the said half yearly days of payment, the next half yearly payment shall be apportioned between the bishop making the vacancy, or his representatives, and the bishop succeeding to the see, according to the time which shall have elapsed from the last half yearly day of payment to the day of the vacancy, inclusive, and such proportions shall be paid to the respective parties accordingly.

And whereas the amount of the moneys from time to time applicable to the purposes aforesaid, and to the augmentation of any other of the smaller sees upon vacancies occurring therein respectively, will depend on the contingency of vacancies occurring among the larger sees from which payments are hereafter to be made towards such purposes; and the amount of the demand upon such moneys will depend on the contingency of vacancies occurring among the said smaller sees; and it may therefore happen that the demands upon such moneys may, for a time, exceed the amount thereof; we further recommend and propose, that if at the commencement of any half year, calculated from the first day of January to the last day of June, and from the first day of July to the last day of December, respectively, it shall appear to us that there will in the

current half year be a deficiency of the said moneys to pay the sums then charged thereon, and payable in the same half year, it shall be lawful for us to resolve, that a deduction be made from the sum payable in the same half year to the Bishop of Hereford for the time being, and from the sums payable to the respective bishops of other smaller sees, who, by virtue of any other scheme prepared or to be prepared by us, and of any Order or Orders of your Majesty in Council for ratifying the same, shall then be entitled to payments in augmentation of their respective incomes, so as to keep the sums to be paid, during the same half year, within the amount of the moneys applicable as aforesaid, during such half year, and to calculate such deduction in proportion to the sums which have been or may be named in this and every such other scheme, as the future annual average income of the said sees respectively; and that upon the amount of every such deduction being certified by us, or by our secretary, to the bishop to be affected thereby, within fourteen days after the commencement of such half year, the said bishop shall have no present claim to any greater sum than the residue of his half yearly payment after such deduction as aforesaid, nor any future claim, except as is hereinafter mentioned; that is to say, that so soon thereafter as the sums to be paid to us in any half year, applicable to the purposes aforesaid, shall exceed the sums to be paid by us for those purposes within the same half year, we shall be authorized and bound to divide the surplus rateably among the bishops from whose payments such deductions shall have been made, or the representatives of such of them as shall be dead, and so from half year to half year, until the whole sums deducted shall be paid; the deductions of one half year to be paid before any payment shall be made on account of the deductions of any subsequent half year.

And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing other measures relating to the said bishopric of Hereford, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act.

All which we humbly recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council.

thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Winchester seven thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Ely five thousand five hundred pounds, to the Bishop of Saint Asaph and Bangor five thousand two hundred pounds, and to the Bishops of Worcester, and Bath and Wells, respectively, five thousand pounds; and that, out of the fund thus accruing, fixed annual payments should be made by the Commissioners, in such instances and to such amount as should be in like manner determined on, so that the average annual incomes of the other bishops respectively should be not less than four thousand pounds, nor more than five thousand pounds; and that none of the proposed alterations affecting the boundaries or jurisdiction of any diocese, or the revenues belonging to any see, the bishop of which was in possession on the fourth day of March one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, should take effect until the next avoidance of the see, without the consent of such bishop; and that all the archdeacons of England and Wales be in the gift of the bishops of the respective dioceses in which they are situate:

It is enacted, amongst other things, that the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being, the Lord Archbishop of York, and the Lord Bishop of London for the time being, John Lord Bishop of Lincoln, James Henry Lord Bishop of Gloucester, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord High Treasurer or the First Lord of the Treasury, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer for the time being respectively, and such one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as should be for that purpose nominated by His Majesty under His royal sign manual (such Lord Chancellor, Lord President, Lord High Treasurer or First Lord of the Treasury Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Secretary of State being respectively members of the United Church of Great Britain and Ireland), the Right Honourable Dudley Earl of Harrowby, the Right Honourable Henry Hobhouse, and the Right Honourable Sir Herbert Jenner, Knight, should, for the purposes of the said Act, be one body politic and corporate, by the name of "the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," and by that name should have perpetual succession and a common seal:

And it is further enacted, that when any scheme, prepared under the authority of the said Act, should be approved by His Majesty in Council, it should be lawful for His Majesty in Council to issue an Order or Orders ratifying the same, and specifying the time or times when such scheme, or the several parts thereof, should take effect, and to direct in every such Order that the same should be registered by the registrar of each of the dioceses, the bishops whereof might or should be in any respect affected thereby:

And it is further enacted, that every such Order should, as soon as might be after the making and issuing thereof by His Majesty in Council, be inserted and published in the London Gazette:

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, appointed and incorporated by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage," have, in pursuance of the said Act, prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for carrying into effect part of the recommendations in the said Act contained, relating to the sees and dioceses of York, Lincoln, and Peterborough.

We humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Lincoln, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that, upon the first avoidance of the said see of Peterborough, the whole county of Leicester, now forming the archdeaconry of Leicester, and part of the said diocese of Lincoln, shall be absolutely detached and dis severed from the

same diocese, and shall be and become permanently annexed and united to, and included in, and form part of, the said diocese of Peterborough; and that the said archdeaconry, and all parishes and places, churches and chapels, within the limits thereof, and the present and every future archdeacon thereof, and all rural deans, and the whole clergy and others your Majesty's subjects within the same, shall be thenceforth exempted and released from all jurisdiction, authority, and control of the Bishop of Lincoln, and shall be under and subject to the jurisdiction, authority, and control of the Bishop of Peterborough for the time being; and that the right of appointing the Archdeacon of Leicester shall thereupon be vested in the Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors Bishops of Peterborough for ever.

And we further recommend and propose, that, from and after such avoidance of the said see of Peterborough, in order to raise the average annual income of the Bishop of Peterborough for the time being to the sum of four thousand five hundred pounds, as near as may be, there shall be paid by us to the bishop then succeeding to the said see of Peterborough, and his successors bishops of Peterborough for the time being, out of such moneys as shall, from time to time, be standing to our credit and account in the Bank of England, being part of payments from the larger sees respectively towards the augmentation of the incomes of the bishops of the smaller sees, the fixed annual sum of one thousand one hundred and fifty pounds, by equal half yearly payments, the first of such payments to be made at the end of six calendar months from the day of such avoidance; and that whenever thereafter a vacancy in the said see of Peterborough shall happen on any other day than the half yearly day of payment, so calculated as aforesaid, the next half yearly payment shall be apportioned between the bishop making the vacancy, or his representatives, and the bishop succeeding to the see, according to the time which shall have elapsed from the last half yearly day of payment to the day of the vacancy inclusive; and such proportions shall be paid to the respective parties accordingly.

And whereas the amount of the moneys, from time to time, applicable to the purposes aforesaid, and to the augmentation of any other of the smaller sees upon vacancies occurring therein respectively, will depend on the contingency of vacancies occurring among the larger sees, from which payments are hereafter to be made towards such purposes; and the amount of the demand upon such moneys will depend on the contingency of vacancies occurring among the said smaller sees, and it may therefore happen that the demands upon such moneys may for a time exceed the amount thereof; we further recommend and propose, that, if at the commencement of any half year, calculated from the first day of January to the last day of June, and from the first day of July to the last day of December, respectively, it shall appear to us, that there will in the current half year be a deficiency of the said moneys to pay the sums then charged thereon, and payable in the same half year, it shall be lawful for us to resolve that a deduction be made from the sum payable in the same half year to the Bishop of Peter-

borough for the time being, and from the sums payable to the respective bishops of other smaller sees, who, by virtue of any other scheme prepared, or to be prepared by us, and of any Order or Orders of your Majesty in Council for ratifying the same, shall then be entitled to payments in augmentation of their respective incomes, so as to keep the sums to be paid during the same half year within the amount of the moneys applicable as aforesaid during such half year; and to calculate such deduction in proportion to the sums which have been, or may be, named in this or such other scheme, as the future annual average income of the said sees respectively; and that upon the amount of every such deduction being certified by us, or by our secretary, to the bishop to be affected thereby, within fourteen days after the commencement of such half year, the said bishop shall have no present claim to any greater sum than the residue of his half yearly payment after such deduction as aforesaid; nor any future claim, except as is hereinafter mentioned; that is to say, that so soon thereafter as the sums to be paid to us in any half year, applicable to the purposes aforesaid, shall exceed the sums to be paid by us for those purposes within the same half year, we shall be authorised and bound to divide the surplus, rateably, among the bishops from whose payments such deductions shall have been made, or the representatives of such of them as shall be dead; and so from half year to half year, until the whole sums deducted shall be paid; the deductions of one half year to be paid before any payment shall be made on account of the deductions of any subsequent half year.

