*Church Commissioners'-Office,  
March 27, 1839.*

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for the assignment of districts to twenty-three churches and chapels in the parish of Manchester and county palatine of Lancaster, under the provisions of the 6th section of the 59th George 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at Windsor, the 14th day of September 1838, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George

the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also of the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act, further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such districts, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order

of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or required under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provisions of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws to the contrary notwithstanding;" and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third,

intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, viz.

*"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.*

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and further continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Manchester, in the county palatine of Lancaster, and diocese of Chester, contained a population of 270,963 persons:

"That there are in the said parish twenty nine churches and chapels already built, to three of which districts have been already assigned, viz. to Saint George's, Hulme, Saint Philip's, in Salford, and Saint Matthew's, in Manchester; that there are also the following twenty-three churches and chapels, besides the collegiate and parish church of Manchester (which affords accommodation to 3000 persons, including 1600 free seats), in the said parish, which have been consecrated, and in which divine service is regularly performed, namely, Blackley Chapel, which affords accommodation to 560 persons, there being no free seats therein appropriated to the use of the poor; Saint Mark's Chapel, in Cheetham, which affords accommodation to 800 persons, including 64 free seats; All Saints Church, in Newton, which affords accommodation to 900 persons, including 90 free seats; Saint James' Chapel, in Gorton, which affords accommodation to 400 persons, with no free seats; Saint Thomas's Chapel, in Ardwick, which affords accommodation to 1300 persons, including 80 free seats for adults, and 300 for Sunday scholars; All Saints Chapel, in Chorlton on Medlock, which affords accommodation to 1500 persons, including 400 free seats; Saint Matthew's Chapel, in Stretford, which affords accommodation to 591 persons, including 125 free seats; Saint Clement's Chapel, in Chorlton cum Hardy, which affords accommodation to 320 persons, including 100 free seats; Birch Chapel, in Rusholme, which affords accommodation to 300 persons, with no free seats therein. Saint James's Chapel, in Didsbury, which affords accommodation to 300 persons, including 20 free seats; Saint Thomas's Chapel, in Heaton Norris, which affords accommodation to 298 persons, with no free seats therein; Denton Chapel, which affords accommodation to 300 persons with no free seats therein; Saint Stephen's Chapel, in Salford, which affords accommodation to

1400 persons, including 380 free seats for adults, and 300 for Sunday scholars; Trinity Chapel, in Salford, which affords accommodation to 800 persons with no free seats therein; Saint George's Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 1293 persons, including 540 free seats; Saint Michael's Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 1000 persons, including 100 free seats; Saint Paul's Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 1147 persons, with no free seats therein; Saint Anne's Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 1175 persons, including 144 free seats; Saint Mary's Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 997 persons, including 159 free seats; Saint John's Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 1200 persons, including 250 free seats; Saint Peter's Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 800 persons, including 20 free seats for adults, besides accommodation for Sunday scholars; Saint James' Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 1500 persons, including 42 free seats for adults, and 30 for Sunday scholars; and Saint Andrew's Church, in Manchester township, which affords accommodation to 2000 persons, including 700 free seats.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to each of the last above named churches and chapels, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intitled "An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should be respectively named:—

"The Blackley Chapel District; the Saint Mark's District, in Cheetham; the All Saints District, in Newton; the Saint James's District, in Gorton; the Saint Thomas's District, in Ardwick; the All Saints District, in Chorlton on Medlock; the Saint Matthew's District, in Stretford; the Saint Clement's District, in Chorlton cum Hardy; the Birch Chapel District, in Rusholme; the Saint James's District, in Didsbury; the Saint Thomas's District, Heaton Norris; the Denton Chapel District; the Saint Stephen's District, in Salford; the Trinity District, in Salford; the Saint George's District, in Manchester; the Saint Michael's District, in Manchester; the Saint Paul's District, in Manchester; the Saint Anne's District, in Manchester; the Saint Mary's District, in Manchester; the Saint John's District, in Manchester; the Saint Peter's District, in Manchester; the Saint James's District, in Manchester; and the Saint Andrew's District, in Manchester, with boundaries as follows:

"The Blackley Chapel District to consist of and comprize the township of Blackley. The Saint Mark's District, in Cheetham, to consist of and

comprize the township of Crumpsall, and that part of the township of Cheetham which is next adjacent to the township of Crumpsall, and is separated from the remainder of the township of Cheetham by Smedley-road, Smedley-lane, the Old Bury-road, and Halliwell-lane. The All Saints District, in Newton, to consist of and comprize the township of Newton, Failsworth, and Droylsden. The Saint James's District, in Gorton, to consist of and comprize the township of Gorton. The Saint Thomas's District, in Ardwick, to consist of and comprize the township of Ardwick.
