THE following Addresses, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address, were by him presented to Her Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of your ancient and loyal City of Exeter, in Council assembled, humbly beg to offer to your Majesty our sincere and respectful condolence on the death of your illustrious Uncle, His late Most Gracious Majesty King William the Fourth.

The unweated interest and concern which His late Majesty at all times displayed in promoting the welfare and happiness of his people, we feel assured will be long and gratefully remembered; but, although we cannot but deplore the loss of so patriotic and good a King, yet we derive consolation in looking forward to much public prosperity and happiness under your Majesty's most gracious sway, and most heartily do we unite in expressing our warmest congratulations on your Majesty's Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors, supported as you are by the loyal affections of all classes of your subjects.

We humbly pray that it may please the Almighty to grant your Majesty many years to wield the sceptre of this powerful empire, and that, under the Divine guidance and protection, your reign may be

glorious to your Majesty, and happy and prosperous to all your subjects.
