Genova, September 2.

THe Spanish and Genouese Gallies, 33 in number, sailed from hence the 27th of the last Month, and are, as it's said, gone for *Port Mahon*. The 28th sailed the *Diamond* for *Alicant*, and the *Leuans Merchant* for the *Madeira*. The *Four-Brothers* and the *Lion* are lading here for the Coast of Spain; and several other English Merchant Ships are now in this Port.

Madrid, August 21. On Saturday last arrived here an Express with the Treaty of Truce signed at *Rabubine*; upon which the Council of State was assembled, where it was resolved that the said Treaty should be Ratified, which was accordingly done, and the Express sent back with the Ratification. The Count de *Togolludo*, Son of the Duke de *Medina Celi*, is made General of the Gallies of *Naples*, and will part from hence in few days for *Barcelona*, (where the Spanish Gallies are expected from *Genova*) to take possession of that Command. The Duke d'*Osuna* is retired to his house at *Penafiel*, where he will stay till he has leave to come to Court.

Turin, September 1. The 26th past *Charles Berkeley Esq.* Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, to Complement the Duke and Dutches of *Savoy* upon their Marriage, was Conducted to his Audience with the usual Ceremonies. On Monday last the Duke of *Savoy* went to see some of his Troops Exercise at *Chevasque*. The Count de *Soissons* is arrived here from France.

Francfort, September 15. On the third Instant the Elector of *Bavaria* parted from *Vienna*, and the next day arrived at *Presburg* with his Infantry and Train of Artillery, the 5th. He parted again from thence, purposing to be the 7th at *Gran*, where he would disembark his Men and Artillery, and his Horse, who marched by Land and passed by *Vienna* the 6th Instant, having joyned him; He would march them in a Body to *Buda*; so that we reckon his Electoral Highness joyned the Imperial Army the 9th or 10th Instant. Our last Letters from the Camp told us, the Duke of *Lorraine* continued indisposed with a Fever; but that they hoped the worst was past, and that the Duke de *Cr y*, and the Commissary General *Breiner*, have both been forced by sickness to leave the Army; That the Duke of *Lorraine* had received advice, that the *Serafquier* Bassa intended to repair the Bridge of *Esseke* with the Army he has with him, consisting of 30000 men, and to attempt the relief of *Buda*; but that

General *Leslie* had assured his Highness he would very closely observe the Enemy, and if they moved towards *Buda* he would not fail to be in their Rear. We have an account from *Vienna* that 10 Half-Cannon and a great quantity of Ammunition have been lately sent from thence to the Army; and that they were in hourly expectation to hear from the Camp of some great action, which would be undertaken upon the coming up of the Bavarian Forces. The Pope's Nuncio at *Vienna* hath received a great sum of Money from the Pope to be employed in the War against the Turks.

Ratisbonne, September 14. Yesterday were exchanged here the Ratifications of the Truce betwixt the Emperor and the Empire and the Most Christian King. Last Monday in the Evening passed by here 10 Companies of Foot of the Troops of *Suabia*, and the rest are expected every hour, they are going for *Hungary* to joyn the Imperial Army, and will make together about 4000 Men; We are told that the States of *Franconia* are likewise sending thither two Regiments. Our Letters from *Hungary* tell us, that the Elector of *Bavaria* was expected at *Gran* the 7th Instant, near which place his whole Army was to Rendezvous, and from thence he would march at the head of them to *Buda*, where, it's believed, he arrived the 9th Instant. Our last Letters from the Camp, said, the Army suffered very much by Sickness; and that the Enemy had on the 23. past ruined the Works which the Besiegers had made for the cutting off the communication between the Town and the River, the Christians not being able to maintain them for want of Foot; but which they assure us, that the Turks have lost a great many Men in their Sallies, and that in one they made the second Instant 600 of them were killed and wounded, and that things are in that condition in the Town, that it cannot hold out much longer.

Cologne, September 15. A Letter from the Imperial Army before *Buda* of the third Instant gives the following Account. The first Instant the Turks made a very strong Sally in the night, which they had not done before, and fell upon our Dragoons, who did not expect them, of whom they slew about 150 with little loss on their side; The next morning they made another great Sally with Horse and Foot but we having timely notice of it, were in posture to receive them, and some Regiments that had the next Post, advancing to the assistance of those that had the Guard of the Trenches, the Turks after an obstinate fight were beaten back with a great slaughter, and we took several Prisoners; by whom we understand, that the Besieged are resolved to Capitulate if they be not speedily relieved. Colonel *Heusser*, who was sent out with

At his strong Batta towards *Alba Regalis*, returned the 11th Instant with a great Booty, having defeated a Convoy that was going to the Turkish Army, and taken 400 Wagons laden with Corn, and 1000 head of Cattle. He run a great hazard in venturing to pass a Morass and a River near *Alba Regalis*, for at his return he found the Turks of that place had secured the Passages; upon which he made a shew of marching another way that he might draw the Enemy after him, and so oblige them to quit their Post; which succeeded accordingly, for the Turks followed him; and then he fell upon them, slew a great many of them, and put the rest to flight.

