

Timberland Thorpe, in the parish of Timberland, in the county of Lincoln.

An Act for discharging the inhabitants of the manor of Leeds, in the township and parish of Leeds, in the county of York, from the custom of grinding corn, grain, and malt at certain water corn mills, in the said manor; and for making compensation to the proprietor of the said mills.

An Act for enabling the General Cemetery Company to raise a further sum of money, and for amending the Act relating to the said Cemetery.

An Act for the better lighting and supplying the borough of Newark, in the county of Nottingham, and the neighbourhood thereof, with gas.

An Act for lighting with gas the town of Holmfirth, and the neighbourhood thereof, in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act for making a turnpike road from the town of Redruth, in the county of Cornwall, to and through the village of Hayle, in the parish of Phillack, in the same county.
