AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 30th day of *September* 1839,

PRESENT,

The **QUEEN's** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it was, amongst other things, enacted, that no goods should be imported into, nor should any goods, except the produce of the fisheries in British ships, be exported from, any of the British possessions in America, by sea, from or to any place other than the United Kingdom, or some other of such possessions, excepting to or from the several ports in such possessions called free ports, enumerated or described in the table in the said Act contained; and that if any goods should be imported into any port or place in any of the said possessions, contrary to the said Act, such goods should be forfeited; provided always, that, if His Majesty should deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any port or ports not enumerated in the said table, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such port or ports; and that from and after the day mentioned in such Order in Council all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the pro-

visions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject, nevertheless, to the limitations and restrictions thereafter provided, should extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to any such port or ports respectively as fully as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act:

And whereas Her Majesty doth deem it expedient to extend the before-mentioned provisions of the said Act, respecting such free ports, to the ports of *Windsor*, *Parsboro'*, *Cumberland*, *Shelburne*, and *Lunenburg*, in the province of *Nova Scotia*:

Now, therefore, under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers thereby in Her Majesty in Council in that behalf vested, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the provisions of the said Act, as far as the same relate to the free ports respectively therein mentioned, shall be, and the same are hereby, extended to the ports of *Windsor*, *Parsboro'*, *Cumberland*, *Shelburne*, and *Lunenburg*; in the province of *Nova Scotia*; and that, from and after the first day of December one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act conferred upon the free ports therein mentioned, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures in the said Act contained, subject to the limitations and restrictions therein provided, shall extend to the said ports of *Windsor*,

Parsboro'; Cumberland, Shelburne, and Lunenburg, in the province of Nova Scotia, as fully and effectually as if such ports had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it was enacted, that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing, that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying, that the place or places mentioned in the said petition might be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition should be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the division of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs, in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," should, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the peace of the

county of Wilts, assembled at the general quarter sessions of the peace held at Warminster, in and for the said county of Wilts, on the second day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, have presented their petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the northern division of the said county is insufficient, and therefore praying, that the town of Chippenham may be a polling place for the said northern division:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act of the seventh year of His late Majesty's reign, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that the said town of Chippenham shall be a polling place for the said northern division; and further, that the justices of the peace for the said county, assembled in quarter sessions or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His late Majesty's reign, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide the said northern division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for the assignment of chapelry districts, under the 16th section of the 69th George 3, cap. 134, to Saint James's Chapel, Saint Peter's Chapel, and Saint Stephen's Chapel, in the parish of Saint Mary, Islington, and to All Saints Chapel, in Trinity district parish, Islington, in the county of Middlesex:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 31st of July 1839, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also of the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act, further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine

service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such districts, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act; or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or required under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provisions of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting

small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws to the contrary notwithstanding ;" and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, viz.

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong for ten years Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Islington, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London, contained a population of 37,316 persons:

"That, besides the parish church and three district churches, which together afford accommodation for 7090 persons, there are five chapels in the said parish, viz. Saint James's Chapel, which affords accommodation to 1100 persons, including 500 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; All Saints Chapel, which affords accommodation to 1100 persons, including 500 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; Saint Peter's Chapel, which affords accommodation to 1200 persons, including 650 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; Saint Stephen's Chapel, which affords accommodation to 1000 persons, including 400 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and Saint Mary's Chapel, which affords accommodation to 1324 persons, including 365 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

"That all the said five chapels have been con-

secrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that, having taken all the circumstances attending this parish into consideration, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to each of the said chapels, called Saint James's Chapel, All Saints Chapel, Saint Peter's Chapel, and Saint Stephen's Chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should be named respectively, the All Saints' District, the Saint James's District, the Saint Peter's District, and the Saint Stephen's District, with boundaries as follows;

All Saints' District.

