Thomas Glover, formerly of No. 19, Northampton-place, Old Kent-road, Surrey, then of No. 34, Sloane-street, Chelsea, Middlesex, Cabinet-Maker, and late of No. 19, Northampton-place, Old Kent-road, Surrey, Journeyman Cabinet-Maker to John Glover, of the same place, Cabinet-Maker.

William Drake, late of Shepherd's-bush, in the parish of Hammersmith, Middlesex, Foreman to a Brick-Maker.

Jonas Clitty, formerly of Send-beath, near Ripley, Surrey, General Smith, part of the time a Grocer, and late of the same place, out of business.

William Burnett, late of Carshalton, Surrey, Paper Maker and General Shopkeeper.

William Henry Heath, late of Bushey, Hertfordshire, Grocer, Cheesemonger, Tobacconist, Corn-Chandler, Oil and Colourman, Ginger Beer-Maker, and General Dealer.

Joseph Veal Garbett (sued as Joseph V. Garbett, sometimes known by the name of Joseph Veal), formerly of No. 9, Trinity-street, Southwark, then of John-street, Waterloo-road, both in Surrey, Journeyman Silversmith of Plate Glass, then of No. 13, Little College-street, Westminster, having a Workshop in Baldwin's gardens, Leather-lane, and late of No. 27, Saint John-square, all in Middlesex, Carver, Gilder, Looking-Glass Manufacturer, Plate-Glass Silverer and Polisher.

Samuel Green, formerly of No. 19, Macclesfield-street, City-road, Middlesex, then of No. 41, Bow-lane, Cheapside, London, then of No. 46, Shoe-lane, Holborn, London, having a Workshop at No. 12, Duke-street, Spitalfields, Middlesex, Brace, Belt, and Webb Manufacturer, afterwards of No. 12, Leather-lane, Hatton-garden, out of business, then of Wilkes street, Spitalfields, Middlesex, Webb-Weaver, his wife Managing the business of a Brace and Belt-Maker, for William Petty, her brother, at No. 46, Shoe-lane aforesaid, and late of No. 46, Shoe lane, out of business.

John Davison (sued with Richard Clark), formerly of Wallington-mills, Beddington, Surrey, Horse-Hair Manufacturer, and late of the same place, in copartnership with Richard Clark, trading under the firm of Davison and Clark, as Horse Hair and Seating Manufacturers.

George Wand, late of No. 79, Great Leonard-street, Paul-street, Shoreditch, Middlesex, Coach and Harness-Currier.

Henry John Murray, formerly of the Military College, Sandhurst, Berkshire, Student, then of No. 14, and afterwards of No. 11, both in High-row, Knightsbridge, Middlesex, then of No. 3, Sussex-place, Whitecombe, Bath, Somersetshire, Clerk in the Audit Office, Somerset house, and late of No. 27, Museum-street, Bloomsbury, Middlesex, out of business and employ.

Samuel Kemp, late of Bexley, previously of Broomfield-place, Deptford, both in the county of Kent, Boot and Shoe-Maker.

William Rathbone, late of No. 12, Clifton-street, Finsbury-market, Finsbury-square, also a part of the time residing in Upper Rosomond-street, Clerkenwell, both in Middlesex, Carpenter, Builder, Blind-Maker, Painter, and Glazier.
