**T**HE following Address, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the Reverend Jabez Bunting, was by him presented to Her Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the **QUEEN'S** Most Excellent Majesty.

**WE**, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Ministers of the Wesleyan Methodist connection in Ireland, assembled in our Annual Conference at Cork, beg permission most humbly to address your Majesty, for the purpose of expressing our sincere

condolence with your Majesty, and the other members of the Royal Family, on the mournful occasion of the loss which the British empire has sustained, by the demise of our late most gracious Sovereign, your Majesty's illustrious Uncle, and of offering, at the same time, our most cordial congratulations on your Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

We gladly take this opportunity of tendering to your Majesty the assurance of our heartfelt attachment to the sacred Person of your Majesty, and to that unrivalled constitution and form of Government which, in the order of Divine Providence, you have been called to administer. We have hailed with gratitude and joy your Majesty's seasonable and gracious declarations, officially promulgated, that the constitution of your native country has been, from infancy, the object of your respect and love; and that it will be your unceasing study to maintain the reformed religion as by law established, securing at the same time to all the full enjoyment of religious liberty. It is our firm conviction that, as in former periods, so at present also, the closest connection will be found to subsist between the Protestantism of the land, which acknowledges the Holy Scriptures as at once the basis on which it rests, and the primary instrument of its agency and influence on the one hand, and the interests of genuine freedom, both civil and religious, and the permanent prosperity and happiness of the nation, on the other hand. Under the impression of this sentiment, we, as Ministers of the Gospel, shall diligently endeavour to promote and inculcate, among the people of our charge, those principles of scriptural truth and piety, which, if deeply rooted, by the blessing of God, in the minds and consciences of men, will constitute the best security for the stability of your Majesty's Throne; for the preservation of the just and highly beneficial privileges and authorities assigned by the constitution to each branch of the Legislature; and for the well-regulated liberty, the peaceable be-

haviour, and the affectionate loyalty of your Majesty's subjects in general.

We humbly beg leave, in conclusion, to express our most earnest desire, that Almighty God, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works do proceed, may vouchsafe to your Majesty a prosperous, honourable and peaceful reign; that, in answer to the petitions of a loyal and devoted people, who, as with one heart and voice, unite to make mention of you in their prayers, He may daily replenish you with the grace of his Holy Spirit, endue you plentifully with heavenly gifts, and grant you in health and wealth long to live; and that finally, after this life, you may attain everlasting joy and felicity, and receive that crown of righteousness which never fadeth away.
