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Naples, Aug. 14.
ON Sunday last sailed from hence Two new Gallies, a man of War, Five Tartanes, and several other Vessels laden with Ammunition and Provisions to join the Spanish Fleet; they have on board 500 Soldiers which are to be put ashore at Barcelona, to reinforce the Neapolitan Regiment in Garison there. Several Bagnios have made their peace, and are to serve against the Turks; and two days ago were brought hither the Heads of two of the chief of the Banditi, who had been taken in *Abruzzo*.

Venice, Aug. 11. We have advice of the arrival of the Venetian Fleet before the Fort of *Santa Maura*, which they had begun to attack, and having made themselves Masters of it would continue their course for the *Leyant*. There is a report that General *Molino* has blocked up part of the Turkish Fleet in the Port of *Scio*.

Six Galeasses, commanded by Noble Venetians. 33 men of War, with those under the command of General *Molino* in the *Archipelago*. 24 Petaches, and other small vessels. 4 Fireships, 16 Brigantines Armed. 60 Gallies of *Corfu*, *Zant*, and *Cefalonia*, commanded by Noblemen of those Islands. 4 great Flyboats. 22 Gallies of *Corfica*, *Majorca*, and *Minorca*.

On board the Venetian Ships and Gallies, are 22000 Foot, and 400 mounted Cavalry to land. 600 Noble Venetians. On board the Gallies of *Malta* are 900 Soldiers; On board those of *Tuscany* 600; and on board those of the Pope 300.

Besides the Ships above-mentioned, there lately sailed from hence three men of War, and 28 Petaches, and other Vessels, laden with Ammunition and Provisions, commanded by the Sieur *Membo*, a Noble Venetian.

Dantzick, August 16. They write from *Crauw* of the 29th past that since the defeat of the

Convey which the Turks endeavoured to put into *Caminiec*, the Poles and Cossacks have beaten a strong Party of Tartars, who designed to have made a ravage in *Rodolia*, that many of them were killed upon the Place, and several hundred taken Prisoners; That the King of *Poland* was at *Zolkiew* and had there kept the Feast of *St. James*; And that the Pope's Nuncio had on that day presented his Majesty from the Pope a Scepter with Diamonds and Pearl, and the Queen a Ring of Diamonds, to a very great jubilation; and afterwards the King entertained the Nuncio, the Imperial and Venetian Ambassadors, with all the Senators and other great Men that were at Court in the Tents of the Grand Vizier, at *Piscina*, which for that purpose were set up in the Garden of the Palace; That the King intended to go from thence in few days to the Army, which we are told will besides the Cossacks consist of above 10000 fighting men; The Troops of *Poland* were encamped near *Putko* and those of *Lithuania* were marching to join them.

Vienne, Aug. 13. We have Letters from the Imperial Camp before *Buda* of the 10th instant, which tell us, that they had that Morning sprung several Mines, and intended the night following to spring two more; That the 6th a Christian who was a prisoner, got out of the Town, and being brought to the Duke of *Lorraine*, gave him assurance, that the *Bassa Kara Mahomet* was wounded the day before, as he was viewing a Battery, that there was a great consternation among the Inhabitants, but that the Garrison were resolved to defend that place to the last, being encouraged by the report of some Defectors of the Regiment of *Froy*, who assured them that the Imperial Army was much weakened, and wanted Foot very much. General *Leslie* having finished his Bridge over the *Drave*, near *Duranavitz*, intended to pass it the 5th instant. The Seraskier, or Turkish General, who was defeated near *Buda*, hath posted himself with his remaining Troops near the Bridge of *Essecke*. From upper *Hungary* we hear that Count *Teskeley* hath taken the Castle of *Punock*.

Cologne, Aug. 22. The Forces of our Elector continue their march towards *Liege*, being commanded by Monsieur de *Choiseul*; who we are told, hath had a long Conference with Monsieur *Spaen*, Governor of *Cleves* for the Elector of *Brandenburg*. From *Munick* they write, that the Elector of *Bavaria* had ordered part of his Forces to march for *Hungary*, and intended to follow thither in person. The Marschal de *Schomberg* arrived the 16th Instant at *Strasbourg*.

Hamburg, August 22. Yesterday arrived here the Sieur *Meinders* whom the Elector of *Brandenburg* does send in quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the King of *Denmark*. Our Letters from *Poland* tell us that that King parted the second Instant from *Zolkiew*, intending to go directly to the Army which was encamped near *Putko*, and had Orders to march towards *Caminiec*. The King of *Denmark* parted on Saturday last from *Gottorp* in his return to *Copenhagen*.

