THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for dividing the parish of Stockport, in the county of Chester, into two distinct and separate parishes under the 16th section of 58 Geo. 3, cap. 45, and for the assignment of a chapelry district, under the 16th section of the 59th George 3, cap. 134, to St. Peter's Chapel, in the same parish:

At the Court at Windsor, the 6th day of October 1838, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also of the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct

parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act, further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such districts, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or required under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and

whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapel shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provisions of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws to the contrary notwithstanding;” and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of His late Majesty, intituled ‘An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;’” and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled “An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled ‘An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;’” further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, viz.

“To the Queen’s Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

“Your Majesty’s Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled “An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” and further continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Stockport, in the county and diocese of Chester, consisting of fourteen townships, contained a population of 66,616 persons:

“That there are, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to 2,000 persons, seven chapels in the said parish, viz. one in Disley, one in Marple, one in Romilly, one in Norbury, one in Hyde, and two in Stockport, which together afford accommodation to 8990 persons; that one of the said chapels, called the Chapel of Saint Thomas, in Stockport, and which was erected by your Majesty’s said Commissioners, and completed in 1825,

affords accommodation to 2,200 persons, including 972 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and that another of the said chapels, which is called Saint Peter’s Chapel, affords accommodation to 468 persons:

“Your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that the said parish should be divided into two distinct and separate parishes, under the 16th section of the said Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and that the said parishes should be named respectively, the parish of Saint Mary, in Stockport, and the parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport; and also that a particular district should be assigned to the said chapel, called Saint Peter’s Chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled “An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” and that such district should be named Saint Peter’s District;

“That the boundaries of the said parish of Saint Thomas, Stockport, should be as follows:

“From the point of boundary between Cheadle, Moseley, and Stockport in Edgeley, a little beyond the toll-bar; proceeding east along the centres of the Warrington-road, and Edward-street, crossing the Hill gate, down the centres of Cheapside and Waterloo as far as to the north side of Carrbrook; then south, along the east side thereof, to Hemshaw-bridge; then east, up the centre of Hemshaw-lane to the finger-post at Nadius’s corner; then along the highway, to and over Stockport-moor, to the turnpike-road, and along the centre of that road to the boundary of Bramhall, and (after including all that township), along the south western boundary of Stockport and Cheadle Moseley, to the point of commencement, together with and including all the township of Stockport Etchells, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and is therein coloured salmon:

“That the boundaries of Saint Peter’s District should be as follows:

“To commence at the south west corner of Knight-street, and then proceed, in a northerly direction, following the boundary line that divides the parish of Stockport from the parish of Cheadle, as far as the River Mersey; then following, in a south easterly direction, the centre of that river, as far as the passage, on the east of Copeland’s premises, along the centre of it into and across Chestergate; thence along the centre of Rock-row, Saint Peter’s-square, and Saint Peter’s-street, into the Wellington-road, down the centre of it to the middle of the first arch; thence along the centres of the Carr-green and Dawbank-roads to the point of commencement, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and therein coloured blue:

“That churchings and burials should be performed in the said last-mentioned chapel called Saint Peter’s Chapel; that the fees for churching

should be received by, and belong to, the Minister of the said chapel called Saint Peter's Chapel; and the fees for burials should be received by him, and be applied in the manner directed by an Act, passed in the 8th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for making a building, intended for a chapel, lately erected by William Wright, Esq. in the township of Stockport, and county and diocese of Chester, a perpetual cure and benefice, and for endowing the same.

"That the whole of the glebe land of the said parish lies within, and will belong to, the said parish of Stockport.

"That about two thirds of the tithes will arise in, and belong to, the said parish of Saint Mary, in Stockport; and about one third to the said parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport; that the glebe land and tithes of the said parish of Saint Mary, in Stockport, will be charged with the annual payment of the sum of eighty-seven pounds to the Minister of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport.

"That the said parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport, will be endowed with the sum of one thousand one hundred and thirty-three pounds four shillings and one penny farthing, 3 per Cent. Reduced Bank Annuities, purchased with the sum of one thousand pounds.

"That it is estimated that the amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, and other ecclesiastical dues which will accrue to the incumbent of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport, will be fifty pounds of the whole.

"That the consents of the Lord Bishop of Chester and of the Right Honourable George John Warren Lord Vernon (who is in his own right patron of the said parish church of Stockport), have been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of His Majesty King George the Third, to the said division of the said parish so to be effected under the said last-mentioned section of the said Statute; and the consent of the said Lord Bishop has been obtained as required by the 16th section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of His Majesty King George the Third, to the assignment of the said district to the said chapel of Saint Peter, and in testimony of such consents the said Lord Bishop and the said Lord Vernon have signed and sealed this present instrument.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above-stated circumstances, and to pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty's royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division and assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
