as before, put the same over the Duke of Cleveland's left shoulder, the Prelate pronouncing the admonition, after which his Grace had again the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and having received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, withdrew.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by command of the Sovereign, again called over the Knights Companions, who, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign, with the usual reverences.

The Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been pleased, by letters patent under Her royal sign manual and the great seal of the Order, to dispense with all the statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to installation, and to grant unto the Right Honourable Edward Earl of Derby and the Most Noble William-Harry Duke of Cleveland, Knights of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, full power and authority to exercise, respectively, all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if the said Earl of Derby and the said Duke of Cleveland had been formally installed, any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.
