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Venice, August 3.

**B**Y a Vessel arrived from Corfu we have advice that General Morosini was Sailed from thence with the whole Fleet for the Levant; It's believed their design is upon Candia, in which there are but 6000 and the raw and undisciplined Men. The 18th of the last Month the Sieur de Linn Captain of the Ship Sailed with 20 Men of War from the Isle of Thina towards the Dardanelles to put a Terror into the City of Constantinople, and to cut off from them all Provisions by Sea. On Wednesday last arrived here an Express with the News of the Victory obtained by the Duke of Lorraine near Buda; and the next day another brought an Account of the taking of Virovitza by Count Leslie.

Vienna, August 6. Yesterday their Imperial Majesties returned hither from Lintz; and some hours after received the News of the Death of the Arch-Duke Leopold, their Second Son, who dyed at Ens the fourth Instant, which has much afflicted this Court. Several Companies of new raised Men have within these few days passed through this place in their march for Hungary; and we are told that three Imperial Regiments of Foot, that have their Quarters near the Lake of Constance are ordered to march this way. We have advice from Croatia that General Leslie having put a Garison into Virovitza. (Upon the surrender of which the Enemy abandoned the Towns of Sopitz, Flatina, and Werazin) he marched to Brezowitz, and that being come before it, the Turks capitulated and surrendered the place the 27th past upon the same conditions that were granted to Virovitza; and that Count Leslie was laying a Bridge over the Drave near Furantz: The Letters add that a great many Christians who lived in those Quarters under the Turkish Dominion had prayed Count Leslie to receive them into the Emperors Protection, to whom they have Swore Fidelity. Our last Letters from the Imperial Camp told us, that all things were preparing for a General Assault; However it is thought the Duke of Lorraine, seeing there are 8000 Janisaries in the place, and that the Imperial Army is not very strong in Foot, will not hazard an Assault, which may cost him a great many Men; and the rather for that the Besieged have no expectation of Relief, and that the want they are in of Provisions and Water will in a short time oblige them to Capitulate. The Bombs which the Imperialists shoot into the Town have set Fire to several parts of it, but the Inhabitants have still quenched it before it did any great harm. The Turkish Horse that are in the place, not being able to subsist made a Sally, hoping to get through the Imperial Camp, but they were beaten back; and in this occasion the Count de Herberstein and his Lieutenant were wounded. It's said that the Besie-

ged made another Sally on the 30th past, and that several were killed on both sides; and that the Duke of Lorraine had received advice from the Country People, that the Turks who fled from the Battle on 22. past, have posted themselves between Scherowitz and the Danube, about 24 miles from Buda.

Vienna, August 6. Buda holds out still; And the Besieged make very frequent and strong Salleys: In one they made on the 30th past they lost a great many Men; and The Regiment of Starenberg which was in the Trenches suffered very much, and the Major was killed: The Besiegers in the mean time continue their Attacks with great vigor, and do greatly annoy the Enemy with their Cannon and Bombes from St. Gerards Hill; They are making a Bridge over the Danube below Buda. General Leslie having reduced Brezowitz, within two German Miles of Virovitza in Slavonia, is laying a Bridge over the Drave, which he will pass, to join the Imperial Army before Buda. We have advice that the Faithful Hungarians have surprized the Castle of Bongaiz, in which the Turks had a Garison.

Frankfort, August 10. We are told that several Imperial Regiments that are Quartered in the Empire have Orders to march for Hungary; And that the Elector of Bavaria will go thither in Person.

Ratisbonne, Aug. 11. The fourth Instant the Sieur May, one of the Imperial Commissioners, acquainted the Count de Crecy, that the Emperor had received full Power from the King of Spain to accept and conclude in the Name of his Catholick Majesty the Truce of Twenty Years, upon the Conditions proposed by the Most Christian King; and that the Imperial Commissioners had given notice thereof to the Dyet, to the end the King of Spain, his Countries and Dominions, may be included in the Treaty between the Emperor and the Crown of France, under the Guaranty of the Empire. The sixth, the Sieur May communicated to the Count de Crecy the Original Power sent to the Emperor by the King of Spain, and his Imperial Majesties Sub Delegation to his Commissioners here, and left with him Copies of these Instruments; and at the same time the Count de Crecy communicated to him the Power he had from his Most Christian Majesty: The days following the Imperial Commissioners and the Count de Crecy had several Conferences in the Convent of the Dominicans, and having concluded the Treaty of Truce between France and Spain, it was Signed last night by the said Count, and by the Imperial Commissioners in the Name of the King of Spain. We are expecting the return of the Courier which the Imperial Commissioners sent some days ago to Lintz, to have the Emperor's Directions upon the last Propositions of the Count de Crecy concerning the Truce between the Emperor and the Empire, and the Crown of France, which we doubt not will in few days be likewise Signed.

