card to be delivered, as before directed, corresponding with the names sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the general regulation of the Customs," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that goods, of places within the limits of the East India Company's charter, shall be imported into such ports of the United Kingdom as shall be approved of by the Lords of the Treasury, and declared by an Order in Council, to be fit and proper for such importation; and whereas the port of Dundee has been approved of by the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury for that purpose;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the port of Dundee is a port fit and proper for the importation of goods from places within the limits of the East India Company's charter:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for removing doubts as to the appointment of a Dean of Exeter, or of any other cathedral church.

An Act to amend an Act of the thirty-ninth year of King George the Third, for the more effectual suppression of societies established for seditious and treasonable purposes, and for preventing treasonable and seditious practices, and to put an end to certain proceedings now pending under the said Act.

An Act for extending the copyright of designs for calico printing to designs for printing other woven fabrics.

An Act for the better protection of purchasers against judgments, Crown debts, lis pendens, and fiats in bankruptcy.

An Act for enabling the trustees of the British Museum to purchase certain houses and grounds for the enlargement of the museum, and making a suitable access thereto.

An Act to provide for the more effectual execution of the office of a justice of the peace within and adjoining to the district, called the Staffordshire Potteries, and for purposes connected therewith.

An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Great Western Railway, and to raise a further sum of money for the purposes of the said undertaking.

An Act to amend the Acts relating to the London and Southampton Railway Company, hereafter to be called the London and South Western Railway Company, and to make a branch railway to the port of Portsmouth.

An Act for granting further powers to the London and Greenwich Railway Company.

An Act to amend and enlarge the powers and provisions of the several Acts relating to the London and Croydon Railway.

An Act to alter, amend, and enlarge the powers and provisions of two several Acts, of the eleventh year of the reign of King George the Fourth, and first year of the reign of King William the Fourth, and fourth and fifth year of the reign of King Wil-

liam the Fourth, for improving the port and harbour of Perth, and the navigation of the River Tay to the said city.

An Act for enabling the Company of Proprietors of the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Navigation to raise a further sum of money.
