

Frankfort, which say a Courier who passed through that place, reported that *Buda* was taken the 9th Instant by Assault, and all the Turks put the Sword; They had the same report at *Raisbonne*, as our Letters from thence of the 14th inform us; but they gave no great credit to it.

Paris, August 23. The last Letters from *Ratisbonne* gave an account, that the Treaty for a 20 years Truce between the Emperor and the Empire and his Most Christian Majesty, would be Signed the 18th Instant. The same Letters inform us, That the Turks in *Buda* make a very great resistance, and seemed resolved to defend the place or to perish in it; That on the other side the Christians began to press them very close, and were preparing things for a general Assault. We have advice from *Venice* that General *Morosini* arrived the 31. past with the Venetian Fleet at *Corfu*, where the Pope's Gallies and those of *Maliba* and *Tuscany* joyned him; That the first being 5 in number, are commanded by General *Brancaccio*, and have on Board 500 Soldiers under the orders of Colonel *Cleuter*, who gained a great reputation in the Siege of *Candia*; That the Gallies of *Maliba* are seven with three Men of War, and have on Board 100 Knights and 1000 Land Soldiers; And that the four Gallies and a great Man of War of the Duke of *Tuscany* have on Board 100 Knights of St. *Stephen*, and 600 Soldiers; That it had been proposed to General *Morosini* to attack *Casfel Nuovo*, because the Conquest of it would be a great means to bring the People of *Albania* under the Dominion of the Republick, to which they are already very much inclined, but that the General having understood that the Turks had put a supply of Men and Provisions into the place, did not think fit to make any attempt upon it, but continued his Course for the *Levant*.

Prestigne in *Radnorshire*, August 4. His Grace the Duke of *Beaufort* having Visited all the Counties in North *Wales*, came this day hither, accompanied with a great number of Gentlemen, he was met by the Gentry of our County, and the Militia Troop at the Confines of the County, and Conducted by them hither, where our Militia Foot were drawn up to attend his Grace's coming; The Gentlemen of this County have made great Preparations for his reception here.

Brecon, August 7. On the 5th Instant his Grace the Duke of *Beaufort* came hither and was received at our Town-Gate by our Bailiff and Common-Council in their Formalities, having been met at the Confines of this County by our High-Sheriff, the Gentlemen, and our County Troop, and by them Conducted to the Hay in our County (where there was a very handsome Entertainment) and thence hither; our Militia were all Clothed in Blue Coats, and were placed to line the Streets, from the one end of the Town to the other to Colonel *Jeffrey's* House, where his Grace lay these two last nights, and was very Nobly Entertained; Yesterday the Town Treated his Grace and all the Company with a very Splendid Dinner, after which his Grace was pleased to accept of being made a Freeman of the Corporation.

Carmarthen, August 9. On the 7th Instant his Grace the Duke of *Beaufort* came from *Brecon*, being accompanied by the High Sheriff and Gentry of that County and their Troop to the Confines of our County, where his Grace was met by our High Sheriff, Gentry, and County Troop, and by them accompanied to the Earl of *Carbery's*, where his Grace was very Nobly Entertained, and from thence came hither yesterday, Sir *Rice Williams*, Colonel of the Militia Foot, had drawn up his Regiment at *Abergwilly* near this Town

in his Grace's way, where in his Tents which were very large, he had prepared a great Entertainment; at his Grace's entrance into our Town, he was attended by the Mayor, and Aldermen in their Formalities, who by their Recorder made their Complement to his Grace: This day his Grace was at *Casfle Emblem* in *Cardiganshire* to view the Militia of that County, where there were very handsome Tents prepared, and a very great and sumptuous Entertainment; This night his Grace returned hither again, and on Monday intends to go from hence to *Pembrokeshire*.

Plimouth, July 7. This day His Majesty's Gracious Charter for Re-incorporating this Ancient Borough, was met five miles out of this Town by William Martyn Esq; the present Mayor, attended on Horse-back with the Twelve Aldermen and Twelve Assistants, and upwards of Three hundred and forty Persons of Quality and Principal Inhabitants, and at the first boundary of the Borough, Edmund Pollexfen Esq; Deputy-Recorder and Town Clerk, delivered the Charter to the Mayor, who joyfully received and carried it in his Hand (being in the Head of all the Company) to the most publick Gate of the Town, where their Standard and Colors displayed, and several Constables, Hiltreeters and Inhabitants waited their coming, and from thence marched before the Mayor to the Town Guild Hall, (with Drums beating, Bells ringing, Town Musick and Waits playing) where the Charter being read, the Mayor was duly sworn and put on his Scarlet Gown, and with his Brethren, accompanied with several Persons of Quality and most of the chief Inhabitants went from thence to his House, the Streets and Windows on each side being crowded with People, who expressed abundant Satisfaction at the sight of their New Charter; And the Mayor upon his coming into his House, immediately began and drank His Sacred Majesty's and Royal Highness's Health, and afterwards the Earl of Bathes, our Recorder, (to whose Intercession with His Majesty, we owe our New Charter and Priviledges) which was also performed by all the Company; and at the same time a private Sign being given to the Royal Citadel, the said Citadel and St. Nicholas Harbour, with the Ships that were there, Fired a very considerable number of great Guns, and the Town concluded the day with Bonfires, ringing of Bells, and other signal demonstrations of true Loyalty and great Joy. The next day the Mayor called a Hall, and having made a very Loyal Speech, Swore all the Aldermen, Assistants, Sergeants at Mace, &c. to the great Satisfaction of this Corporation and all the Loyal Gentry hereabouts.