And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Archbishop of Canterbury and Edward Archbishop of York, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, and with the like consent of the said John Bishop of Lincoln, testified as aforesaid, that at the time of such avoidance as aforesaid the whole county of Nottingham, now forming the archdeaconry of Nottingham, and part of the province and diocese of York, shall be detached and dis severed from the said last-mentioned province and diocese, and shall be annexed and united to, and included in, and form part of, the province of Canterbury, and of the said diocese of Lincoln; and that the said archdeaconry, and all parishes and places, churches and chapels, within the limits thereof, and the present and every future archdeacon thereof, and all rural deans, and the whole clergy and others your Majesty's subjects within the same, shall be thenceforth exempted and released from all jurisdiction, authority, and control of the Archbishop of York, and shall be under and subject to the metropolitan jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the episcopal jurisdiction of the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being, respectively; and that the right of appointing the Archdeacon of Nottingham shall thereupon be vested in the Bishop of Lincoln, and his successors, Bishops of Lincoln, for ever.

And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing other measures relating to the said sees and dioceses of York, Lincoln, and

Peterborough, respectively, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act.

All which we humbly recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council.

esty, bearing date respectively the seventeenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and the fourth day of March, the twentieth day of May, and the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six; and reciting, that the said Commissioners had in their said reports, amongst other things, recommended that commissioners should be appointed by Parliament for the purpose of preparing and laying before His Majesty in Council, such schemes as should appear to them to be best adapted for carrying into effect, amongst other things, the following recommendations; and that His Majesty in Council should be empowered to make Orders ratifying such schemes and having the full force of law; and that, in order to provide for the augmentation of the incomes of the smaller bishoprics, such fixed annual sums should be paid to the Commissioners, out of the revenues of the larger sees respectively, as should, upon due inquiry and consideration, be determined on, so as to leave as an average annual income to the Archbishop of Canterbury fifteen thousand pounds, to the Archbishop of York ten thousand pounds, to the Bishop of London ten thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Durham eight thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Winchester seven thousand pounds, to the Bishop of Ely five thousand five hundred pounds, to the Bishop of Saint Asaph and Bangor five thousand two hundred pounds, and to the Bishops of Worcester, and Bath and Wells, respectively, five thousand pounds; and that, out of the fund thus accruing, fixed annual payments should be made by the Commissioners in such instances and to such amounts as should be in like manner determined on, so that the average annual incomes of the other bishops respectively should be not less than four thousand pounds, nor more than five thousand pounds:

It is enacted, amongst other things, that the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being, the Lord Archbishop of York, and the Lord Bishop of London for the time being, John Lord Bishop of Lincoln, James Henry Lord Bishop of Gloucester, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord High Treasurer or the First Lord of the Treasury, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer for the time being, respectively, and such one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as shall be for that purpose nominated by His Majesty, under His royal sign manual (such Lord Chancellor, Lord President, Lord High Treasurer or First Lord of the Treasury, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Secretary of State being respectively members of the United Church of Great Britain and Ireland), the Right Honourable Dudley Earl of Harrowby, the Right Honourable Henry Hobhouse, and the Right Honourable Sir Herbert Jenner, Knight, should, for the purposes of the said Act, be one body politic and corporate, by the name of "the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," and by that name should have perpetual succession and a common seal:

And it is further enacted, that the said Commissioners should, from time to time, prepare and lay before His Majesty in Council such schemes as should appear to the said Commissioners to be best

adapted for carrying into effect the therein-before recited recommendations, and should in such schemes recommend and propose such measures as might, upon further inquiry, which the said Commissioners are thereby authorised to make, appear to them to be necessary for carrying such recommendations into full and perfect effect; provided always, that nothing therein contained should be construed to prevent the said Commissioners from proposing, in any such scheme, such modifications or variations, as to matters of detail and regulation, as should not be substantially repugnant to any or either of the said recommendations:

And it is further enacted, that when any scheme, prepared under the authority of the said Act, should be approved by His Majesty in Council, it should be lawful for His Majesty in Council to issue an Order or Orders ratifying the same, and specifying the time or times when such scheme, or the several parts thereof, should take effect, and to direct in every such Order that the same should be registered by the registrar of each of the dioceses the bishops whereof might or should be in any respect affected thereby:

And it is further enacted, that every such Order should, as soon as may be after the making and issuing thereof by His Majesty in Council, be inserted and published in the London Gazette:

And it is further enacted, that, so soon as any such Order in Council should be so registered and gazetted, it should in all respects, and as to all things therein contained, have and be of the same force and effect as if all and every part thereof were included in the said Act, any law, statute, canon, letters patent, grant, usage, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding:

And whereas the said Commissioners, pursuant to the authority vested in them by the said Act, have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, appointed and incorporated by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage," have, in pursuance of the said Act, prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for fixing the annual sums to be paid by us in augmentation of the incomes of the bishopricks of Carlisle and Chester.

