Now, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the authority thereby vested in Her Majesty in that behalf, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order and direct, that from henceforth the assizes and sessions under the commissions of gaol delivery, and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and crimical business, in and for the county of Suffolk, shall be holden as follows, that is to say, in the summer, in the town of Ipswich, and in the spring, in the town of Bury St. Edmunds, in the said county.

And the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled " An Act for " rendering more easy the taking the poll at " county elections," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing, that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying, that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county. riding parts, or division; and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in

quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An " Act to settle and determine the division of counties, " and the limits of cities and boroughs, in England " and Wales, in so far as respects the election of " Members to serve, in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the peace acting in and for the parts of Lindsey, in the county of Lincoln, assembled at a general quarter sessions of the peace held at Louth, in and for the said parts, on the tenth of April one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, have presented their petition to Her Majesty, representing, that the number of polling places for the said parts is insufficient, and therefore praying, that the town of Alford in the said parts of Lindsey, may be a polling place for the said parts:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act of the seventh year of His said late Majesty's reign, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that the town of Alford shall be a polling place for the said parts; and further, that the justices of the peace for the said county, assembled in quarter sessions or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His late Majesty's reign, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide the said parts into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.