Amsterdam,

Amsterdam, Aug. 25. The Letters from *Liege* of the 23 instant tell us, that the *Sieur de la Raudiere*, the French Resident, had that day delivered a Letter from his most Christian Majesty to the Magistrates of that City, and at the same time had let them know, that the Elector of *Cologne*, their Prince, having acquainted his Majesty, that his Troops were marching towards that City, his Majesty did think it expedient for their own good, as well as for the preserving the Peace of those parts, That the said Magistrates and Commonalty of *Liege* did forthwith make the submission that became them, to his Electoral Highness; and that thereupon the Magistrates had assembled the 32 Trudes, or Companies, who it was believed, would resolve to comply with what his Electoral Highness requires of them. The *East-India* Ships for the account of the Chamber here, are safely arrived; those for *Zeland* are past by, and we have advice that one is arrived in the *Maese*.

Hague, August 25. The *Sieur Norff* the Elector of *Cologne's* Minister here hath presented a Memorial to the States-General, wherein he acquaints them; That the Troops of his Electoral Highness are on their march towards *Liege*, to reduce that City to their Duty; and prays them not to have any jealousy of the march of the said Troops, and to be assured that they will not give any disturbance to their Subjects or Territories; adding, that his Electoral Highness, to let them see how desirous he is to live in a perfect union and friendship with this State, does offer to enter into a strict Alliance with them, for the mutual defence and preservation of their several Countries and Dominions, and to determine amicably the Pretensions and Differences which may be depending between them; upon which the States have named Commissioners to enter into Conference with his Electoral Highness's said Minister. On the other side, the Magistrates of *Liege* have written to the States-General, praying them to employ their good Offices and Interposition, for the accommodating Matters between his Electoral Highness and that City; upon which, the States have resolved to send his Electoral Highness a Copy of the said Letter, and to let him know, that though they desire nothing more, than that the Peace may be preserved in their neighborhood, yet they are unwilling to interpose in the Affairs between his Electoral Highness and the City of *Liege*, without his consent and good liking; and have ordered an Answer to be returned to the Letter of the Magistrates of *Liege*, to the same effect. The Prince of *Orange* continues at *Dielen*, but we are told his Highness will return hither about the 5 of the next Month, when the States of *Holland* are to reassemble; He has sent the *Heer Vander Hooge* to *Leerwaerden* to compliment the Prince of *Nassau*, Stadtholder of *Friesland* and *Groningen*, upon his Marriage with the Princess of *Anhalt*. The *East-India* Ships, of whose arrival upon these Coasts we gave you an account in our last, are all come in. There are Letters from *Linz* of the 15th Instant which tells us that an Express was arrived there from the Imperial Camp with an account that *Buda* was taken the 9th Instant by assault; That the Duke of *Serbia* had given the Town to the pillage of the Soldiers for three days, and that on the 13th his Highness entered the place, 600 Turkish Officers marching before him with their Hands tied upon their Back; and that he had put the Regiment of *Grana* into the Castle. We must expect the further particulars.

Paris, Aug. 28. An Express, who arrived Two days ago from *Germany*, brought the News that *Buda* was taken the 9th Instant by Assault, most of the Turks that were in it being put to the Sword: The Christians have lost a great many Men, and several Persons of quality.

There is a report likewise of a Fight at Sea between the Venetians and the Turks, in which the latter were defeated, but we know not yet the particulars. The Truce between the Empire and this Crown was signed at *Ratisbonne* the 18th Instant.

Exeter, Aug. 24. The last week there was an account given of the joyful Reception of His Majesties Gracious new Charter of *Plimouth*, to the great satisfaction of the Inhabitants, and all Loyal persons in the Country; and particularly to their neighbor Town, the Antient and most Loyal Burrough of *Salt-Asb*, who have long since, without any *Quo Warranto*, freely of their own accord, Turrendred their old Charter into His Majesties hands, who hath been Graciously pleased to Grant the said Loyal Corporation a new Royal Charter, with greater Privileges then formerly; which they now enjoy in great Tranquility, with all Duty and Thankfulness to His most Sacred Majesty, under the good Government of a Prudent Loyal Mayor and Magistrates, and the Right Honourable *Charles Lord Lansdowne* their Recorder. Since that the City of *Exeter*, always eminent for Loyalty, have by Letter from their Chamber to his Grace the Duke of *Albemarle* their Lord-Lieutenant, declared with unanimous consent, to lay also their Charter at His Majesties Feet, by a voluntary and general surrender thereof, in such manner as shall be most acceptable to His Majesty. And the Town of *Lanceston* in *Cornwall* have also unanimously signified the same Dutiful and Loyal Resolutions concerning their Charter, to the Right Honourable the Earl of *Bath*, their Lord-Lieutenant and Recorder; which good example it is believed, will be followed by all the Corporations in *Devonshire* and *Cornwall*.

Deal, August 17. Yesterday arrived in the Downs the *Josiah* and the *Kempthorne* from the *East-Indies*.

Portsmouth, August 17. This Morning arrived at Spithead His Majesties Ships the *Mary Rose* Captain *Asbby*, the *Centurian* Captain *Wren*, and the *Swan* Captain *Hobson* from the Downs.

Plimouth, August 15. On Wednesday last arrived here the *Greyhound* Frigate bound for the *Streights*. The *Phanix* is Sailed to the Eastward.
