From the Imperial Camp near Verovitz, Octob. 28.

Our General Count Leslie returned hither the 26th Instant from his late journey to Vienna, having met near Copranitz the Count d'Erdeudi Vice roy of Croatia, returning home with the Militia of that Countrey, whom he endeavoured to perswade to continue in the Field some short time longer, till the Enemy were retired into their Winter quarters, but could not prevail with them; At his arrival here he found only two Regiments of Foot, which were left to guard the Camp, the Count of Herbersteyn Governor of Carlsbadt being abroad with the rest of the Troops, who returned last night, having burnt the Towns of Soppia and Schladin which were not tenable, and the Suburbs of Weitzchein, and put a Garison of Germans and Croats into Bresowitz. This Morning Count Leslie marched with a detachment of Horse to visit the place where our Bridge was laid over the Drave, and where 200 Men are posted in two Forts for the security of the Provisions that are brought to our Camp by Water; but as for the repairing the said Bridge, which was broken by the overflowing of the River, it is judged impracticable at this time, and therefore our Gen-

ral has resolved quite to ruine it, and to cause the Materials to be carried to Verovitz, which place is fortifying with several new Works.

Vienna, Nov. 12. This day arrived here two Officers from Gran, who report, that they had been informed by the Countrey people, that the day after the raising the Siege of Buda, the Sersaquier Bassa entred the Town, with all the Principal Officers of the Army, and with 100 Camels and 40 Wagons laden with Provisions, and was received there with several discharges of their Cannon, and Volleys of small Shot, accompanied with hideous Shouts and Cries, and other their usual expressions of Joy; That the Sersaquier had immediately given Orders for the making a new Bridge over the Danube a little below Pest; and that all the Countrey-people of the neighborhood were summoned in to repair the Fortifications. From Hungary they write, that Count Tsekley was gone to Esperies to put that place in a posture of Defence. The Count de Thaur, whom the Emperor is sending to the Elector of Cologne, will part in a day or two.

Vienna, November 16. The Winter Quarters are assigned for the Troops that were before Buda; Those of Bavaria and Suabia are, as we have already told you, to have theirs in Upper-Hungary; and the Imperialists are to Winter in the Lower-Hungary, in Silesia &c. The Army according to our last advices was encamped in the Neighborhood of Gran, from whence they intended to march towards Arsol, where the Troops would separate in order to their going into their said Quarters, From Upper-Hungary we have advice that General Schultz was likewise about putting his Troops into their Winter Quarters, the season not permitting him to enter upon any farther Action this Campaign. Our Letters from Poland give us an account that the King was returned to Ruffenberg, having ordered his Troops to go into their Winter Quarters. The Imperialists have not yet abandoned Pest or Vaccia; but its feared they will not be able to keep these places this Winter. There are Letters from Newsol which give an account, that the famous Rebel Petenbasi having got together 4 or 500 Hungarians, was marching with them to attack some of the Berg-Towns, but that a party of Hussars and Heydukes who happened to be abroad, meeting the Rebels, had entirely defeated them, most of them being killed, and Petenbasi himself taken prisoner.

Cologne, November 21. Yesterday arrived here from Vienna the Sieur de Meyersheim Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Electors and the Princes on the Rhin, and understanding that the Elector of Cologne is still at Leige he has continued his Journey thither; It's said that his Electoral Highness has offered to assist the Emperor with 6000 Men against the Turks, and that he will maintain them till towards Spring, when his Imperial Majesty will first have occasion for them. The Affairs of this City are not yet settled; The present Magistrates are sending Deputies to Vienna to represent to the Emperor the true grounds and reasons of their late Proceedings, and to frustrate the

the solicitations which the relations of the Burgh-masters that were put out of the Magistracy and banished the City, are making at that Court on their behalf. The Elector of *Cologne* is expected back at *Bonne* the beginning of the next Month.

Hamburg, November 21. They write from *Cracow* that the King of *Poland* was returned from the Army to *Ruffenberg*; That the Troops were ordered to go into their Winter Quarters; and that a Dyet was summoned to meet at *Ruffenberg* the beginning of *January*.

Hague, November 24. The States of *Holland* and *West-Friesland* re-assembled this Day; and its believed they will at this meeting examine the differences arisen at *Dort* about the Election of their Magistrates. The 22d Instant Count *Waldecke* (who still keeps his Command of Veldt-Marschal in the Service of this State, though he be General of the Forces of the Empire) arrived here from *Culenburg*; and the next Day the Count *de Nassau* returned hither from *Bolduc*, whereof he is Governor. Yesterday likewise arrived here the Heer *Geede* Vice-Admiral of *Denmark*; but we do not hear that he comes with any publick Commission. The same Day a Conference was held at the House of the Baron *Foel* Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Denmark* between the said Envoy and some of the Members of the States General, deputed by them for that purpose. Lieutenant Admiral *Tromp* who has had a long fit of Sickness, is pretty well re-established in his Health. The Envoy from the Emperor of *Morocco* is gone from hence to *Amsterdam*, where he is to embark in order to his return home. The Sieur *Diest* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg* parted from hence the last Week, with an intention to go and pass some time at *Cleves*.

A General Rule made in the Court of Kings-Bench, Thursday next after Eight days of St. Martin, Anno 36. Car. Second. Reg.

This Court taking notice that the Clerks of the Peace, and the Common Clerks of several Cities, Towns and Boroughs within this Kingdom, have neglected the Duties of their several Offices, in extracting into the Court of *Exchequer* the Names of such persons who have been Indicted for absenting themselves from Church, having neglected to cause Proclamation to be made according to the form of the Statute for Convicting of such Offenders, but for their private advantage issue forth Process of *Capias*, and so continue the same *Ad infinitum*. It is ordered that at every General Quarter-Sessions of the Peace to be held within this Kingdom, Proclamation be made for such Offenders rendering their Bodies, as hath been antiently accustomed, and in default of rendering of their Bodies, that the said Clerks of the Peace, and Common Clerks do duly at the next Sessions following, extract their Names into the *Exchequer*: And the said Clerks of the Peace and Common Clerks are hereby required at their peril to perform the same. And it is ordered that the Justices of the Peace take care that the Law in this case provided be duly put in execution.

Canterbury, Nov. 12. This day His Majesties Gracious Charter lately Granted to this City, was met upon *Boughton-Hill*, about five miles from hence, by between five and six hundred Horsemen, and forty Coaches of the principal Gentry of the Country, and the most eminent persons of the Corporation, and so conducted to the West Gate of the Town, where they were received by six Companies of Foot, who made a Guard for them to the *Town Hall*; where His Majesties Charter being read, the Mayor and Aldermen were Sworn, with the Ceremonies usual in the like cases, and the Mayor entertained the whole company with a Col-

lation in the Afternoon, and all manner of demonstrations were shewed, of a Dutiful and Loyal acknowledgment of His Majesties most Gracious Favour to the said City.

Nottingham, Novemb. 20. Our Bridge over the River *Trent*, whereof six Stone Arches were broken down by the great Frost the last Winter, is by an extraordinary Charge of this Town perfectly repaired, so that Coaches and all sort of Carriage may now pass over it with security.

Westminster, November 20. *Elias Best*, who was some time since convicted upon an Information for speaking very Scandalous and Seditious words against the Government, and fled thereupon, having been lately apprehended, was this Day brought to the Kings Bench Bar, to receive the Judgment of the Court, which was, That he should pay a Fine of 1000 l. should stand thrice in the Pillory, and be bound with Sureties to the good Behavior during his Life, and be committed till the same be performed.
