greater part of the rebels dispersed, but others remained, and fired from the church and adjacent houses, which were taken without much loss.

I continued my march to Saint Benoit, Grand Brulé, this morning; a section of the country in which more outrages had been committed than in any other part of the country, since the commencement of the revolt.

It appears that the rebel army dispersed yesterday; and this morning the peasantry, which have been

On the appearance of the Queen's troops, the assembled, are bringing in their arms to Headquarters; and, I have reason to believe that, in every part of the country the habitans have returned to their houses, and that the revolt has been completely put down. Our loss has been inconsiderable; the details of the march I shall take an early opportunity of communicating to you.
