The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it was enacted, that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing, that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying, that the place or places mentioned in the said petition might be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition should be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the division of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs, in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," should, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the peace of the county of Wilts, assembled at the general quarter

sessions of the peace held at Warminster, in and for the said county of Wilts, on the second day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, have presented their petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the northern division of the said county is insufficient, and therefore praying, that the town of Chippenham may be a polling place for the said northern division:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act of the seventh year of His late Majesty's reign, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that the said town of Chippenham shall be a polling place for the said northern division; and further, that the justices of the peace for the said county, assembled in quarter sessions or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His late Majesty's reign, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide the said northern division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to appoint George Lloyd Hodges, Esq. late Her Majesty's Consul-General in Servia, to be Her Majesty's Agent and Consul-General in Egypt.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto William Busfeild, of Harden Grange, in the parish of Bingley, in the county of York, Esq. (in the Commission of the Peace for the said county); eldest son and heir at law of the late Currer-Fothergill Busfeild, of Cottingley-bridge, in the said parish of Bingley, Esq. deceased, by Sarah his wife (now his widow and relict), second daughter of John Ferrand, of Barnard-castle, in the county palatine of Durham, Esq. also deceased, Her Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he and his issue may henceforth take and use the surname of Ferrand, in addition to and after that of Busfeild, and that he and they may bear the arms of Ferrand; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office, otherwise the said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
