From the Imperial Camp near Verovitz, Oftob.28. Our General Count Leflie returned hither the 26th Inftant from his late journey to Vienna, having met near Copranitz the Count d' Erdeudi Vice roy of Croatia, returning home with the Militia of that Countrey, whom he endeavoured to perfwade to continue in the Field fome fhort time longer, till the Enemy were retired into their Winter quarters, but could not prevail with them; At his arrival here he found only two Regi-ments of Foot, which were left to guard the Camp, the Count of Herbersteyn Governor of Carelfade being abroad with the reft of the Troops, who returned laft night, having burnt the Towns of Soppia and Scladin which were not tenable, and the Suburbs of Weitzchein, and put a Garilon of Ger-mans and Croats into Brefowitz. This Morning Count Leflie marched with a detachement of Horse to visit the place where our Bridge was laid over the Drave, and where 200 Men are polled in two Forts for the fecurity of the Provisions that are brought to our Campby Water; but as for the repairing the faid Bridge, which was broken by the overflowing of the River, it is judged impracticable ar this time, and therefore our General has refolved quite to roine it, and to caufe the Materials to be carried to *Verowitz*, which place is fortifying with feveral new Works.

Vienna, Nov. 12. This day arrived here two Officers fiom Gran, who report, that they had been informed by the Countrey people, that the day after the raifing the Siege of Buda, the Seralquier Baffa entred the Town, with all the Principal Officers of the Army, and with 100 Camels and 40 Wagons laden with Provisions, and was received there with feveral difcharges of their Cannon, and Volleys of small Shot, accompanied with hideous Shouts and Cries, and other their ufual ex-prefilions of Joy; That the Serafquier had imme-diately given Orders for the making a new Bridge over the Danube a little below Peff; and that all the Countrey-people of the neighborhood were fummoned in to repair the Fortifications. From Hangary they write, that Count Teck-ley was gone to Esperies to put that place in a posture of Defence. The Count de Thaun, whom the Emperor is fending to the Elector of Cologne, will part in a day or two.

Vienna, November 16. The Winter Quarters are affigned for the Troops that were before Buda; Those of Bavaria and Suabia are, as we have al-ready told you, to have theirs in Opper-Hungary; and the Imperialists are to Winter in the Lower-Hungary in Silefia & c. The Army according to our last advices was encamped in the Neighbourhood of Gran, from whence they intended to march towards Arfol, where the Troops would leperate in order to their going into their faid Quarters. From Upper-Hungary we have advice that General Schultz was likewife about putting his Troops into their Winter Quarters, the fealon not permitting him to enter upon any farther Action this Campagne. Our Letters from Poland give us an account that the King was returned to Ruffemberg, having ordered his Troops to go into their Winter Quarters. The Imperialifs have not yet abandoned Pefl or Vaccia; but its feared they will not be able to keep these places this Winter. There are Letters from Newfol which give an account, that the famous Rebel Petenbafs having got together 4 or 500 Hungarians, was marching with them to at-tack fome of the Berg-Towns, but that a party of Huffars and Heydukes who happened to be abroad, meeting the Rebels, had entirely defeated them, moft of them being killed , and Petenbafi himfelf taken prifoner.

Cologne, November 21. Yefterday arrived here from Vienna the Sicur de Meyersbeim Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Electors and the Princes on the Rbin, and understanding that the Elector of Cologne is still at Leige he has continued his Journey thither; It's faid that his Electoral Hignets has offered to affift the Emperor with 6000 Men against the Turks, and that he will maintain them till towards Spring, when his Impe ial Maj fly will first have occasion for them. The Affairs of this City are not yet fetled; The prefent Magistrates are, fending Deputies to Vienna to represent to the Emperor the true grounds and reasons of their late Proceedings, and to frustrate the the follicitations which the relations of the Burgermatters that were put out of the Mageffracy and banished the City, are making at that Court on their behalf. The hlector of Cologna is expected back at Bonne the beginning of the next Month. Hamburg, November 21, They write from

Cracow that the Kirg of Poland was returned from the Army to *Kuffemberg*; That the Troops were ordered to go into their Winter Quarters; and that a Dyet was lummoned to meet at Ruffemberg the beginning of Funnary. Nonember 24. The States of Holland

and Weft-Frizeland re' allembled this Day; and its believed they will at this meeting examine the differences arilen at Dort about the Election of their Magistrates. The 22d Inflant Count Waldecke (who ftill keeps his Command of Veldt-Mareschal in the Service of this State, though he be General of the Forces of the Empire) arrived here from Culenburg ; and the next Day the Count de Naffaw seturned hither from Bolduc, whereof he is Go-vernor. Yesterday likewile arrived here the Heer Geede Vice-Admiral of Denmark; but we do not hear that he comes with any publick Commillion. The lame Day a Conference was held at the Houle of the Baron Foel Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark between the faid Envoy and fome of the Members of the States General, deputed by them for that purpole. Lieute-nant Admiral Tromp who has had a long fit of Sickneis, is pretty well re-effablished in his Health. The Envoy from the Emperor of Morocco is gone from hence to Amsterdam, where he is to embark in order to his return home. The Sieur Dieft Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bran-denburg parted from hence the last Week, with an intention to go and pais fome time at Cleves.

This Court taking notice that the Clerks of the Peace, and the Common Clerks of feveral Cities, Towns and Boroughs within this Kingdom, have neglected the Daties of their several Offices, in extracting into the Court of Exchequer the Names of fuch perfons who have been Indicted for abienting themselves from Church, having neglected to caufe Proclamation to be made according to the form of the Statute for Convicting of fuch Offenders, but for their private advantage illue forth Process of Capias, and fo. continue the same Ad infinitum. It is ordered that at every General Quarter-Selfions of the Peace to be held within this hingdom, Proclamation be made for such Offenders rendring their Bodies, as hath been antiently accuftomed, and in d fault of ren-dring of their Bodies, that the faid Clerks of the the Peace, and Common Clerks do duely at the next Seffions following, extract their Names into. the Exchequer : And the faid Clerks of the Peace and Common Clerks are hereby required at their peril to perform the fame. And it is ordered that the Juffices of the Peace take care that the Law in this cafe provided be duely put in exedu ion.
