They write from *Liege* that the Elector of *Cologne* was gone to pass some days at the Castle of *Modane*; and that *Monsieur de Choiseul*, who commanded his Electoral Highness's Forces, was returned to *France*. There are Letters from *Vienna* of the 15th Instant which speak of the death of the Brave Count *Starenberg* their Governour, who it is said died at *Raub* (whether he was carried from the Army) of a violent Fever.

Hague, October 27. The States-General have given leave to the *Herr Van Omers* their Ambassador in *England* to return thither for some more time to look after his private affairs. They tell us from *Vienna* that they had advice from the Camp before *Buda*, that the great Assault was to be made on the 15th of this Month.

Paris, October 28. We begin to discourse here of the approaching Assembly of the Clergy, which it is generally believed will produce matters of great Importance; The Deputies are already chosen in most of the Provinces of this Kingdom; and we are told the King has named the Arch-Bishop of *Sens* to preside in this Assembly in case of the absence of the Arch-Bishop of *Paris*. The King having appointed *Monsieur de Tambonneau* to go his Ambassador to the Swiss Cantons, he is preparing for his journey, which he will begin in a very short time. The *Sieur d'Amat*, the King's Ambassador at *Venice*, is to go and reside in the same Quality at the Court of *Portugal*. Our last advices from *Vienna* are of the 12th Instant; They tell us, that the Siege of *Buda* was carried on with a great deal of vigor, That the Imperialists had finished the communication between their Attack, and that of the Bavarians, which was a work of much difficulty; That the Bavarians had with a Battery of six Pieces of Cannon quite ruined one of the Towers of the Castle; and that they had lodged themselves very near it; That they were preparing two great Mines to enlarge the Breach, and that if they had the intended effect a general Assault would be made. That the Besieged continued to make a very resolute defence, hoping the weather will in a short time oblige the Christians to raise the Siege; Which is indeed the worst enemy the Besiegers have now to combat with; several of the General Officers are fallen sick; and the Duke of *Lorraine* it is said is taken ill again. We are assured that the Christians have since the beginning of this Siege lost 10000 Men, and among these above 60 Principal Officers.
