Cologne, August 8. The Troops of our Elector continue at Zons; but it's faid they will decamp in 3 or 4 days, and march towards the Meufe. The French Troops commanded by Monfieur de Forenfe, have we are told, orders to quit the Country of Limburg, and to go and encamp at Chenay on the Ouris.

Bruffels; August 15. The Mareschal de Schomberg decamped the last week from Timeon, and matched towards the Meule, The Marquis de Boufflers marched on Saturday from Brugelet with the Troops under his command, and is now en-camped between Gaure and Deynfe; and yesterday morning Monficur de la Trouffe left the Neighbourhood of Nivelle, and marched to Stenikirke not far from Aeth From Lirge we have an account that the Elector of Cologne's Troops are on their march with a Train of Artillery towards the Meufe. Monficur Chanlay is again come hither, and this Evening had Audience of the Marquis de Grana. We have nothing new from Hungary.

Paris, August 16. The Marcichal de Schomberg is marched towards Strasburgh with a great Body of Horie ; and the Foot, that have their Quarters on that fide, are drawing together to joyn him; fo that he will have a very co-fiderable Army. is faid that the Elector of Bavaria and Prince Waldeck do move with the Treops under their command towards the Rbin. Monficur de Louvois rcturned hither about the end of the laft week; and we are t. 1d that at Luxemburg he hath fetled a Fond of 100 thousand Livres for the repairing the Houses that were ruined during the Siege. The Marguis de Boufflers. and Monficur de la Trouffe arc on the Meufe with the feparate Bodies which they command. Our last Letters from Germany (old us, that the Imperialifs have loft a great many Officers before Buda and in the other actions they have had with the Turks fince their laft paffing the Dapube; and particularly in a Sally which the Befieged made on the 18th paft; that those of the greatest confideration were the Count de Carlowitz Governor of Gran, the young Count de Staremberg Son to the Governor of Vienna, the Count de Hobenzolren, and the Count d'Altheim; That on the 20th the Christians, after an assault of five hours, took the Lower Town, most of the Januaries that defended it being put to the Sword; That the Duke of Lorrain after the defeat of the Turks on the 22, had fummoned the Garifon in the Upper Town to furrender the place, and had let them know that if they did not do it in 24 hours, they must expect ло quarter, The fame Letters add, that General Leflie had taken a very Important place, which is the Key of Sclavonia, after which he marched towards the Bridge of Effecke.
