

Schedules, are ordered to be brought up before the Court, at the Court-House, in Portugal-Street, Lincoln's-Inn-Fields, on Friday the 15th day of November 1839, at Nine o'Clock in the Forenoon, to be dealt with according to the Statute.

Joseph Tanton, formerly of High-street, Strood, in the county of Kent, Smith and Farrier, Coach-Builder and Wheelwright, Horse-Dealer and Omnibus-Proprietor, then and late of No. 14, Brougham-place, New-road, Chatham, Kent, out of business.

George John Spreadbury, late of Britannia-court, Peckham, previously of New Park-road, Streatham, out of business, and formerly of Broadwall, in the parish of Christchurch, all in Surrey, Licenced Victualler.

Henry Raphael (known by the name of Hyam Raphael), late of No. 5, Little White Lion-street, Seven Dials, Middlesex, General Dealer.

John Thomas Boor (sued as John Boor), formerly of No. 56, Old Bailey, London, Coffee-Housekeeper, then lodging at No. 20, Newgate-market, London, Steward of the Ariel Steam Boat, then of Farringdon-market, London, Coffee-Shopkeeper, and late of No. 119, Fleet-street, London, Coffee-Housekeeper and Licenced Retailer in Beer.

William Schultz, formerly a Prisoner for debt in the Debtors' Prison for London and Middlesex, out of employ, and late of No. 66, Dean-street, Soho, Middlesex, Tailor's Clerk.

James Smith, formerly of No. 1, Baker's-row, Walworth-road, then of Baker-street, Walworth-road, both in Surrey, Butcher, then of Hampshire-court, Mile-end-road, and late of No. 5, Picket-place, Strand, both in Middlesex, Journeyman Butcher.

Charles Kernot (sued and committed as Charles Kernott), lately lodging at No. 56, Totton-street, Stepney, before that residing at No. 5, Margaret-street, Limehouse, Warehouseman to Provision Merchants and Oil and Italian Warehouseman, formerly residing at No. 32, Bower-street, Ratcliff, all in Middlesex, Warehouseman as aforesaid, and Dealer in British Wines.

Joshua Wallis, formerly of No. 30, King-street, Camdentown, then of No. 28, Market-street, Edgeware-road, and late of No. 40, Augustus-street, Regent's-park, all in Middlesex, Waiter, wife a Laundress.

John Newbury, late of No. 13, Goswell-road, Middlesex, Haberdasher and Dealer in Fancy Goods and Straw Hat-Manufacturer.

On Monday the 18th day of November 1839, at the same Hour and Place.

Henry Feild (sued as Henry Field), formerly of No. 38, Gibson-square, Islington, Middlesex, and No. 31, Bush-lane, Cannon-street, London, and at Haggerstone, Middlesex, in copartnership with James Crane, as Varnish-Makers, under the firm of Henry Feild and Company, and late of No. 31, Bush-lane, Cannon-street, London, Varnish-Maker, out of business, having a Manufactory at Haggerstone, Middlesex, for a short period Traveller to Joseph Field, of Thornhill-street, Pentonville, Middlesex.

John Potter, formerly of Redcross-street, Cripplegate, London, then of No. 6, Holywell-lane, Shoreditch, and late of No. 90, Britannia street, City-road, both in Middlesex, Smith and Scale-Maker.

William Booth, formerly of the Cross Keys Tavern, Broad-street, Lambeth-butts, conducting the business there, till September 1836, for Emily Gills, now Emily Booth, next of the same place, carrying on business as a Licenced Victualler on his own account, and at the same time renting a House No. 24, Lambeth-road, Surrey, Carpenter and Victualler, next of the Fleet Prison, London, afterwards of the Cross Keys aforesaid, next of the County Prison for Surrey, in Horsemonger-lane, Surrey, next of the Queen's Bench Prison, Surrey, afterwards lodging, for one month, near Putney-bridge, Putney, Surrey, being at the same time of the Lambeth-road aforesaid, then again of the County Prison aforesaid, since the month of October 1837 out of business and employment, but having the name of Booth, Carpenter, over the Shop No. 24, Lambeth-road aforesaid, previously to the month of October 1837 Licenced Victualler, Carpenter, and occasionally Dealing in Coals.

Robert Sims, formerly of No. 3, Prospect-place, Holloway,

then of No. 1, Canonbury-lane, Canonbury-square, Islington, then of No. 1, Park-road, Dalston, all in Middlesex, and during all such time carrying on business in Newgate-market, London, Carcase Butcher, and late of Park-road, Dalston aforesaid, out of business.

Charles Thomas Carter (sued and committed as Charles Carter), formerly of Payne-street, White Conduit-fields, Islington, Middlesex, Foreman to James Lockhead, a China and Glass-man, of No. 5, High Holborn, Middlesex, then of No. 5, Garnault-place, Exmouth-street, Spa-fields, Middlesex, China and Glass-Dealer, and also Foreman to the said James Lockhead, and late of Nos. 32 and 33, Chalcraft-terrace, New-cut, Lambeth, Surrey, Assistant to Robert Stevens, of Nos. 32 and 33, Chalcraft-terrace aforesaid, a China and Glass-man.

Charles Robert Lewis, formerly of Nos. 32 and 33, Oakley-street, Lambeth, Surrey, Hair-Dresser, then of the sign of the Old Coach-Makers' Arms, No. 97, Long-acre, Middlesex, and late of King street, Richmond, Surrey, Pawnbroker and Salesman.

George Murrell, formerly of Compton, in the parish of Up Marden, and of Walderton, in the parish of Stoughton, both in the county of Sussex, and late of North Ambersen, in the parish of Steep, Hants, Miller and Maltster, and a Prisoner in the county Gaol for Surrey, in Horsemonger-lane, afterwards of the King's Bench Prison (now the Queen's Bench Prison), both in Surrey, and now a Prisoner in the Fleet Prison, in the city of London.

Benjamin Aynscomb, formerly of Chipstead, and late of Ewell, both in Surrey, Farmer.

Thomas Partridge, late of the Hot-house Tea-gardens, Wimbledon, Surrey, formerly Market Gardener and Florist, afterwards Market Gardener and Florist, and Keeper of a Tea-garden there, and lately for a short time Assistant to a Market Gardener and Florist.

TAKE NOTICE,

1. If any Creditor intends to oppose a Prisoner's discharge, notice of such intention must be given, by entry thereof in the proper page and column of the book kept for that purpose at the Office of the Court, between the hours of Ten in the Forenoon and Four in the Afternoon, three clear days before the day of hearing above mentioned, exclusive of Sunday, and exclusive both of the day of entering such notice and of the said day of hearing; but in the case of a Prisoner for the removal of whom for hearing in the country an order has been obtained, but not carried into effect by the Creditors, notice of opposition will be sufficient if given one clear day before the day of hearing.

2. The petition and schedule, and all books, papers, and writings filed therewith, will be produced by the proper Officer for inspection and examination, until the last day for entering opposition inclusive; and copies of the petition and schedule, or such part thereof as shall be required, will be provided by the proper Officer, according to the Act 7 Geo. 4, c. 57. sec. 76, or 1 and 2 Vict. c. 140, sec. 105, as the case may be.

3. Notice to produce at the hearing any books or papers filed with the schedule, must be given to the Officer having the custody thereof, within the hours above mentioned on any day previous to the day of hearing.

4. Opposition at the hearing can only be made by the Creditor in person, or by Counsel appearing for him.