We humbly recommend and propose, in order to raise the average annual income of the bishop of

each of the sees of Carlisle and Chester to the sum of four thousand five hundred pounds, as near as may be, respectively, that, out of such moneys as shall from time to time be standing to our credit and account in the Bank of England, being part of payments from the larger sees respectively, towards the augmentation of the incomes of the bishops of the smaller sees, there shall be paid by us, upon the next avoidance of the said sees respectively, whether the same shall happen by death, translation, or otherwise, to the bishop next succeeding to the said see of Carlisle, and his successors, the fixed annual sum of two thousand pounds, and to the bishop next succeeding to the said see of Chester, and his successors, the fixed annual sum of one thousand four hundred and fifty pounds, by equal half yearly payments in every year, the first of such payments to be made at the end of six calendar months from the day of such avoidance in each case respectively; and that whenever, after the commencement of such payments respectively, a vacancy of either of the said sees shall happen on any other day than the half yearly day of payment, so calculated as aforesaid, then in each such case the next half yearly payment shall be apportioned between the bishop making the vacancy, or his representatives, and the bishop succeeding to the see, according to the time which shall have elapsed from the last half yearly day of payment to the day of the vacancy inclusive, and such proportions shall be paid to the respective parties accordingly:

And we further recommend and propose, that if a vacancy of the said see of Carlisle shall happen before the mortgage debt due from the Bishop of Carlisle, for money borrowed under the provisions of an Act, passed in the tenth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, for repairing and improving Rose Castle, in the county of Cumberland, belonging to the said see of Carlisle, shall be fully paid off, then, so long as the annual sums payable by virtue of the said last recited Act shall continue payable, the amount of such sums shall be also paid by us to the Bishop of Carlisle for the time being, out of the same moneys as aforesaid, and by like half yearly payments, in addition to the fixed annual sum herein specified.

And whereas the amount of the moneys from time to time applicable to the purposes aforesaid, and to the augmentation of any other of the smaller sees upon vacancies occurring therein respectively, will depend on the contingency of vacancies occurring among the larger sees from which payments are hereafter to be made towards such purposes; and the amount of the demand upon such moneys will depend on the contingency of vacancies occurring among the said smaller sees; and it may therefore happen that the demands upon such moneys may for a time exceed the amount thereof, we further recommend and propose, that if at the commencement of any half year, calculated from the first day of January to the last day of June, and from the first day of July to the last day of December respectively, it shall appear to us, that there will in the current half year be a deficiency of the said moneys to pay the sums then charged thereon, and payable in the same half year, it shall be lawful for us to

resolve, that a deduction be made from the sums payable in the same half year to each bishop of the sees herein-named and to each of the bishops of other smaller sees who, by virtue of any other scheme prepared or to be prepared by us, and of any Order or Orders of your Majesty in Council for ratifying the same, shall then be entitled to payments in augmentation of their respective incomes, so as to keep the sums to be paid during the same half year within the amount of the moneys applicable as aforesaid during such half year; and to calculate such deduction in proportion to the sums herein named, and to the sums which may in each such other scheme as aforesaid be named as the amount of the future average annual income of each see respectively; and that, upon the amount of every such deduction being certified, by us or by our secretary, to the bishop to be affected thereby, within fourteen days after the commencement of such half year, the said bishop shall have no present claim to any greater sum than the residue of his half yearly payment, after such deduction as aforesaid, nor any future claim, except as is hereinafter-mentioned, that is to say; that so soon thereafter as the sums to be paid to us in any half year, applicable to the purposes aforesaid, shall exceed the sums to be paid by us for those purposes within the same half year, we shall be authorized and bound to divide the surplus rateably among the bishops from whose payments such deductions shall have been made, or the representatives of such of them as shall be dead; and so from half year to half year, until the whole sums deducted shall be paid, the deductions of one half year to be paid, before any payment shall be made on account of the deductions of any subsequent half year.

And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing other measures relating to either of the said bishopricks of Carlisle and Chester, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act.

All of which we humbly recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council.

