PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong for ten years Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches," some time since made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, stating that when the last census was taken, the parish of Walcot Saint Swithin, in the county of Somerset, and diocese of Bath and Wells, contained a population of twenty-six thousand and sixty-one persons, which has since considerably increased; that there are, in the said parish (besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to one thousand and three hundred persons,) three chapels, viz. Trinity Chapel, which affords accommodation to two thousand and sixteen persons, including one thousand eight hundred and ten free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; Saint Saviour's Chapel, which affords accommodation to one thousand and ninety-six persons, including five hundred and thirty-four free seats appropriated to the use of the poor, and Christ's Church Chapel, which affords accommodation to one thousand five hundred persons, including one thousand free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; that the said three chapels have been consecrated, and Divine service is regularly performed therein; that there are also four chapels, called Proprietary Chapels, in the said parish, which together afford accommodation to two thousand five hundred and sixty persons; and the said Commissioners further represented to your Majesty that having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appeared to them to be expedient that the said parish should be divided into three distinct and separate parishes, under the sixteenth section of the said Act, passed in the fiftieth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and that the said parishes should be respectively named the parish of Walcot Saint Swithin, the parish of Saint Saviour and Trinity parish, and that the boundaries of the said new parishes of Saint Saviour and Trinity, with boundaries as set forth in the said representation, and more particularly delineated in the map thereunto annexed; and the said Commissioners further repre-

sented to your Majesty, that the glebe land which lies within the said parish of Walcot Saint Swithin, is of the estimated annual value of twenty-five pounds ten shillings; and that which lies within the parish of Saint Saviour's, is of the estimated annual value of ten pounds ten shillings; that there is no glebe land within Trinity Parish; that the whole of the tithes should remain with, and belong to, the said parish of Walcot Saint Swithin, but that the same will be charged with the payment of the sum of ten pounds annually to the incumbent of the said parish of Saint Saviour, and with the further payment of ten pounds annually to the incumbent of the said Trinity Parish, which, together, have theretofore amounted to about one-third part of the value, or produce of the whole, that it is estimated that the annual amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, and other ecclesiastical dues, (including pew rents to the incumbents of Saint Saviour's and Trinity Parishes,) which will accrue to the incumbents of the said three parishes, would be in the same proportions, viz. to the incumbent of the parish of Walcot Saint Swithin, four hundred and ninety-eight pounds; to the incumbent of the parish of Saint Saviour, four hundred and thirty pounds, and to the incumbent of Trinity Parish, three hundred and ninety-eight pounds; that the consents of the Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, and of Thomas Woodham, Esquire, of Winchester, the patron of the said parish church of Walcot Saint Swithin have been obtained, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, and humbly praying that Her Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into Her Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to Her Majesty should seem meet; and whereas Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed into consideration, was, on or about the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, pleased, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it was accordingly ordered, that the proposed division should be accordingly made and effected agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

And whereas by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his or their consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it

is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a further representation to Her Majesty in Council, in the words following; viz.

Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that they did represent to your Majesty that, when the

last census was taken, the parish of Walcot Saint Swithin, in the county of Somerset, and diocese of Bath and Wells, contained a population of twenty-six thousand and sixty-one persons, which had since considerably increased, that there were in the said parish (besides the parish church, which afforded accommodation to one thousand three hundred persons) three chapels, viz., Trinity chapel, which afforded accommodation to two thousand and sixteen persons, including one thousand eight hundred and ten free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; Saint Saviour's chapel, which afforded accommodation to one thousand and ninety-six persons, including five hundred and thirty-four free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and Christ church chapel, which afforded accommodation to one thousand and five hundred persons, including one thousand free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; that the said three chapels had been consecrated and Divine service was regularly performed therein; that there were also four chapels in the said parish, which together afforded accommodation to two thousand five hundred and sixty persons; that your Majesty's said Commissioners having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient that the said parish should be divided into three distinct and separate parishes, under the sixteenth section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and that the said parishes should be respectively named, the parish of Walcot Saint Swithin, the parish of Saint Saviour, and Trinity parish; and that the boundaries of the said new parishes of Saint Saviour, and Trinity should be as follows, boundaries of Saint Saviour's parish, commencing at the river Avon, at Weymouth-street, running in a north-western line through Dover-street, Upper Dover-street, and Bennet's-lane, to the last house in Prospect-place, from thence following a footpath leading through Beacon-hill plantation, known as Jacob's Ladder, still following the line of the same footpath in front of Summerleaze-buildings, across a piece of pasture land known by the name of the Hind-park, and belonging to John Deverell, which ends the direct line of boundary between Saint Saviour's and Walcot Saint Swithin's parishes. The parish of Saint Saviour's will be bounded on the north by the parish of Charlecombe, on the east by the parish of Swainswick, and on the south by the river Avon, which forms the boundary between the parishes of Walcot Saint Swithin and Bath Week, and on the west by the parish of Walcot Saint Swithin, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map annexed to the said representation, and therein coloured green. Boundaries of Trinity parish, commencing at Edgar House, at the west end of Edgar-buildings proceeding in a line northward to the top of Miles-buildings and gardens; and from thence in a westerly direction to the circus end of Gay-street taking in the houses and gardens in that street, on both sides thereof; then along the foot way known as the gravel-walk to the bottom of Marlborough-buildings, taking in such footway; thence running in a north-western direction at the back of Marlborough-buildings and gardens; thence in a western direction along the road at the top of the Victoria-park, called