"This district is bounded on the north by Saint John's District, on the west by the parish of Saint Pancras, on the south by the parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, and on the east by Trinity District, and Saint James's District, as the boundary thereof is hereinafter more particularly described, namely; commencing on the outer edge of the footpath opposite the south east corner of the plot of ground in front of the Small Pox Hospital, Battle-bridge, the boundary line runs to the east, by the outer edge of the footpath, on the north side of the road from Paddington to Pentonville, to the front of No. 1, Bachelor's-row, twelve feet west of the east end of Pleasant-place; thence to the north by an imaginary line through the said house and premises to the rear thereof; thence, nearly in the same direction, by the line of a watercourse to an angle in the same on the east side of the new road from Battle-bridge to Holloway; thence, about two hundred and seventy-four feet, nearly in the same direction, crossing obliquely the said new road to a watercourse; thence, north east by east, again crossing the new road by the irregular line of the said watercourse or sewer to the northern boundary wall, by the premises belonging to No. 1, Southampton-street; thence to the east, by a brick wall and watercourse passing the northern ends of Cumming-street and Rodney-street; thence, by a continuation of the said brick wall, in an irregular line, to the end of Penton-street; thence, by an imaginary line across the said street, to the north west angle of premises 25, Penton-street, at the corner of the premises belonging to White Conduit House Tavern; thence, nearly in the same direction, by a row of poplars to the western angle of the rear walls of gardens belonging to certain houses on the north side of Warren-street; thence, by the said wall, and by the continuation of the same forming the northern boundary of premises belonging to No. 14, White Conduit-street; thence to the north, keeping centre line of the road in White Conduit-street to an angle at the south end of Islington-terrace; thence, north west by west, on the outer edge of the footpath on the south side of Copenhagen-street to

Francis-street; thence, nearly in the same direction, crosses the new road leading from Battle-bridge to Holloway; thence to the north east, on the outer edge of the footpath on the west side of the said road, to an angle at the west end of Albany-road; thence west, by an old hedge-row, about three hundred and sixty feet; thence north, by a line of an old hedge-row, to the footpath leading from Barnsbury-park to Copenhagen House; thence crosses the footpath by another line of hedge to the New Chalk-road; thence west, by an old hedge-row into Maiden-lane; thence across the lane to the ditch on the western side thereof; thence to the south by the irregular line of the said ditch, passing behind some cottages built on the waste ground adjoining the road near Bell Isle, to the bridge over the Regent's canal; thence, by a parapet on the west side of the said bridge, and about four hundred and seventy feet on the outer edge of the footpath on the west side of the said lane; thence, nearly in the same direction, by the line of the old ditch and the line of fences of certain premises abutting on the west side of the said lane, to the outer edge of the footpath in front of the houses on the west side of John-street; thence by the outer edge of the said footpath to the eastern side of the plot of ground in front of the Small Pox Hospital, to the south east thereof, as is more particularly described in the plan hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted blue.

Saint James's District.

"This district is bounded on the north by Saint John's District, on the west by All Saints' District, on the south by Trinity District and part of All Saints' District, on the east by Saint Mary's District, as the boundary thereof is hereinafter more particularly described, namely:—commencing at the west end of Albany-road; thence east on the outer edge of the footpath on the north side of the said road to an angle in the Liverpool-road or Back-road; thence north, on the outer edge of the footpath on the west side of the said road to a curve at the north end of Paradise-row; thence north east, keeping the outer edge of the footpath on the north side of the high road leading from Holloway to Islington Church; thence, nearly in the same direction, crosses the said road to Francis-street; thence, north east, passes through to the rear of No. 1 in the said place to an old irregular line of hedge-row at the back of the said place; thence north, keeping the same irregular line to Hornsey-lane, about fifty feet east of Appleby-place, then south west to an angle in the Holloway-road, on the outer edge of the footpath on the south east side of Hornsey-lane; thence south west, on the outer edge of the footpath on the east side of Holloway-road to the turnpike; thence obliquely crosses the said road to Cornwall-place; thence west, on the outer edge of the footpath on the south side of Cornwall-place obliquely to the Grove; thence, nearly in the same direction, crosses the road leading from Battle-bridge to Holloway to an old line of hedge-row; thence follows the said line to an angle at the south side of the New Chalk-road; thence south, by an old line of hedge opposite the west end of Albany-road; thence east, to the

outer edge of the footpath on the west side of the road leading from Battle-bridge to Holloway; thence crosses the said road to the outer edge of footpath on the north side of Albany-road, as is more particularly described in the plan hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted red.

Saint Peter's District.