In witness whereof we have hereunto set our common seal, this first day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall take effect immediately from and after the time when the same shall have been registered as hereinafter directed, and shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the several Registrars of the several dioceses of Carlisle and Chester.

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

Madam,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful subjects, the Bishop and Clergy of Down and Connor, assembled at the Ordinary Visitation, most respectfully solicit permission to approach your Majesty with an humble expression of condolence on the demise of our late most gracious Sovereign, and of congratulation to your Majesty on your accession to the hereditary sceptre of this kingdom.

It is not simply that we consider the possession of royalty to be in itself desirable; for its difficulties, its anxieties, and its dangers, may be well accounted commensurate, at least, with its enjoyments; but as an instrument of good, it may be made the subject of reasonable felicitation to its possessor; especially as an instrument for promoting the honour of God, the security (humanly speaking) and the welfare of His church, and the maintenance of His true religion.

To your Majesty, then, as invested with that high and holy prerogative, and destined, we humbly trust, by Divine Providence, to be the future nursing Mo-

ther of God's Church, associated in this kingdom by the piety and wisdom of our forefathers with the system of the British Constitution, we, in our capacity of Ministers of the Church, humbly tender this our congratulatory Address.

In so doing, we gladly seize the opportunity for avowing those sentiments of reverential attachment to your Majesty's Royal authority and Person, which are firmly bound upon our consciences as Ministers of the Church, and which are moreover endeared to our hearts by the peculiar circumstances of your Majesty's situation; a situation, Madam, not only most affecting on its own account, but which awakens us to a lively recollection of that female and youthful Sovereign, one of your Majesty's most illustrious Predecessors, from whose reign, memorable as it is for other signal achievements, the Anglican Church dates her restoration to a profession of the pure Christian Faith.

For the continued maintenance of the Faith, thus nationally established, that, whilst it rests ultimately and essentially on a foundation of infinitely superior strength, it may still be upheld as a resting-place for the national creed and devotion, we cannot but feel, Madam, a lively concern; and accordingly, at the same time that we cherish a charitable disposition towards those who separate themselves from the Church's communion, and a desire that they should not be exempted from your Majesty's gracious regard for the clergy and people of the united Church of England and Ireland in general, and especially of that portion of it whose lot is cast in this part of the United Kingdom, we presume earnestly to implore, in a signal degree, your Majesty's royal protection and patronage, never more needed, in our judgment, than at this time.

That such protection will be extended, we rely for our assurance, under God's providence, on your Majesty's early incorporation and continued communion with the National Church; on your conscientious and reasonable persuasion of its excellence; on the peculiar relation which your Majesty now bears to it, as its supreme Governor under Christ; and on the solemn obligation in its behalf, which, in the name of Him, by whom Kings reign, your Majesty has recently undertaken, with the youthful integrity of an unsophisticated mind, and of a frank and ingenuous heart.

On your Majesty's simplicity and sincerity of purpose we place our unshaken confidence. And we beseech that Blessed Lord, who has set your Majesty over this Church and Nation, so to enlighten your understanding, and so to dispose and govern your heart, that the prayer of the Church, on the solemn celebration of your Majesty's accession, may be accomplished in your Majesty's reign: "that the work of God may prosper in your hands; that your eyes may behold the success of your designs for the service of God's true religion established amongst us; and that He may make you a blessed instrument of protecting and advancing His truth, wherever it is persecuted and oppressed."

In the bereavement which your Majesty, in common with the whole British nation, has sustained, by the lamented decease of your Royal Uncle, our late most gracious Sovereign, we cordially sympathize; and we desire to join our fellow-subjects in a grateful acknowledgement of the justice, benevolence, and patriotism which have marked his character, during the progress of his short but memorable reign.

To assist in extending the boundaries of this kingdom, according to the grace given and the opportunities afforded to us, we account our highest privilege; and we therefore humbly beseech your Majesty to continue to us the countenance and protection which we have hitherto enjoyed from your Majesty's Royal Predecessors, especially while engaged in preaching the unsearchable riches of Christ among the Gentiles, who are subject to your Majesty's sceptre.

We unite in fervently imploring the God of all graces to shower down upon your Majesty, and upon your Illustrious Mother, His choicest blessings; to endow you with every good and perfect gift, for the discharge of the important and arduous duties of

your exalted station; to grant you a long and happy reign, over a religious, prosperous, and loyal people; and, finally, when your Majesty is called to lay aside an earthly crown, to bestow upon you, through the merits of Christ our Saviour, a crown of glory, that fadeth not away.