Weston-lane, leading to the parish of Weston, taking in such road, and then following on the western side in a southerly direction the boundary between the parish of Weston and Trinity parish, along the Bristol-road, in an easterly direction, and from thence in a southerly direction to the river Avon, and thence along the centre of the said river (which forms the boundary between the parishes of Walcot Saint Swithin and Lyncombe and Widcombe), and thence in a north direction, bounded by the parish of Saint James and the parish of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, and the parish of Saint Michael, ending at No. 4, in George-street, nearly opposite Edgar-house aforesaid, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map annexed to the said representation, and therein coloured red. That it was estimated that the annual amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, and other ecclesiastical dues (including pew rents to the Incumbent of Saint Saviour's and Trinity parishes), which would accrue to the Incumbents of the said three parishes, would be in the following proportions, viz., to the Incumbent of the parish of Walcot Saint Swithin's, four hundred and ninety-eight pounds, to the Incumbent of the parish of Saint Saviour, four hundred and thirty pounds, and to the Incumbent of Trinity parish, three hundred and ninety-eight pounds; that the consent of the Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, and of Thomas Woodham, Esquire, of Winchester, the patron of the said parish church of Walcot Saint Swithin's, had been obtained, as required by the before mentioned section of the said Act of the fifty-eighth year of His Majesty King George the Third, and in testimony of such consent the said Lord Bishop and the said Thomas Woodham had signed and sealed that instrument, your Majesty's said Commissioners begged leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above stated circumstances, and to pray that your Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty's Royal wisdom should seem meet; that your Majesty was graciously pleased, by and with the advice of your Majesty's Privy Council, by your Majesty's Order in Council, dated the thirtieth day of September 1839, to order that the said proposed division should be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts, which was accordingly done and notified, registered, and enrolled pursuant to the said Acts; that your Majesty's said Commissioners have lately been informed, by the within named Thomas Wood-

ham, that owing to an informality in the execution of one of the instruments relating to the title of the said persons from whom the said Thomas Woodham purchased the said advowson after mentioned, the said Thomas Woodham was not at the date of the said representation legally seized of, or beneficially entitled to the advowson of the said original parish church of Walcot Saint Swithin, but that the proper deeds and instruments have since been duly executed and perfected, whereby the said Thomas Woodham is now seized of the legal and beneficial estate in the advowson of the said original parish church of Walcot Saint Swithin; that by reason of the consent of the proper person as patron not having been obtained, your Majesty's said Order in Council for making the said division of the said parish is invalid and of no effect, that the facts stated in the said representation, with the exception above stated, remain the same, that the consents and approbation of the Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, and of the said Thomas Woodham, as patron of the said parish church of Walcot Saint Swithin, have been obtained as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the fifty-eighth year of His Majesty King George the Third, and in testimony of such consent and approbation, the said Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells has put his hand and episcopal seal, and the said Thomas Woodham has put his hand and seal at the foot of this present instrument; your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above-stated circumstances, and humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to revoke your Majesty's said Order in Council, and to make such further order for affecting the division of the said parish, according to the boundaries stated in the above-mentioned representation, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts, as to your Majesty's wisdom shall seem meet.

Her Majesty having taken the premises into Her Royal consideration, is pleased by, and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council of the thirteenth day of September 1839, be cancelled and revoked, and made null and void to all intents and purposes whatsoever; and Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice of Her said Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the division proposed and set forth in the said representation of the first of February 1840, and the map thereunto annexed, be made and effected agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
