Turin, Septemb. 24.

THE Troops of the Duke of Savoy continue Encamped between *Ceva* and *Piasso*; and we do not yet hear that any Orders are given for their returning to their Quarters. They write from *Milan* that by the Defensive League lately concluded with the Republick of *Genova*, the Count *de Melgar* has promised in the Name of his Catholick Majesty to assist that State with 27 Gallies, 18 Men of War, and 14000 Foot, and 4000 Horse; and that on the other side the *Genoueses* are obliged to maintain 6000 Men, ten Gallies, and four Men of War; and to give to the Spanish Troops that shall be sent to their assistance in case their City be attacked, the Post they shall chuse.

Venice, Septemb. 23. By a small Vessel come from *Castara* we have advice that Signior *Antonio Zon*, Proveditor General of that place, having caused 1000 Morlaques to Embark on several light Vessels, with Orders to go and Land near *Castel Nuovo*, they had executed the same with good success, having burnt several Villages where the Turks had lain up great Quantities of Corn and other Provisions, and returning to their Vessels with a great deal of Booty, and many Prisoners, after having obliged the Garrison of *Castel Nuovo*, who fell upon them, to retire with considerable loss. The last News we had from our Fleet, was, That General *Mohosni* had ordered a Descent to be made at *Condelle* in the *Morea* with Six Thousand Men, to discover what disposition the Greeks living in those parts are in, to cast off the Turkish Yoak. They write from *Constantinople* that they had the news there that *Buda* was besieged by the Imperial Army; but that they did not doubt but the Besieged would make a very stout defence. The Prince of *Parma*, General of the Foot of this State, parted from hence the last week for *Dalmatia*, where the Proveditor General *Mocenigo*, as our last Letters told us, expected him with the more impatience for that he had put all things in a readiness in order to the undertaking some considerable Enterprize so soon as the said Prince was arrived. From the *Levant* we have advice that some of General *Molino's* Ships have taken three Turkish Vessels in the *Archipelago*, laden with Provisions.

Madrid, Sept. 28. The Duke *de Bournonville*, Viceroy of *Catalonia*, is removed from that Government, having finished his three years; and the King has named the Marquis *de Leganez*, General of the Horse in that Country, to succeed him. The Marquis *de Cogolludo*, Son of the Duke *de Medina Celi*, is gone to take possession of his Command of General of the Gallies of *Naples*. They write from *Cudiz* that five Spanish Men of War Sailed from thence the ninth Instant to the Eastward; and that the departure of the Gallions for the *West-Indies* was fixed for the 24 of this month, if the weather do not hinder it.

Genova, September. 30 The 25th Instant sailed from hence the Expedition for *Scandaroon*; and the *William* and *David* for *Tabarco*; and the next day

the *Four Brothers* for the Coast of *Spain*. The French Gallies are still kept by the weather at *Villa Franca*; and the Men of War at *Vada*, being 3^h Miles to the Westward of this City.

Vienna, October 5. Count *Leslie*, who arrived here on Sunday last having had several Conferences with Prince *Herman* of *Baden*, President of the Council of War, parted from hence yesterday morning to return to the Army before *Buda*; From whence a Courier arrived here this morning, by whom we are informed, that the Duke of *Lorraine* marched the 25th past with all his Cavalry to attack the *Serasquier Bassa*; but that he having notice of it, retired in great haste towards *Alba Regalis*, and posted himself under the Cannon of that place; That the Duke of *Lorraine* who had followed the Enemy as far as *Alba Regalis*, finding he could not attack them there, was returning to the Camp before *Buda*; That in the mean time the Elector of *Bavaria* did push on the Siege; That the Works which the Turks ruined in the great Sally they made from the Town on the 22. past; were made up again; and that they were preparing several Mines; but that the great Rains did very much incommode the Besiegers. The Emperor has appointed some of his Council to examine the Papers of Count *Teckley* which were taken at his late defeat, among which are a great many Letters in Cypher which are Decyphring, and it's not doubted but thereby will be discovered his secret Correspondencies. We expect every hour the news of the taking of *Esperies* by General *Schulstz*, the place, notwithstanding the obstinacy of the Rebels that got into it, not being in a condition to make any great defence; And we doubt not, after this Town is reduced, but the rest that are as yet on the side of Count *Teckley*, will begin to think of making their peace in time. The Baron *Zierowski*, the Emperor's Ambassador in *Moscow*, is returned hither, and hath, as we are told, informed his Imperial Majesty that the Czars have a very brave Army on foot, and that he believes they may be brought into the League against the Turks if a way can be found to accommodate the differences that have so long depended between them and the Poles concerning *Kiovia* and other places, which the Czars are at present possessed of, and whereof the Poles demand restitution. The Prince of *Saxe Byse-nach* dyed at *Presburg* the 29th of the last month.

