

but were repulsed with great loss; however, the same day in the Evening they made another, which was as unsuccessful to them as the former; for the Battalions of *Souches*, *Beck*, and *Neubourg* coming to the timely assistance of those that guarded the Trenches, they beat back the Enemy with a great slaughter; in this occasion the Lieutenant Colonel of *Souches* was killed with a Cannon Bullet, and we lost several of her Officers, and about forty Soldiers; That they earnestly expected the Bavarian Troops; that in the mean time for want of Foot, the Town was so far open on the side of the *Danube*, that the Besieged supplied themselves with Water from thence; but that when the succors were arrived, the Besiegers would likewise shut them up on that side, and after that, according to the report of the Deserters, they would not be able to hold out above three or four days. The Letters add, that the Imperial Troops suffer very much by certain malignant distempers, which begin to reign in the Army. We have just now advice, that Colonel *Houster* being sent out with 5000 Imperial Horse towards *Alba Regalis*, otherwise called *Stoel Weissenberg*, had met, and defeated a body of Turks, which the Governor of that place sent to join the Serasquier Bassa.

Francfort, Septemb. 9. Our last Letters from *Hungary* informed us, that the Duke of *Lorraine* being taken ill with a Fever, had been obliged to retire to a place near the Camp, called the *Old Town*, leaving the chief Command of the Army in his absence to General *Rabata*; That they expected in few days the conjunction of the Bavarian Troops, and hoped after that, to be quickly masters of *Buda*: That in the mean time the Besieged continue to make very desperate Sallies, but that they had had no great success in two they made on the 28th past, having been repulsed both times with considerable loss. We have likewise advice, that the Serasquier Bassa hath endeavoured to force Count *Lesty* from his Bridge, which he had laid over the *Drave* near *Tyrannowitz*, but that he had been repulsed with the loss of 5 or 6000 Men. We are told from *Ratisbonne*, that the Count *de Creecy* hath received his most Christian Majesties Ratification of the Truce with *Spain*.

Hamburg, September 9. A great Conference is going to be held between the Ministers of the King of *Denmark*, the Elector of *Brandenburg* and the Princes of *Lunenbourg* at *Itzebee*; and the general Discourse is that they are to Treat of a defensive Alliance for the preservation of the Circle of the Lower *Saxony*. Our Letters from *Poland* tell us the Troops of *Lithuania* had joyed those of the *Crown*, making together an Army of 50000 men; and that the King was marching at the head of them towards the *Niester*, which he intended to pass, and to advance towards the *Danube*, which will doubtless put the Turks into a great consternation, and make the Grand Signior hardly think himself safe at *Adrianople*. And that the Cossacks were appointed to observe the Tartars and to hinder their conjunction with the Turks.

Cologne, September 12. The 15 Instant the Elector of *Cologne* will begin his Journey for *Liege*, where great preparations are making for his Reception. The 15 Instant. Died at *Wirtzburg* the Bishop of that Name after a Sickness of 10 days. There are Letters from *Hungary* which say the Elector of *Bavaria's* Troops have joyed the Imperial Army before *Buda*.

Brussels, September 7. On Wednesday last arrived here an Express from *Madrid* with the King of *Spain's* Ratification of the Truce which the Marquis *de Grana* sent immediately forward by an other Express to *Ratisbonne* where it is to be exchanged with that of his Most Christian Majesty. The States of *Brabant* have agreed to pay their part of the Contributions demanded by the French which comes to a Million two hundred and seventy Thousand Florins, the whole being about six Millions; And the other Provinces are likewise taking care to satisfy their quota's of the said Contributions, so that, we doubt not, but this matter will now be settled in few days. Our Letters from *Hungary* tell us that the Imperial Troops were marching from all parts to join the Army before *Buda*: That in the mean time the Besiegers had sprung a Mine with good success, that they had three others ready, and that all things were preparing for a vigorous attack against the arrival of the *Bavarian* Forces; That the Duke of *Lorraine* having sent a Detachment of 5 or 6000 Horse towards *Alba Regalis* they had met and defeated a great Body of Turks, of which we expect the particulars.

Plimouth, September 5. His Majesties Ship the *St. David*, Captain *Rooks* Commander arrived here the 31 past from the *Streights*, and Sailed again, two days ago, to the Eastward.

Portsmouth, September 9. Yesterday came to an Anchor at *Spithead* His Majesties Ship the *Phoenix*, Capt. *Tyrrel* Commander.
