**I**T is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the twenty-fourth day of *October* instant, be further prorogued to Thursday the twelfth day of *December* next.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the general regulation of the Customs," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that goods, of places within the limits of the East India Company's charter, shall be imported into such ports of the United Kingdom as shall be approved of by the Lords of the Treasury, and declared by an Order in Council, to be fit and proper for such importation :

And whereas the several ports hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, *Dover*, in the county of

*Kent*; *Aberdeen*, in the county of *Aberdeen*; *Dundee*, in the county of *Angus*; *Exeter*, in the county of *Devon*; *Goole*, in the county of *York*; *Lancaster*, in the county of *Lancaster*; *Londonderry*, in the province of *Ulster*, *Ireland*; *Portsmouth* and *Southampton*, both in the county of *Hants*; *Sunderland*, in the county of *Durham*; and *Yarmouth*, in the county of *Norfolk*; have been approved of by the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury for that purpose ;

Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the said ports of *Dover*, *Aberdeen*, *Dundee*, *Exeter*, *Goole*, *Lancaster*, *Londonderry*, *Portsmouth*, *Southampton*, *Sunderland*, and *Yarmouth*, are fit and proper for the importation of goods from places within the limits of the East India Company's charter :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