Ratisbonne, October 9. Our Letters from *Vienna* give us an account of the entire Defeat of Count *Teckley*; he lay encamped with a Body of 7000 Men to cover *Esperies*, being resolved to give the Imperialists Battle in case they advanced that way; but General *Schulstz* prevented him, for marching the 17th past with 4000 Men from his Camp near *Zoben*, he surprized the Rebels in the night, slew a great many of them, and took all their Baggage and Cannon, Count *Teckley* himself escaped with great difficulty, not having time to save his private Papers; among which it's said are several Letters from the Grand Signor. After this

this action General *Schuliz* attacked *Esperies* which, having only a slight Wall to secure it, could not hold out many days. The first Instant a great Council of War was held at *Vienna* at which General *Leslie*, who arrived that morning from the Army, assisted. What was said of the Turks having put 500 Men into *Buda*, is confirm'd, and we are withal told that this small relief has very much encouraged the Besieg'd; and on the other hand the Christians begin to suffer very much by the weather.

Liege, Octob. 11. The Burgermasters *Renard* and *Macors* being condemn'd to die for their Rebellion against their Prince, were publicly Beheaded on *Monday* last in the morning; and the same day in the afternoon the Elector of *Cologne* made his Entry into this City with great Solemnity: And this morning the great Chapter was assembled in the presence of his Electoral Highness.

Amsterdam, October 13. The Master of a Galiot arrived here this morning reports he saw on the 9th Instant off the Ill: of *Wight* five Dutch Merchant Ships bound home from the *East-Indies*; That he was on board one of them, and understood they came the 12th of *February* last, 7 in company, from *Batavia*; that one of these not being able to make the Cape of *Good Hope*, went back again, and the other being very leaky, they took out the Men and the best Goods, and set the Ship on fire.

Hague, October 13. The Ratifications of the Treaty of Commerce now lately concluded between the King of *Denmark* and this State, were exchanged here this week. The States General have appointed the Heer *Van Heynsuis*, the Heer *Van Heuvel*, the Heer *Theresseyn*, and the Heer *Van Borsele*, to go for *England* in Quality of their Commissioners, about the affair of *Bantam*. Orders have been sent to *Maejtricht* for the Disbanding the last Recruits, which it's said in that Garrison make together above 2000 Men.

Brussels, October 19. On Friday last the Marquis de *Castel Monaco* Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Spain* to the States General of the United-Provinces, arriv'd here with his whole Family from the *Hague*, intending to remain in this place till he receive farther Orders from the Court at *Madrid*. The Prince de *Chimay*, the late Governor of *Luxemburg* is upon his departure for *Spain*. The great Subject of Peoples discourse here is the news from *Hungary* which at present is very various, for there are Letters which say the Turks have only put 500 Spahces into the place without any provisions; while others tell us that besides the Spahces 4 or 500 Janisaries go in with a great many bags filled with Meal and Rice, and that besides the Enemy took a large Boat laden with Bread and other Provisions for the Imperial Army. The Duke of *Lorraine* had been in pursuit of the Seraskier *Bassa*, who was retires'd under the Cannon of *Alba Regalu*, having in his retreat divided his Army into two Bodies, for the greater conveniency of their march; and when the last Letters came away the Duke of *Lorraine* was not yet returned to the Camp. The Elector of *Bavaria* carried on his attacks with good success, resolving to overcome all difficulties, and not to stir till the Town was taken; And the Troops of *Suabia*, being above 4000 Men, were hourly expected in the Camp. They write from *Liege* of the 14th Instant, that Monsieur de *Choiseul*, General of the Elector of *Cologne's* Forces parted from thence the day before in order to his return to *Paris*, having been present'd by his Electoral Highness with a Sword richly set with Diamonds; and by the Magistrates with two large gilded Basons.

