By the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, and the Lords of His Majesties Most Honourable Privy Council.

Pon Consideration, that many Persons who have undertaken to Redeem several of His Majesties Subjects out of Captivity at Algiers, and Sally, have failed 10 perform the same, for a long time; His Majesty in Council was Pleased to Order that if any Persons that have undertaken for the Redemption of any of His Majesties Subjects in Captivity, as a foresaid, shall not perfect their respective Redemptions before Michaelstas 1685. They shall lose the benefit of His Majessies Order in Council, for allowing the Sum of Forty Pounds to each Person upon such Redemption. And the Relations or Friends of any other Captives, shall be Admitted to Subscribe for Redemptions in their stead PHILLIP LLOYD.

Genona, September 16. Yesterday arrived here the Rose and Crown in 8 days from Alicant; where she left the Benadventure Frigat commanded by Captain Priestman, who was arrived there in 4 days from Argiers. The same day sailed from hence the Alexander Merchant, and the Thomus and Francis for Legborn. The French Men of War are at Vado near Savona, where they expect the coming up of the Galleys. Four Hundred Horse are arrived here from Milan, and are lodged in San Pier d'Arena.

Venice, September 16. We have an account from Dalmatia that the Morlaques about a fortnight fince made an incursion into the Turkish Territories not far from Cliffa, and burnt several Villages and brought back with them a great many Prisoners; that in their return they met with 800 Turkish Horse, marching towards Clin, whom they defeated, killing above 200 of them upon the place, and taking their Bigage; That the faid Morlaques being afterwards reinforced to the number of 6000 Men, had posted themselves near Clin in Order to their Conjunction with the Proveditore General Mocenigo, who had refolved to attack that place, and was marching thither with an Army of 20000 Men We have farther advice that another Party of Morlaques and Heydokes with the Banditi come from Abruzzo had defeated a Body of Turks that were drawn together in the Nighborhood of Spalatro to hinder their in-...rsions, and that they had killed between two and three hundred, and taken some Prisoners, and several hundred head of Cattle. Prince Alexander of Farma, General of the Foot of this State, will part from hence in few days for Dalmatia, where it's faid he is to Command the Forces of the

Republick. It is confirmed that the Venetian Fleet has taken its course towards the Gulf of Lepanto.

From the Polish Camp near Jallowic, Angust 28.
The King, who parted the 15th Instant from Stozorow, where he 15th the Queen, arrived the 22 Instant, attended with a great number of Nobility at Buzack, within two hours march of faftowie, near which place his Army was encamped, of which His Majesty took a review the same day, and was extreamly satisfied as with the number fo with the condition of the Troops. His Majesty detached a Body of Horse under the Command of General Kemsky to invest the Fortress of fastorie; and in the Evening His Majesty arrived with the rest of the Army before the place, and immediately Summoned the Governor to furrender it, who returned a very fierce answer, saying he had Powder and Bullet to defend the place, and would do it to the last extremity; Whereupon several Batteries were raised, and the 24th in the Morning we began to make use of them, and threw a great many Bombes and Carcasses into the place, which so terrified the besieged, that the 25th in the Evening they desired a parley, and Hostages being given on both fides, the capitulation was agreed on, in pursuance whereof the Turks marched out the next day about Noon, being about 500 men bearing Armes; They defired they might go to Caminies, but that was refused, and they were conducted to the place mentioned in the capitulation; several of the Turkish Officers prayed the Kings protection and leave to remain within the Polish Territories, being unwilling to return home for fear of being questioned for not having better defended the place; There were found in it several Polish deserters, who for a terror to others were impaled asive. To morrow the Army will decamp from hence, but we know not yet whicher we are to march, and various conj ctures are made concerning the Kings defign. The Ottoman Army that was to have made head against us, is we here retired in great diforder; fo that we are not like to meet with any great opposition. The great Treasurer of the Crown who was fent out to posfels himself of some small places has rejoyned the Army; and hath presented to the King two Turkish Officers he took Prisoners, one whereof is the chief Ingenier of Caminies: he hath been examined and hath declared feveral particulars concerning the condition of that place, and among other things fays the Governor of Caminiec hath prepared a great many Mines in the lower Town, intending to abandon it, in case of a Siege, and to retire into the Castle, and to spring the said Mines when the Poles are entred.

