Leopol, August 28.

WE have advice that the 23. Instant the King of Poland arrived with the whole Army at *Buczacs*; and that the same day he sent a great detachment to *Faslowic*, to Summon the Place, and in case it was not Surrendered, to attack it; That the Governor returned at first a very fierce Answer; but the Poles making an Assault, the Enemy Capitulated, and there marched out 500 Men. The King has sent a strong Party towards *Camiwic*, which makes us believe his Majesty will besiege that place.

From Count Leslie's Camp at Turannovitz, August, 27. 1684.

On Wednesday last our General received Letters, by an Express, from the Duke of *Lorraine*, and therein Orders, to march with the four German Regiments that are here to joyn the Imperial Army before *Buda*, and to leave the Croats to cover these Parts; which he has not yet complied with, for that the Serasquier Bassa, having in vain attempted to force our Camp, has posted his Army at *Bresowitz*, within two hours march of us, and that it might be feared the Croats, after the departure of the Germans, would not be able to make head against the Turks, who would then be at liberty to make their Incurfions into *Sclavonia* and *Siria*. We were two days agoe reinforced with 1000 Croats more; and are expecting the rest of the Troops of the Arrierban of *Croatia*, when these have joyned us, as likewise some Imperial Troops from *Copranis*, our General will go and attack the Turks in their Camp; but if he find the Enemy move towards *Buda*, he will hasten to joyn the Duke of *Lorraine*.

Vienna, September 10. This day was observed here the Anniverfary of the Deliverance of this City by the Victorious Arms of the Emperor, the King of *Poland*, and divers Princes of the Empire; There was a general Procession of all the Clergy Secular and Regular, at which the Emperor assisted on foot with the Nobility, and the Sovereign Courts in their Robes, after which all the Cannon of the Town was thrice discharged. Our Letters from the Imperial Camp before *Buda*, give an account, that part of the Bavarian Troops arrived there the 6th Instant; and that his Electoral Highness was expected as yesterday with the Reer-Guard. That they have lately sprung several Mines with good success, and that they began to press the place so close, that they made no doubt of reducing it in a very short time, though the Besieged have fortified themselves with several strong Retrenchments within the Town, and continue to make very frequent and desperate Sallies. The same Letters confirm what our former told us of Colonel *Heussler*'s having defeated a great Party of Turks near *Alba Regalis*; the Particulars are, That Colonel *Heussler* being sent out with One thousand Imperial Cuirassiers and Six hundred Hungarian Horse, had notice that a great Convoy, consisting

of Four hundred Wagons laden with Provisions and Ammunition, and drawn each by four Oxen, under the Guard of 4000 Turks, had passed the Bridge of *Effecke*, and was going to *Alba Regalis*; upon which he laid his Men in Ambuscade, who falling upon the Turks, at the first discharge killed about 50 of them, and put the rest to flight; That the Enemy afterwards rallying, endeavored to recover the Wagons which they had so easily abandoned, and attacked the Reer-Guard of the Christians, but they were quickly repulsed; and Colonel *Heussler* returned to the Imperial Camp the first Instant with the said Booty, which was a very seasonable Supply for the Army. From *Presburg* they write, that the Turks of *Newbeusel* have quitted a small Fort about a mile from that place, which was kept by 200 Janisaries; and that the Christians had possessed themselves thereof, which makes us believe the Garifon of *Newbeusel* is very much weakened, and that they are in great want of Men. General *Schutz*, who commands the Emperor's Forces in *Upper Hungary*, is marched towards *Esperies* in search of Count *Teckelej*, who continues to Ravage the Country on that side. The Count *de Lamberg* arrived here from the Army on Thursday last, being sent by the Duke of *Lorraine* to hasten the departure of the Troops and Ammunition that might be yet behind; and to give the Emperor an account that he had received advice, that the Serasquier Bassa finding he could not force Count *Leslie* from his Camp, had repassed the Bridge of *Effecke*, and was marching to attempt the relief of *Buda*, according to the positive Orders he had from the Grand Signior; and that his Highness was resolved to go and meet him, leaving before the place a sufficient number of his Troops to maintain the Siege. Yesterday arrived here part of the Troops which the Circle of *Suabia* send to the Emperor's assistance.

