This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to impose duties of excise on sugar manufactured in the United Kingdom.

An Act for better enforcing church discipline.

An Act to further amend the church building Acts.

An Act to provide for the sale of the clergy reserves in the province of Canada, and for the distribution of the proceeds thereof.

An Act to provide for the solemnization of marriages in the districts in or near which the parties reside.

An Act to defray the charge of the pay, clothing, and contingent and other expences of the disembodied militia in Great Britain and Ireland, and to grant allowances, in certain cases, to subaltern officers, adjutants, paymasters, quartermasters, surgeons, assistant-surgeons, surgeons-mates, and serjeant-majors of the militia, until the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty-one.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her  
Majesty in Council, for the assignment of  
an ecclesiastical district to Trinity Church, at Cole-  
ham, in the parish of St. Julian, Shrewsbury, in the  
county of Salop, under the 21st section of the 58th  
George 3, cap. 45:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the  
22d day of May 1840, present, the Queen's  
Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth  
year of the reign of His late Majesty King George  
the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and  
promoting the building, of additional churches in  
populous parishes," it is, amongst other things,  
enacted, "that in every case in which the Com-  
missioners appointed for carrying into execution  
the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that  
it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or  
more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesias-  
tical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the  
said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop  
of the diocese in which such parish is locally situ-  
ated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to  
the patron or patrons of the church of such parish  
for his consent to make such division, and for  
such patron or patrons to signify his or their  
consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and  
the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of  
the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the  
whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall  
state in such representation the bounds by which it  
is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide  
such parish, together with the relative and respective  
proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other  
endowments, which will by such division arise and  
accrue, and remain and be within each of such re-  
spective divisions, and also the relative proportions  
of the estimated amount of the value or produce of  
fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or  
profits which may arise and accrue within each of such  
respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty  
in Council shall think fit to direct such division,  
to be made, such Order of His Majesty in  
Council shall be valid and good in law for the  
purpose of effecting such division; provided always,  
that no such division of any parish into distinct  
parishes shall completely take effect until after  
the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the  
existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;"  
and it is, by the 21st section of the said  
Act, further enacted, "that in any case in  
which the said Commissioners shall be of  
opinion that it is not expedient to divide  
any populous parish or extra parochial place  
into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes,

as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,"

and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong for ten years Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of St. Julian, Shrewsbury, in the county of Salop and diocese of Lichfield, contained a population of 2996 persons:

"That, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation for 900 persons, there is one chapel, recently erected in the said parish, called Trinity Church, which affords accommodation for 812 persons, including 508 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

"That the said chapel has been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that the said parish should be divided into two ecclesiastical districts, under the 21st section of the said Act passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and that one of the said districts should be assigned to the said chapel, called Trinity Church, for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving the said chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the said district attached to the said chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be named the District Parish of Trinity Church, Coleham, with boundaries as follows:

"Such district to consist of the township of Coleham, which is bounded on the north by the River Severn; on the east by the parish of Holy Cross and St. Giles; on the south and south west by the River Rea, which divides the parish of Saint Julian from the parish of Sutton, to the point where these parishes join the parish of Meole Brace; on the south west by the parish of Meole Brace to the River Severn; on the north where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and therein coloured blue:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Lichfield has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and in testimony of such approbation the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above-stated circumstances, and humbly to pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty's royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice

of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