Viema, Sept. 21. The 17th Instant Count Leslie arrived here, having left the Command of the Army, that was under his Orders, in the Hands of the Viceroy of Croatia; he was immediately to wait upon the Emperor, and the next day parted again, in great haste to joyn the Army before Buda, to ex-

erc'se there the Command of Mareschal de Camp General in the place of the Count de Staremberg, who has I fi the Camp, and is gone to Comorra. Yesterday arrived here by Water 2000 Foot of the Circle of Susbis; and 2000 more are expected to day or to morrow; and we are told that faveral Regiments which the Elector of Saxony fe ds to the Emperor's Assistance are likewise on their march. By an Express who arrived here on Monday last from the Imperial Camp we have advice, That the Elector of Bavaria had fent a orporal with a I urkish Prisoner into the Town, with Letters to the Commanding Bassa, wherein his Electoral Highness gave him an account of his arrival at the Head of his Army, and that he was refolved not to flir from thence till he had reduced the place under the Obedience of his I nperial Majelty; exhorting him not to let things come to extremity, for th tin that case he must not expect any Quarter: That the Bassa having thereupon assembled the Principal Officers of the Garion, had caused the Corporal and the Turkith Prisoner to be brought thither; and having before them read his Electoral Highness's Letter, a swered That he thanked his Electoral Highness for the account he gave him.; That he had seen his Troops arrive; That he und rstood very well the Rules of War, having been a Soldier a great many years, and that he could not furrender the Place fo long as he had Men and Ammunition to defend it, and Provisions to Subsist; and having given the Corporal 12 Ducats, sent him back with this answer to his Eicctoral Highness. That the Troops of Bavaria, who have the two new Attacks on the fide of the River, advanced with good fuccess, and had iprung a Mine, which had thrown down great part of the Wall. And that the Duke of Lorrain leaving the Conduct of the Siege to the Elector of Badaria, marched the 16th Instant with the Imperial and Bawasian Horse and Dragoons to meet and fight the Serasquier Bassa. The Advices from Poland say, That the King, after the furrender of Fastowic, marched with his whole Army towards Caminiec, having fent the Under Marcschal of the Crown before with a Body of Horse, who advancing under the Cannon of the place, had had several Skirmishes with the Turks; but that the King receiving advice that a great Body of Turks and Tartars were on their march to observe him, he immediately resolved to go and meet them, and engage them to a Battle.

Ratubonne, September 28. We have an account from the Camp before Buda; That the Turks continued to make very Strong Salleys. That the Ele-Ctor of Bavaria upon his arrival in the Camp had Simmoned the Besieged letting them know, that if they did not then Surrender, they must not expect any viercy; to which the Balla had made anfwer, that he wanted neither Men nor Provisions, and that he would defend the place to the last drop of Blood. We are told farther (which is confirmed by a Courier that passed through this place) that the Strasquier Bassa was on his march with an Army of 40000 M n to relieve Buda, and that the Duke of Lorrain was gone with all his Horse and Dragoons to meet him and give him Battle; and that on the 17th Inflant the two Armys were within 3 hours March of each other; so that we expect hourly to hear of a Battle,

Bruffels, Oftob 3. On Saturday laft an Extraordi nary Courier arrived here in nine days from Madrid, with a Duplicate of the Radifications of the Truce; and a Supply of Money for the Service of this Government. Yellerday the Marquis Del Val returned hither from Paris, having adjusted Matters concerning the Contributions. The French Troops Commanded by Monfi ur de Bouffers were, accor-

ding to our last advices, still at Gaure, and those under Monsieur de la Trousse at Deynse; but we are asfured that they have this day quitted the Sparish Territories. Our Letters from Vienna of the 21 past, say, The two Attacks that were carried on by the Bavarian Troops were very far advanced, and that they had sprung a Mine with very good suc-cess; that the besieged however seemed little concerned thereat, relying upon the strength of their Garifon in case of an affault, and being encouraged by the News th y had that the Scrasquier Bassa was marching to their relief; But we hope the Duke of Lorrain who marched the 16th with all his Horse and Dragions to miet him, hath by a new Victory put an end to that Siege; which has lasted the longer for that the attacks were not at first carried on as they ought to have been, the blame whereof is so far laid upon the Count de Staremburg, who had the chief con-duct thereof, that he has le't the Army, and Count-Leslie is appointed to Command in his stead. We have likewise advice that the King of Poland having fent part of his Army towards Caminice as if he intended to besi ge it, and making a shew of following himself with the rest, he had on the suddain, upon advice that a great Body of Turks, Tartars and Transilvanians were on their march to fall upon hin when engaged in that Siege, changed his march and was gone to meet and fight them

Paris, Octob. 4. The Court is still at Chambor, and will, it's believed, continue there some time longer. The French Fleet Commanded by Monsieur du Quesne have been before Genoua, but it's said a violent Storm obliged them to retire. Since the arrival of the German Letters yesterday, we have had the News here that Buda is taken, the Garison having, it's said, Capitulated the 23 past & Every Body believes it; but after so many false reports, it is fit we expect a Confirmation.

Plimouth, September 13. The 21 I stant His Majesties Ship the Drake arrived here from the Streights.

Whitehall, September 25. Their Majessies and their Royal Highnesses are returned hither with the whole Court from Winchesser.