Francfort, Sept. 17. Our Advices from *Hungary* inform us, that part of the Bavarian Forces have joyned the Imperial Army, and that they were posted on the side of the *Danube*, by which means the Besieged were hindered from supplying themselves with Water from the River, as till then they had done; That at a Muster that was lately taken, the Imperial Army was found to consist in 20000 Horse, reckoning 6000 Hungarians, and 10000 Foot; and that with the Bavarian Troops, which are between 15 and 16000 Men, and the other Succors that were coming to them, they should be strong enough to fight the Serasquier Bassa, who it is said has positive Orders to relieve *Buda*, or to Perish in the attempt, and at the same time to maintain the Siege. By the way of *Vienna* we have advice, that the King of *Poland* had sent part of his Army to attack the strong Forts of *Faslowic* in *Podolia*; and that the Weywode or Prince of *Valachia* had taken Arms for the Poles, having slain a Bassa and 1000 Turks, who were sent by the Grand Signior to seize the Weywode's Wife and Children and bring them to *Adrianople* as a Pledge of his Fidelity; and had possessed himself of a very advantageous Post on the *Danube*, which he would put into the hands of the Poles, if they designed to pass that River.

Ham'urgh, September 19. The Conferences are begun at *Itzeboe* between the Ministers of *Denmark, Brandenburg* and *Lunenburg*; And we are told the occasion of them is to compose the present Differences between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein*. The Electoral Prince of *Brandenburg* is now at *Hanover*.

Brussels, September 22: The Deputies which the States of this Province sent to the French Camp at *Bonessé*, returned on Tuesday last, the French not accepting the Security they offered for the payment of their Contributions; but they were the next day sent back again to propose Citizens Security, which the French required, a Merchant here having engaged to give Security at *Paris* to pay the Sum demanded in eight Months. The States of *Flanders* and *Hainault* have likewise agreed to raise their Quotas of the said Contributions; and the latter have given Caution for 430000 Florins; And the Provinces of *Namur* and *Gelderland* will likewise have settled this matter of the Contributions in a day or two. In the meantime Monsieur de *Boufflers* and Monsieur de *la Trousse* continue with the Troops under their command at *Bonessé* and *Deyne*, having Orders, as we are told, to remain there till the Ratifications of the Truce are Exchanged, which we expect every minute an account of. Yesterday 2000 French Horses came to *Tervueren* and *West Capell*, between this City and *Louvain*, and from thence sent out several Parties to forage in the neighboring Villages. Our Letters from *Hungary* give an account, that the Elector of *Bavaria* hath joyn'd the Imperial Army before *Buda*, and hath undertaken the Attack towards the River, which the Christians could not before carry on for want of Men; That the Duke of *Lorraine* was pretty well recovered of his late illness; That He had changed the manner of his Attacks; That the Christians have sprung several Mines, and thereby made great Breaches in the Wall of the Town; but that the success of the Siege was like to be decided by a Battle, for they had advice that the Serasquier Bassa having drawn all the Forces he could together was marching to attempt the relief of the Place, and the Duke of *Lorraine* was resolved to go meet and fight him, leaving a competent number of men to make good the Siege.

Paris, September 23. The King accompanied with the Dauphin and Dauphiness, parted the 21. Instant from *Versailles* for *Chambor*, having deferred his Journey for some days by reason of the Indisposition of the Duke of *Orleans*, who was taken ill the 14th Instant with a double Tertian Ague; but his Distemper is at present much abated. The 20th Instant the King Ratified the Treaty of Truce between this Crown and *Spain*, Concluded and Signed at *Raisbonne* by the Imperial Commissioners and the Count de *Crecy*. The Algerine Ambassadors are still at *Marseilles*, and are to remain there till the return of the French Gallies who have taken their Course towards the Coast of *Italy*, when the Turkish Slaves, that are at present on board the said Gallies, will be delivered to them, according to the late Treaty with that Government. Our Letters from *Germany* give us an account of the Elector of *Bavaria's* Forces arrival before *Buda*, which it's believed is by this time in the hands of the Christians.

Winchester, September 12. The Right Honorable the Lord Chief Justice *Jeffreys* having attended His Majesty, to give him an account of the Surrender of the Charter of *Lincoln*, and of several Charters of Corporations in the Northern Circuit; His Majesty was pleased to declare his Satisfaction therewith; And at the same time to lay His Commands upon his Lordship to let the said

Corporations know His Majesty's Gracious acceptance of the Surrender of their Charters and the Sense His Majesty has of their Loyalty, and that accordingly He will let them find the Effects thereof upon the Renewal of their Charters.

London, September 12. The Patentees for making Salt and Brackish Waters Fresh and Wholesome, having made a publick Trial of their Engine, and its Operation in the presence of several Merchants, Members of the Trinity-House, Owners and Commanders of Ships, gave so much Satisfaction, that several of them whose Ships are now ready to sail, did readily agree with the Patentees, and Subscribed their Names, in order to be immediately supplied with Engines and Ingredients necessary for that purpose, some of which are already put on Board.
