PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it was, amongst other things, enacted, that no goods should be imported into, nor should any goods, except the produce of the fisheries in British ships, be exported from, any of the British possessions in America, by sea, from or to any place other than the United Kingdom, or some other of such possessions, excepting to or from the several ports in such possessions called free ports, enumerated or described in the table in the said Act contained; and that if any goods should be imported into any port or place in any of the said possessions, contrary to the said Act, such goods should be forfeited; provided always, that, if His Majesty should deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any port or ports not enumerated in the said table, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such port or ports; and that from and after the day mentioned in such Order in Council all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the pro-

visions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject, nevertheless, to the limitations and restrictions thereafter provided, should extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to any such port or ports respectively as fully as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act:

And whereas Her Majesty doth deem it expedient to extend the before-mentioned provisions of the said Act, respecting such free ports, to the ports of *Windsor*, *Parsboro'*, *Cumberland*, *Shelburne*, and *Lunenburg*, in the province of *Nova Scotia*:

Now, therefore, under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers thereby in Her Majesty in Council in that behalf vested, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the provisions of the said Act, as far as the same relate to the free ports respectively therein mentioned, shall be, and the same are hereby, extended to the ports of *Windsor*, *Parsboro'*, *Cumberland*, *Shelburne*, and *Lunenburg*, in the province of *Nova Scotia*; and that, from and after the first day of *December* one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act conferred upon the free ports therein mentioned, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures in the said Act contained, subject to the limitations and restrictions therein provided, shall extend to the said ports of *Windsor*,

Parsboro', Cumberland, Shelburne, and Lunenburg, in the province of Nova Scotia, as fully and effectually as if such ports had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for the assignment of an ecclesiastical district to St. James's Chapel, at Longton, in the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent, in the county of Stafford, under the 21st section of the 58th Geo. 3, cap. 45:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 31st day of July 1839, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses; or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that

no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, in the words following, viz.

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the 1st year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, your Majesty's commission for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent, in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield, contained a population of 36,079 persons:

"That, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to 1600 persons, there are five chapels in the said parish (two of which have been recently erected by your Majesty's said Commissioners), and which together afford accommodation to 7940 persons:

"That one of the said chapels erected by your Majesty's said Commissioners, and which is called the Chapel of Saint James, at Longton, affords accommodation for 2000 persons, including 500 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

"That the said chapel has been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that the said parish should be divided into ecclesiastical districts, under the 21st section of the said Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and that one of the said districts should be assigned to the said chapel of Saint James at Longton, for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving the said chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the district attached to the said chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be named Longton District Parish, with boundaries as follows:

"The district parish of Longton is intended to comprise the whole of the ancient townships of Longton and Meir-lane-end, in the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent, in the county of Stafford, and such part of the township of Great Fenton, otherwise Fenton Calvert, in the same parish, as will lie within the limits or boundaries of the said district parish of Longton, hereinafter described (that is to say), commencing at the western extremity of a lane, called Ark's-lane, at its junction with the old turnpike road from New-

castle-under-Lyme to Uttoxeter; the boundary line of the said parish of Longton pursues, in an eastwardly direction, the antient boundary between the township of Great Fenton, otherwise Fenton Culvert aforesaid, and the township of Little Fenton, otherwise Fenton Vivian, in the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent, until it meets the antient boundary between the said township of Great Fenton, otherwise Fenton Culvert, and the township of Botslow, in the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent; which last-mentioned boundary it pursues in an eastwardly direction until it meets the boundary of the parish of Caverswall, in the said county of Stafford; and it then pursues, in a southwardly direction, the antient boundary between the said parish of Caverswall and the said township of Great Fenton, otherwise Fenton Culvert, until it meets the antient boundary between the said parish of Caverswall and the township of Meir-lane-end aforesaid, which it then pursues until it meets the antient boundary between the township of Longton aforesaid and the said parish of Caverswall; and it then pursues the antient boundary between the said township of Longton and the several parishes of Caverswall, Stone, and Trent-ham, in the said county of Stafford, until it meets the antient boundary line between the said township of Longton and the said township of Great Fenton, otherwise Fenton Culvert, which last-mentioned boundary it pursues to the point where the same boundary crosses the turnpike road from Fenton to Blurton; and it then proceeds in a northwardly direction along the centre of such road to Fenton-lane Toll-gate; and from thence in a northeastwardly direction along the centre of the highway called Fenton lane into the present turnpike road from Newcastle-under-Lyme to Uttoxeter aforesaid; and from thence along the centre of such turnpike road, in a westwardly direction, until it joins the centre of such last-mentioned road until it meets the antient boundary between the township of Great Fenton, otherwise Fenton Culvert, and the township of Little Fenton, otherwise Fenton Vivian aforesaid, at the western extremity of Ark's-lane aforesaid, where the description of the boundary line of the said parish of Longton commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and therein coloured red:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Lichfield has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; and the consent of William Taylor Copeland, Esq. William Moore, Esq. and Frederick Wright Tomlinson, Esq. the patrons of the parish church of Stoke-upon-Trent, have been obtained thereto, as required by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to authorize the sale, to the respective landowners, of all tithes and rectorial dues belonging to the rectory of Stoke-upon-Trent, in the county of Stafford, for endowing two new churches, and for other purposes;" in testimony whereof the said Lord Bishop and the said patrons, respectively, have signed and sealed this present instrument.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above-stated circumstances, and humbly to pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty's royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division and assignmeat be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
