Newcaftle, Od. 1.

N Sunday night last failed from this Port 40 fail, most of them imall ships, bound for feveral Ports upon the Cafts. The great Fleet of 150 fail incend to put to Sea the next Tide, if the

Tarmouth, off. 2. The Ship that was in the late Rorm feen to be funk between the fands of this place, was before the next morning by the violence of the winds and waves beaten to pieces, and all her men loft, to what place the belonged we yet know not. On Monday night arrived here one laden Collier belonging to this Town, hardly escaping the florm, by which he law one that was in his company lunk, judged to be & West- Country Vellel.

Yeiterday a Hay laden with Bay-falt from London, was unfortunately over-ran by another thip, and loft, hardly to be recovered. The same day sailed out from hence the Nightin gale and Little Victory, the latter having loft her fo:e-man, t. r :- topman, and main-topmaft.

Rome, Sept. 17. An Express arrived from Sufa has much perplexed the whole Court with the ill news that the Popes Nephew, he Abbot Rospigliosi, continues still his differmper, which is of late fome what heightened, not without fome apprehensions of danger ; but this is at prefent concealed from the Popes knowledge, leat the great tendernels and affection be has for his Niphew, fhould occasion a diftemper in himfelf.

Venice, Sept. 23. Here arrived two dales fince 2 Tarten in eight daies from Zante, bringing fome Letters from Can dia, but of an ancient date, with news little different from what we formerly received from other Letters ; but by fome paffingers arriving from the same place we are told, that a Villel which parted from Candia the 26th of August past, informed them, the the Tu ks are ftill warmly puriuing their defign, and by their frequent springing of their Mines by which they make their approaches to the City, many therp encounters are daily occasioned, in which the courage of the besieged is as often fignalized by great flinghters made a-mongst their Enemies, which had so incensed the Grand Vifier, that he commanded a general affault to be given to the City, which was ex cuted with great fury and noise, and continued for a co fiderable time with much obfinacy, but finding a flour refifience in all places, and great numbers of their men killed, with little lofs to the Defendants, they gave over the affau't, to the great trouble and almost dispair of the Vifier, which is much encreased by the great wants he finds of uil necessa y provisions in his Camp, ace the difficulty of being supplied, by reason of the unwearled diligence of the Venerian Squadrons, which are alwayes cruifing in the Se's b. fore Canea, and intercepting such Veffels as by Realth end avour to put in there, of all which we are confirmed by a Veilel of Tienis lately taken, who also fayes, that the Grand Vilier had ordered all the Veffels of Barbary imployed in tast fervice, o ufe their utmoft end avour to put la forme fupplies into Canca. without which le could not be poffiole for hi a to continue t'e Siege. In the mem time tie Tu ks are full of despondency, to think that in to long a Siege, and after fo many Mines folung, and affaults made, they have not yet made th micles Mafters of any out-work ; but the Vifir to keep op their drooping fpirits, and encourage them to action, endiavours to petiwade them , that as foon as they shall have

gained from them say one Redoubt, he was affured the Citizens would be ready to furrender the place. By this Vefel we have also intelligence of the fafe arrival of another of our. Convoyes with provision and ammunition at Zante, which will be fuddenly put into Candia, where they have no want of any thing that is necessary for their defence or encourage ment , and care is bere taken to haften out other fhips to follow them.

His Excellency S:ignior Barbare, the General of Candida having obtained leave to return to this City, the Senate have chosen Seignior Bernardo Nani to supply his place.

From Dalmatia we are informed , that fome fmall parties have lately been feen upon the borders , but little burt dene on either fide. General Cornaro is suddenly expected home, and with him the Marques Degl' Oddi. Orders are fent into that Province from the Senate, to imbarque all the Ammunition they can fpare, and to fend it with 400 men for Zantes for the relief of Candia.

By a late O der of the Senate no person whatsoever is to build any house, or raife up any kind of Fabrick within a mile round this City, and care is taken to pull down some boules. that have been lately erected.

Legorn, Sept. 26. The 19th inftant arrived here the Santa Maria Bonaventura in fix daies from Algiers, the Maken tells us, that he came from thence is company with four French Men of War , under the Command of Monfient Paul, who had taken in an 150 Slaves whom he had there releemed ; that there were 22 of thofe Corfairs at Ses , who bad taken a Spanish Caravell with 25 men.

His Mojeffy having cholen the Duk de Roquelaure as his Deputy to hold a Convocation of the Knights of the Order of St. Michael, accordingly a Chapter was held the 28th paft, in the Convent of the Cordeliers, where the Duke appearing, baving on his Great Coller of the Order, with many Gentlemen of his Family, and a large train of his Atteniants, they Immediately went into the Church, the Count d' Auteuil Desn of the Order, leading the way, preceded by the Officers of the Order, with his Majefties Trumpets and Drums, and followed by all the rest of the Knights, where they took their feats and heard Valpars, the Billiop of Cahors officiating in this Pontifical habit. The next morning he faid Mass, after which they were entertained with a Panegyrick, which ended, the Duke, preceded by all the Knights of the Order, entred into the Great Hall, where he treated them with a liberal Feaft, and that Afternoon again heard Velpas, with a Service for the deceased Knights. The next day after Mais, the Duke held a Chapter, taking his place under a Canopy of Stare, where he eloquently delivered to them the Intentions of his Maje By to encourage and protect that Order, and the first infant, with the Count D' Auteuil and five others of the Order Deputed from the Affembly, presented humble thanks to his Majeky for his Protection of them, affu ing him of their Adelity and obedience.
