TATHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for " rendering more easy the taking the poll at "county elections" it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privv Council, from time to time, on petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing, that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying, that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division, of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled " An " Act to settle and determine the division of counties, " and the limits of cities and boroughs, in England " and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the peace acting in and for the county of Chester, assembled at the Court of general quarter sessions of the peace, held at Nether Knutsford, in and for the said. county, on the second day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, have presented their petition to Her Majesty, representing, that the number of polling places for the northern division of the said county is insufficient, and therefore praying, that Mottran in Longdendale, in the said county, may be a polling place for the said northern division:

said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act of the seventh year of the reign of His said late Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that Mottram in Longdendale shall be a polling place for the said northern division; and further, that the justices of the peace for the said county, assembled in quarter sessions or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide the said northern division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.