Paris, Octob. 18. The Court returned from *Chambor* on *Thursday* last, and is now at *Fontainebleau*, where the King intends to stay about a month, and then to remove to *St Germain*. It's said here that the Republick of *Genova* hearing the Truce was concluded, have resolv'd not to Ratifie the Defensive Alliance between the Crown of *Spain* and them, and that they are endeavouring with the Assistance of the Pope to accommodate Matters with this Court.

His Majesty hath been Graciously pleas'd by His New Charter, to Grant to the Town and Corporation of *Tornes* in the County of *Devon*, an Additional general Market for all manner of Cattle and other Wares and Commodities, to be held at *Tornes* aforesaid on every *Tuesday*.

Another who goes by the name of Captain *Brnewell*, alias *Berne*, a tall slender Man, thin faced, of a Tawain Complexion, the hair of his Eyebrows and Beard reddish, the hair of his Head dark brown, and cut close, he wears a long brown Periwig, his Cloaths black, and a brown Campana Coat. Another called *Bryan Onorocke*, of a middle stature, slender Body, whiter Complexion, thin faced, his own hair a dark brown, short and curls, about one and twenty years of Age, in a white luff Campana Coat. They are vehemently suspected to be some of those who have committed so many Robberies lately in *Oxfordshire* and *Bucks*. There was taken with them a bay Nag about thirteen hands high, with Saddle spots on the near side, and one spot on the far side, of a full Age, all his paces and griled in the Flank. An Iron gray Gelding, about fourteen hands high, cloudy faced; a white heal on the near foot behind, and a white spot on the far side, trots all. A black Nag fourteen hands high, a Star in his forehead, about six years old, the near foot behind white, a little white on the far hind foot, all his paces a black Hogskin Saddle, with private Holsters. A bay Gelding, fifteen hands high, six years old, with a Star in his forehead, a snip on his Nose, two white feet behind, with Saddle spots, all his paces, a Tann'd Hogskin Saddle studded with Silver, a dapple gray Gelding, 'twixt fifteen and sixteen hands high, fleabitten about the head.

There was likewise taken with them and suspected to be taken from some people on the High-way, a smooth pick Case of Black wood, tipped on both ends, and at the opening with Silver and engraved on one end with a Cypher and a Viscounts Coronet, a small Leather Purse with a Key at the end of it, a pair of Amber beads, three pair of Silver Buckles for Shoes, one pair of them with Stones set in them, a brass smooth pick Case, with two Coats of Arms at each end, an Old Silver Watch made by one *Hubert* at *Roven*, a horn Tobacco Box, the Lid tipped with Silver, Scalloped, a small oval silver Snuff Box.

If any have been robbed by the Persons above-named either of the Horses or Goods above-mentioned, let them repair to the Keeper of *Newgate* where they may see the Men, horses and goods, and what is challenged restored prosecuting the Offenders according to Law. There are Two more of their Gang who are fled from Justice, and are thus described, One *George Baker* a notorious High-way Robber, a luffy Man, Hump shouldred, pretty tall, of a fair Complexion, wears sometimes a flaxen and sometimes a brown Wig, and a Coat with Plate Buttons: And one *Plunker* a short wolf face man, thick shouldred, his own hair black but wears a brown Wig of a Yellow Complexion, a large sharp Nose, about thirty six years of Age.
