And those Ladies who are to be presented are hereby informed, that it is absolutely necessary that their names, together with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be sent into the Lord Chamberlain's Office, two clear days before the Drawing-Room, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no

presentation shall take place, unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered, as before directed, corresponding with the names sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office.

THIS day the following Addresses were presented to Her Majesty, at the Levee, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address; which Her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.
May it please your Majesty,

CALLED at an early age, by the allwise disposer of events, to watch over and direct, as far as they are permitted to be influenced by human agency, the destines of this great kingdom, and to affect, in no slight degree, the general polity of all civilized nations, your Majesty ascends the Throne of England under circumstances (as it appears to us, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the city of Gloucester, in Council assembled) of great and almost unprecedented difficulty. Upon the general nature of these difficulties, their causes and tendencies, we do not presume to offer an opinion; but in expressing our loyalty and devoted attachment to your Majesty's Person and Throne, we trust that we may (without subjecting ourselves to the charge of inconsistency, or indecorous interference in the affairs of Government) declare ourselves to be the advocates and firm supporters of that doctrine, which chiefly recognizes the loyalty of a subject in his obedience to the laws and institutions of his country, and his happiness in the contentment which such obedience is in
