*Buckingham-Palace, August 15, 1838.*

**T**HE Queen was this day graciously pleased to invest Sir William Woods, Knt. Garter Principal King of Arms, with the gold chain and badge of that office, and to deliver to him the sceptre of Garter.

*Whitehall, August 9, 1838.*

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Charles-Arthur-Hill Heaton (formerly Charles-Arthur-Hill Ellis, and latterly usually described and known as Charles Heaton or Charles Ellis Heaton), of Mortimer-street, Cavendish-square, in the county of Middlesex, Esq. Her royal licence and authority that he and his issue may henceforth reassume and use the surname of Ellis (being the antient surname of his family), in addition to and after that of Heaton, he having, by the death of his elder brothers, succeeded to certain family estates, under entails created by the wills of his great grandfather, the Reverend John Ellis, D.D. and of his grandfather, Brabazon Ellis, Esq.

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms, otherwise to be void and of none effect.
