THE following Address, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the Mayor of Great Yarmouth, was by him presented to Her Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.
Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Great Yarmouth, in the county of Norfolk, in Council assembled, humbly offer to your Majesty renewed assurances of our loyalty, devotion, and attachment, and our sincere and heartfelt congratulations on the august ceremony of your Majesty's Coronation, the ancient compact between the Sovereign and the people, but on this auspicious occasion happily cemented by the many resplendent and Christian virtues which adorn your Royal Person, and by the fervent and unvarying love and dutiful allegiance to their Queen, anxiously expressed by all ranks, and in every part of the United Kingdom.

In thus approaching your Majesty, we recur, with grateful pleasure, to the commencement of your reign, enabling us thankfully to express a firm and sure reliance that your Majesty will nobly sway the sceptre of these realms, ruling with law and justice in mercy, and whilst supporting the just prerogatives of the Crown, will watch over and defend the liberties of your people, ensuring to all, by equal rights and equal laws, wisely and honestly administered, a full participation in the benefits of our great and unrivalled Constitution, thus rendering your reign a reign of glory to the Sovereign and of happiness to the nation.

Humbly repeating, in sincerity and truth, our dutiful homage and allegiance to your Majesty, we

fervently pray the Almighty Disposer of all Events that he will be graciously pleased to grant you a long and peaceful reign, blessing your Majesty's endeavours for the public good, and lightening the cares, inseparable from a Crown, by the dutiful and willing obedience of the people to your Imperial rule.
