AT the Court at *Buckingham-Palace*, the 11th day of *December 1837*,

PRESENT,

The **QUEEN's** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of His Majesty King George the Fourth cap. seventy-seven, intituled "An Act to authorise His Majesty, under certain circumstances, to regulate the duties and drawbacks on goods imported or exported in foreign vessels, and to exempt certain foreign vessels from pilotage;" His Majesty is authorised, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, or by His Majesty's Order or Orders in Council, to be published, from time to time, in the London Gazette, to authorise the importation into, or exportation from, the United Kingdom, or from any other of His Majesty's dominions, of any goods, wares, or merchandize which may be legally imported or exported in foreign vessels, upon payment of such and the like duties only, and with the like drawbacks, bounties, and allowances as are charged or granted upon similar goods, wares, or merchandize when imported or exported in British vessels; provided always, that before any such Order or Orders shall be issued, satisfactory proof shall have been laid before His Majesty and His Privy Council that goods, wares, and merchandize imported into, or exported from, the foreign country in whose favour such remission of duties, or such

drawbacks, bounties, or allowances shall be granted, are charged with the same duties, and are allowed the same drawbacks, bounties, or allowances when imported into, or exported from, such foreign country in British vessels, as are levied or allowed on similar goods, wares, and merchandize when imported or exported in vessels of such country:

And whereas by an Act, passed in the fifth year of His Majesty George the Fourth, cap. one, intituled "An Act to indemnify all persons concerned in advising, issuing, or acting under a certain Order in Council for regulating the tonnage duties on certain foreign vessels; and to amend an Act of the last session of Parliament, for authorising His Majesty, under certain circumstances, to regulate the duties and drawbacks on goods imported or exported in any foreign vessels;" His Majesty is authorised, in certain cases, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, or by His Majesty's Order or Orders in Council, to be published, from time to time, in the London Gazette, to permit and authorise the entry into any port or ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of any other of His Majesty's dominions, of any foreign vessels, upon payment of such and the like duties of tonnage only as are or may be charged or granted upon, or in respect of, British vessels:

And whereas a treaty of commerce and navigation between Her Majesty and the King of the Netherlands was signed at the Hague, on the twenty-seventh

October last, and ratified on the twenty-second November last :

And whereas satisfactory proof has been laid before Her Majesty and Her Privy Council, that goods, wares, and merchandize imported into, or exported from, the dominions of the King of the Netherlands are charged with the same duties, and are allowed the same drawbacks, bounties, or allowances when imported or exported in British vessels as are levied or allowed on similar goods, wares, and merchandize when imported into, or exported from, the said dominions of the King of the Netherlands in Dutch vessels, and that British vessels are charged with no other or higher tonnage duties on their entrance into the ports of the dominions of the King of the Netherlands than are levied on Dutch vessels :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the Acts above recited, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the date hereof, Dutch vessels entering or departing from the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, together with the cargoes on board the same (such cargoes consisting of articles which may be legally imported or exported), shall not be subject to any other or higher duties or charges whatever than are or shall be levied on British vessels entering or departing from such ports, or on similar articles when imported into, or exported from, such ports in British vessels; and also, that such articles, when exported from the said ports in Dutch vessels, shall be entitled to the same bounties, drawbacks, and allowances that are granted on similar articles when exported in British vessels.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend an Act for the regulation of municipal cor-

porations in England and Wales," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that if the inhabitant householders of any town or borough in England or Wales shall petition His Majesty to grant to them a charter of incorporation, it shall be lawful for His Majesty by any such charter, if he shall think fit, by the advice of His Privy Council, to grant the same, to extend to the inhabitants of any such town or borough within the district to be set forth in such charter, all the powers and provisions of the Act of the fourth and fifth of William the Fourth, cap. 76, for regulating corporations, whether such town or borough be or be not a corporate town or borough, or be or be not named in either of the schedules to the said Act; provided, nevertheless, that notice of every such petition, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by His Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, one month at least before such petition shall be so considered.

And whereas the inhabitant householders of the borough of Chatham, have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, praying a charter of incorporation for the said borough.

Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be taken into consideration, by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on Wednesday the thirty-first day of January next, at twelve of the clock at noon.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dividing the parish of St. Clement, Ipswich, into ecclesiastical districts, under the 21st section of the 58th Geo. 3, cap. 45 :

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 18th day of November 1837. present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the

whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, passed in the Parliament holden in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the Parliament holden in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the

Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the Parliament holden in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, stating that, when the last census was taken, the parish of St. Clement, Ipswich, in the county of Suffolk, and diocese of Norwich, contained a population of 4,779 persons; that besides the parish church, which affords accommodation for 900 persons, there is one chapel, recently erected, in the said parish, by the patron and incumbent of the said parish, called Trinity Chapel, which affords accommodation for 750 persons, including 250 free seats, appropriated to the use of the poor; that the said chapel has been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:

