

NOTICE is hereby given, that a meeting of the creditors of John Skerrett, late of the parish of Little Cowarne, in the county of Hereford, Farmer, an insolvent debtor, discharged from Her Majesty's Prison of Hereford, in the county of Hereford, in or about the month of June 1818, under and by virtue of an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and consolidate the laws for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors in England," will be held on Tuesday the 28th day of April instant, at the office of Mr. Aston, Solicitor, St. Peter's-street, in Hereford, to approve and direct in what manner, and at what place or places, the real estate of the said insolvent shall be sold by public auction.—Dated the 7th day of April 1840.

THE respective creditors, under two several insolvencies, of Benjamin Fox, heretofore of Craven-cottage, Craven hill, Bayswater, in the county of Middlesex, an officer in the army, otherwise described as formerly of Old Brompton, in the said county of Middlesex, a Lieutenant in the 1st Regiment of Life Guards, afterwards of Bayswater, in the said county of Middlesex, and late of Dorchester, in the county of Oxford, Gentleman, an insolvent debtor, who was, in or about the month of June 1816, discharged from Her Majesty's Debtors' Prison for London and Middlesex, Whitecross-street, in the city of London, under and by virtue of an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the fifty-third year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors in England;" and also of another Act to amend the same; and who was, in or about the month of August 1828, again discharged from the same prison under and by virtue of another Act of Parliament, made and passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King George

the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and consolidate the Laws for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors in England," are desired to meet Benjamin Brown, the assignee of the said insolvent's estates under both insolvencies, on Monday the 27th day of April instant, at twelve o'clock at noon precisely, at the office of Messrs. Goode, situate No. 44, Howland-street, Fitzroy-square, in the said county of Middlesex, to assent to or dissent from the said assignee compromising a suit instituted in Her Majesty's High Court of Chancery, wherein the said Benjamin Brown is plaintiff, and John Thomas Quillinan and others are defendants, to compel the taking of an account of the arrears of an annual sum of £90 which were due to the said insolvent at the time of the said first insolvency, and have since become due under certain articles of agreement, dated the 30th day of August 1809, made previously to the marriage of the said insolvent with Ann his late wife, and to compel payment of such arrears to the said assignee; also to compel the taking of an account of the rents and profits, and arrears of rents and profits, of a certain freehold house in Essex-street, Strand, in the said county of Middlesex, due from and unpaid by the tenant at the time of the first insolvency of the insolvent, and which have since arisen or become due, and of the receipt and application of such rents and profits; also to compel the performance, by the real and personal representatives of John Quillinan, deceased, of a certain covenant of the said John Quillinan, contained in the said articles of agreement, and an admission of assets or account, and distribution of the real and personal estates of the said John Quillinan; also to compel a sale, if necessary or expedient, of the said house in Essex-street, and an application in the meantime of the rents and profits of the said house, in or towards satisfaction of the arrears and growing instalments of the said £90 a year, and the appointment of a receiver of such rents and profits.—Dated this 8th day of April 1840.