*Hamburg, Aug. 11.* The King of Denmark as we are told parted yesterday from Gottorp in his return to Copenhagen. Our Letters from Stockholm tell us, that the Queen of Sweden was brought to bed the first Instant of a young Prince, who was Christened by the Name of *Ulrich*. The Count de Berka, the Emperor's Ambassador, parted from hence yesterday on his journey for Sweden. From Berlin they write, That the Elector of Brandenburg had received a Letter from the King of Poland, wherein he gives his Electoral Highness an account that he was going to his Army in Pödlia.

*Cologne, Aug. 15.* Several of the Regiments that were encamped at Zons are marched towards the River Erp, and it's believed the rest of the Army will follow in few days. The States of the Circle of Suabia, who are now assembled at Ulm, have resolved to send several Regiments to join the Emperor's Army in Hungary.

*Brussels, Aug. 15.* Monsieur de Chanlay arrived here last Tuesday in the evening, and the same night had Audience of the Marquis de Graná; it's said he came to adjust the Payment of the Contributions, and yesterday he parted again from hence: While he was here, his Excellency received an account by an Express from Ratisbonne, That the Truce between France and Spain was Signed there on Thursday last at night. We have advice that the Marschal de Schomberg having passed the Meuse, is marched through Luxemburg towards Strasburgh, where he is to be the 20th Instant. The Marquis de Foyense continues with the Troops under his Command in the Country of Limburg. We are told that the Elector of Cologne's Forces march towards Liege; That his Electoral Highness has sent one of his Ministers to make some Proposals to the Magistrates of that City; and that he has appointed the States of Liege to meet the 26th Instant at Viser, and that he will be himself present in their Assembly. The Siege of Buda proves a Work of longer time than was expected; the Duke of Lorrain is, it's said, resolved not to hazard his Men in storming of it, seeing the Place must in a short time fall into his hands, having no expectation of Relief.

*Hague, Aug. 18.* Here passes little of moment in the absence of the States of Holland, who are not to re-assemble till the next month: But by an Express from Ratisbonne we have an account that the Treaty of Truce between France and Spain was Signed there the tenth Instant, being the last day of the six weeks allowed by the Treaty Signed here the 29th of June; and that that between the Emperor and the Empire, and his Most Christian Majesty, was likewise concluded. They write from Amsterdam that the Directors of the East-India Company had advice of the arrival of nine of their Ships upon these Coasts, whereof four came from Batavia the 23. of December last, the rest from Ceylon and the Coast.

*Paris, Aug. 19.* On Tuesday last arrived here an Express dispatched by the Count de Crecy, his Most Christian Majesties Plenipotentiary at Ratisbonne, who brought an account that the Treaty for a Twenty Years Truce between this Crown and Spain was Signed there the tenth Instant, with the Inclusion of the Republic of Genoua. It's not doubted the Truce with the Emperor and Empire will quickly follow. There are Letters from Lintz of the eighth Instant, which say they had the News there of the Surrender of Buda, which we hope our next will give us the confirmation of. There happened the last week about Poitiers a kind of a Hurricane, ac-

companied with Hail, which did a great deal of harm, some of the Hailstones are said to have been bigger than Hen-Eggs, and the rest as big as large Nuts. Our Letters from Catalonia inform us, that the 18th of the last month the French Fleet commanded by Monsieur du Quesne, sailed out of the Bay of Roses, and took their course towards Barcelona; and that the same day the Marschal de Belfonds parted from his Camp near Roses, to put his Troops into Quarters of Refreshment upon the Hills, during the great Heats; in his March three or four hundred Miquelets came and skirmished with his Rear-Guard, but several of them were killed, and the rest quickly forced to retire: The Town of Campredon sent to make their submission to the Marschal de Belfonds, the Spanish Garrison that was there having retired into the Castle. Seven Squadrons detached from the Spanish Army, which was encamped on a Hill about a mile from Campredon shewed themselves near that place, but they soon after retired again: When their Letters came away, the Marschal de Belfonds was encamped at Esquiere de Rougea in l'Ampourdan.

*Plimouth, Aug. 8.* This afternoon sailed from hence His Majesties Ship the *Constant Warwick* to the Eastward.

*Winchester, August 2.* The Inhabitants of this City are preparing all things for His Majesty's Reception; and the present Mayor hath got a subscription of 80l.