"This district is bounded on the north by Saint Mary's District, on the west by the parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, on the south by the parish of Saint Luke's, and on the east by Saint Mary's District, as the boundary thereof is hereinafter more particularly described, namely:—commencing in the middle of the road opposite the Angel Inn, at the junction of the High-street with the City-road, the boundary line runs to the east along the middle of the City-road, and obliquely crosses the same to the boundary of certain houses, premises, and forecourts abutting on the north east side of Goswell-street-road; thence by the said boundary of the south party wall of No. 18, Frederick-place, in the said road; thence to the north east, along the line of the party wall to the rear wall of the said house; thence to the south east, by the line of the rear walls of Nos. 100 and 101, Goswell-road; to the north west boundary wall of No. 102; thence north east, by the line of the said wall, to the north east boundary wall of the premises belonging to the said house; thence south east, by the said wall and the southern party wall of No. 29, Sydney-street, to the front of the last-mentioned house; thence across the said street to the southern parts of No. 2, in the said street; thence, in the same direction, along the said party wall to the rear thereof; thence, by an imaginary line, to within about eleven feet east of the south west corner of No. 16, Sydney-place; thence nearly north, by an imaginary line, to the east flank wall of No. 5, Saint Vincent-place, City-road; thence to the north, across the said road, and through the middle of a street leading to Nelson-terrace, to an angle in the common sewer at the end of the said terrace; thence nearly east, by the line of the said sewer, passing under a shed belonging to No. 15, Nelson-place, by the corner of City-garden-row, across Macclesfield-street, and through part of the premises of Wharf No. 17, on the west side of the City-road-basin of the Regent's Canal to the said basin; thence across the said basin, nearly in the same direction, by the line of the aforesaid sewer which passes beneath the same, to the east side thereof; thence by the line of the same sewer, and in the same direction, to an angle in the same sewer on the east side of a new street; thence north, north west, by an imaginary line to an angle within a few feet of the south bank of the said canal at the end of the said new street; thence obliquely crosses the canal; thence west crosses Frog-lane; thence north west, keeping the line of the rear walls of gardens on the east side of River-lane, to the Lower-street; thence south west, keeping the centre line of the Lower-road, to the Station-house; thence, nearly in the same direction, keeping the centre line of the high road to the turnpike; thence south, to the centre line of road opposite the Angel Inn, at the junction of the

High-street with the City-road, as is more particularly described in the plan hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted yellow.

Saint Stephen's District.

"Saint Stephen's District is bounded on the north west and south by Saint Mary's District, and on the east by Saint Paul's District, as the boundary thereof is hereinafter more particularly described, namely; commencing at the north end of Marquis-terrace, Cannonbury-square; thence west, by an imaginary line to the south west angle of the said square; thence by the line of the west boundary wall to the rear wall of No. 1, in the said square; thence, nearly in the same direction, on the west side of Sable-street to Sebbon-street; thence, nearly in the same direction, in the centre of the road to the south end of the said street; thence east, by an imaginary line to the north end of Halton-street; thence south west, on the outer edge of the footpath on the east of the said street, to Cross-street, south east, crosses the Lower-road to the rear walls of houses on the east side of the Elder-walk; thence, nearly in the same direction, to the south west end of South-place; thence crosses South place to a watercourse on the south side of South-street; thence by the line of the said watercourse to the New-road; thence north west, on the south west side of the outer edge of the footpath, in the New North-road, to the Lower-road; thence, nearly in the same direction, crosses the Lower-road, and on the outer edge of the footpath on the south west side of Portland-place, to the centre of the bridge in the New North-road, on the south side of Cannonbury-terrace, to the rear wall of a house in the north angle of Marquis-terrace; thence west to the front of the said house in the said terrace, as is more particularly described in the plan hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted green.

"That baptisms and churchings should be performed in the said chapels, called Saint James's Chapel, Saint Peter's Chapel, and Saint Stephen's Chapel; and that baptisms, churchings, and burials should be performed in the said chapel, called All Saints' Chapel and that the fees arising therefrom in the said chapels, called Saint James's Chapel, Saint Peter's Chapel, and Saint Stephen's Chapel, should, from and after the avoidance of the parish church of Saint Mary, Islington, be received by, and belong to, the ministers of the said chapels respectively; and the fees arising from the offices performed in the said chapel, called All Saint's Chapel, should, from and after the avoidance of the district church of the Holy Trinity, in the said parish, be received by, and belong to, the minister of the said chapel called All Saints' Chapel.

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of London has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, in testimony of which the said Lord Bishop hath signed and sealed this present instrument.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore,

beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom may seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignments be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