And whereas the said Commissioners have further represented to Her Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that the said parish should be divided into ecclesiastical districts, under the 21st section of the Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and that one of the said districts should be assigned to the said Chapel, called Trinity Chapel, for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving the said chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the district attached to the said Chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein, and that such district should be named the Trinity District, with boundaries as follows:

The boundary line commences at the west side of the first house in the hamlet of Wix Ufford, now or lately occupied by William Meadows, and adjoining a house in Fore-street, Saint Clements, now or late the property of Mrs. Kennedy, widow; between these two houses, and from the front of them, the line is drawn to the north-east corner of Mrs. Kennedy's garden wall (A), where it forms an angle with a wall at the back of several premises in New-street, and is continued eastward in the direction of that wall to Long-lane, crossing the lane, it passes by the side of a house now or late occupied by Abraham Giles, and from thence follows the line of the fence which separates towards the north the premises now or late John Canham's from a field now or late Mrs. Gooding's, widow, till it meets the fence which separates Canham's property on the east, from the property now or late Nathaniel Byles, Esq. and making an angle at (B), follows the line of this last

named fence southwards, to the road leading from Ipswich to Foxhall; then ascends in the line of that road a few yards toward the east, and is continued in the direction of the boundary fence which is the east of the garden of the premises now or late of Mrs. Doves, widow; then making an angle at (C), proceeds westward in the direction of that part of the same boundary which is towards the south, and after making a small deviation at (D), is continued in the same direction till it meets the hedge bounding the glebe of the Rector of Saint Helen's towards the east; it follows this boundary southwards, till it meets at (E), the boundary of the premises now or late Francis Fisk's, and then follows the direction of the same boundary, first towards the north-east, and afterwards a few yards towards the south-east, and then making an angle, is continued straight in the direction of a wall bounding the back part of several cottages towards the north-east, the fronts of which abut on the road from Ipswich to Trimley, till it meets at (F), the boundary of the premises of the public house, called the White Elm, and following this boundary, bends towards the north-east, then towards the east, and takes in a row of cottages now or late occupied by — Turner, — England, — Page, — Smith, — Burch; then forming an angle at (G), is continued in the line of a hedge bending towards the north and north-east, and separating two fields now or late the property of Charles Cobbold, Esq. then follows the boundary towards north-east of the farm yard of the residence of the said Charles Cobbold, Esq. called Rose-hill, and turning at the corner of that boundary, at (H), and following it afterwards in a straight line, where it skirts the garden and plantation in the road from Ipswich to Trimley; an angle is here formed at (I), and the line is continued straight in the direction of the last mentioned road, a few rods towards the north-west, till it crosses the road at (K), opposite the corner of the boundary fence of the premises, now or late the property of John Rivett, follows that fence first toward the south-east, then toward south-west, then south-east, then nearly west, till it forms an angle with, and follows the direction of, the boundary of the garden now or late occupied by Joseph Cauham, toward the south-west, then follows the boundary of a field with a brick kiln, now or late occupied by Francis Fisk, toward the north-east, south-east, and north-east, and then nearly toward the south; here it terminates in a road leading from Ipswich to the Cliff and the Holywells, forms an angle at a malting, now or late occupied by John Cobbold, Esq. is continued in the line of the road in front of the malting, and of some cottages abutting on the road, and crossing the end of Albion street, passes in front of a public house called the New Inn; here another angle is formed, and is continued in the line bounding the premises of the New Inn, toward the north-west, then proceeds at the back of several courts in Albion street, turns for a few yards towards the north-east, and again to the north-west, then follows the line of wall bounding various premises in Albion street, toward the north-west, then inclining a little more toward the west makes an angle at (L), and follows the wall at the back of a court, communicating with the hamlet of Wix Bishop, and abutting upon

the garden now or late in the occupation of William Page, towards the south-west, north-west, south-west, and south-east; an angle is then formed at (M), and it is continued in the direction of a wall, at the back of the premises, of a row of houses in the last mentioned hamlet, and bounding those premises towards the south-west, being continued in the direction of this boundary, a small break is made towards the south-east, the south-west, and then towards the west; it then passes at the back of the premises of a public house called the Welcome Sailor, and crossing the end of Duke-street, to the entrance, at (N), of a yard containing two maltings, a cinder oven, and cottages, now or late the property of John Cobbold, Esq. passes straight down to the river at (O), follows the bank of the river until it comes at (P) in a line with the west side of a malting, now or late occupied by William Archer, takes in that malting, and crossing the Fore street, ends where it began at the junction of the houses of Mrs. Kennedy and William Meadows, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan annexed to the said representation, and therein colored green.

That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Norwich has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of His Majesty King George the Third, and, in testimony of such approbation, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed the said instrument; and humbly praying, that Her Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Her royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to Her Majesty shall seem meet:

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, together with the plan thereto annexed, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