Hamburgh, September 12. The Princes of *Lunenburgh* have, it is said, appointed a general review of their Troops to be held the 18th Instant, and there is a discourse that the Republick of *Venice* is treating with them for 10000 Men. From *Dresden* they write that the Elector of *Saxony* has offered to assist the Emperor with five Regiments, upon condition his Imperial Majesty maintain them while they are in his Service, and when he has no farther occasion for them, that he redeliver them compleat to his Electoral Highness. Our Letters from *Cracow* give an account, that the Turks upon the advance of the Polish Army, have abandoned the Fortress of *Jassy* in *Podolia*; That the Troops of *Lithuania*, which are above 20000 Men have joyned the Forces of the Crown; And that the King of *Poland* hath ordered several Bridges to be laid over the *Nieister*. The Marriage between the Electoral Prince of *Brandenburg* and the Princess of *Hanover* is concluded.

Brussels, September 19. On Saturday last a Party of French Horse came into the Neighborhood of this City, and carried away the Corn and all the Forage they could find. The States of this Province being then Assembled, immediately agreed to pay the Contributions demanded by the French, and sent four of their Members, two to Monsieur de *Foyouffe's* Camp at *Boneste*, and two to Monsieur de *la Truffe* at *Deynse*, to offer Security for the payment of the same. The States of *Flanders* have likewise agreed to raise their Quota of the said Contributions; and those of *Haynault*, *Namur*, *Gelderland* and *Limburg*, are now Assembled for the same purpose. We are told the French Troops are retired out of the Country called the *Free of Bruges*, upon their having settled the payment of their Contributions; And we hope that in a day or two they will quit all the Spanish Territories. The Letters from *Vienna* that should have come in this day are not yet arrived, so that we have no fresh News concerning the Siege of *Buda* which we have reason to believe will not last much longer, our last advices from the Imperial Camp, telling us they doubted not to be Masters of the place within few days after the Elector of *Bavaria* had joyned them with his Forces.

Bagae, September 19. The States of *Holland* and *West Frizeland* have resolved to Disband the Recruits that were raised in the Year 1682, being 1446 Horse and 9042 Foot, and that they shall be paid to the 20th of the next Month. On Friday last the Treaty of Commerce between the Crown of *Denmarke* and this State, was Concluded and Signed by the Baron *Fuels*, that King's Ambassador, and

the Deputies of the States General Authorized for that purpose. We have an account that the six Dutch Merchant Ships that were lately taken and carried into *Cadix* by the Admiral *Papachin*, being laden with Naval Stores for *Toulon*, have been unladen, and the Goods Confiscated, but the Ships released. They write from *Liege* of the 15th Instant, that off the 11th two Persons were beheaded there, who had been the principal Promoters of the late Tumults and Disorders in that City; That the two Burghermasters, *Renardi* and *Masors* were kept close Prisoners, and have been several times examined; and that they began to work for the rebuilding the Citadel, which will be made much larger than it was before. The States of *Utrecht* have agreed to the Disbanding the Recruits above-mentioned.

Paris, September 16. The Court will part from *Versailles* on Monday next for *Chambor*, where they will not stay above 9 or 10 days, and then return to pass the next Month at *Fountainbleau*, from whence they will remove to *St Germain*, and continue there till the new Buildings that are making at *Versailles* are finished. The French Gallies returned to *Marseilles* only to put ashore their sick Men, and to take others in their stead, as well as to be furnished with Provisions, and, having done this they were to sail again the third Instant to *Algiers*. Monsieur *du Casne* who staid for them at the Isles of *Hieres*. The Army commanded by the Marschal de *Belfonds* has taken Quarters of Refreshment in *Roufflon*, but none of the Officers have permission to leave their Commands till the Ratifications of the Truce are exchanged. Two Men of War are appointed to carry home the *Algierian* Ambassadors that are now at *Marseilles*. The last advices from *Buda* give great hopes of the reduction of that place, upon the arrival of the *Bavarian* Troops, which it is believed joyned the Imperial Army the 7th or 8th of this Month.
