PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act for better defining the powers of Justices within the Metropolitan Police District," it was, amongst other things, enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to constitute within the Metropolitan Police District, so many Police Court Divisions as to Her Majesty should seem fit; and to define the extent thereof, and, from time to time, to alter the number and extent of such Police Court Divisions, and to assign a division to each of the Police Courts already-established; and to establish a Police Court for each of the other divisions; and that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, if She should think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that a Police Magistrate or Magistrates

should attend regularly at any Police Court or Courts thereafter to be established, either daily, or on such days and times as Her Majesty, by the advice aforesaid, should order.

BOW-STREET POLICE COURT.

Her Majesty, therefore, is pleased, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), from the River Thames at the Temple-stairs westward, along the said river, to the north side of Westminster-bridge; thence along the centre of Bridge-street, in a straight line to and along the centre of Great George-street to Storey's-gate; thence along the boundary line of Saint James's-park to Buckingham-gate; thence along the centre of Stafford-row, to and along the centre of Arabella-place, of Lower Grosvenor-place, and of Grosvenor place, to Hyde-park-corner; thence eastward along the boundary of the Green-park and Saint James's-park (including Saint James's-palace), to the west side of Spring-gardens; thence along the south and east sides of Trafalgar-square to Saint

Martin's-lane; thence northward along the centre thereof, and of Upper Saint Martin's-lane; of Little Saint Andrew-street (including the Seven Dials), of Great Saint Andrew-street, and of King-street to Broad-street; thence eastward along the centre thereof to and along the centre of High Holborn to the boundary of the city of London; and thence southward along the said boundary to the Temple-stairs aforesaid; shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the police court called "Bow-street Police Court."

QUEEN-SQUARE POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), from the south-west side of Westminster-bridge, in a line running westward along the centre of Bridge-street, to and along the centre of Great George-street, to Storey's-gate; thence along the boundary line of Saint James's-park to Buckingham-gate; thence along the centre of Stafford row, of Arabella-place, of Lower Grosvenor-place, and of Grosvenor-place, to Hyde-park-corner; thence westward along the Knightsbridge-road; thence south-westward along the centre of Queen's-buildings, Brompton-row, and of Michael's-place; thence along the Fulham-road to Sandford-bridge; thence southward along the Kensington-canal to the River Thames; thence eastward along the said river to the south side of Westminster-bridge, shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the police court called "Queen square Police Court."

MARLBOROUGH-STREET POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), from the Victoria Gate, Hyde-park, on the Uxbridge-road, in a line running eastward along the centre of the said road, of Oxford-street, of High-street Saint Giles', and of Broad-street to King-street; thence southward along the centre of King-street, and of Great Saint Andrew-street, of Little Saint Andrew-street, of Upper Saint Martin's-lane, and of Saint Martin's-lane, to the north east corner of Trafalgar-square; thence (including the area of the said square) to the south-west corner thereof; thence in a straight line to the

west side of Spring-gardens; thence along the boundary of the Saint James's and Green-parks to Hyde-park-corner; thence along the Knightsbridge-road to the Park-gate, opposite the Camden Arms Public-house; thence along the boundary of Kensington-gardens (including Kensington-palace and the said gardens), to the Victoria Gate, Hyde-park, in the said Uxbridge-road; shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the police court, called "Marlborough Street Police Court."

MARY-LE-BONE POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), on the south by a line commencing at Victoria Gate, Hyde-park, and extending eastward along the centre of the Uxbridge-road, and of Oxford-street; thence northward along the centre of Tottenham-court-road to the New-road; thence north-eastward along the centre thereof, to Maiden-lane; thence northward along the centre of Maiden-lane, to the North Cemetery; thence south-westward to and including Kilburn-wells; thence south to Westbourne-green (including the same) and to the Victoria Gate, Hyde-park; shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the police court called "Mary-le-bone Police Court."

HATTON GARDEN POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), from the boundary of the city of London on Holborn-hill in a line running westward along the centre of Holborn, of Broad-street, and of High-street; thence northward along the centre of Tottenham-court-road, to the New-road; thence north-eastward along the centre thereof to Maiden-lane; thence northward along the centre of Maiden-lane to Hornsey-lane; thence eastward to Stamford-hill; thence southward to and along Stoke Newington High-street; thence to and along the centre of the Kingsland-road, to the Regent's canal; thence westward along the same to the New River; thence southward along the centre of Goswell-street, to Charter-house-square; thence along the boundary of the city of London, to the corner of Hatton-garden Holborn-hill; shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to

the police court called "Hatton Garden Police Court."

WORSHIP STREET POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), from the boundary of the city of London, at the corner of Goswell-street, running northward along the centre of the same, to the City-road; thence along the centre of Duncanterrace, to the Regent's-canal; thence eastward along the same, to the Kingsland-road; thence northward along the centre thereof, and of Stoke Newington High-street, to Stamford-hill; thence south-eastward, to Lea-bridge; thence along the Hackney-cut, to Old Ford-road; thence westward along the centre thereof, to and including Bethnal-green; thence southward along Dog-row; thence westward to Spital-fields, along the centre of Princes-street and Wentworth-street, to the boundary of the city of London, at the corner of the said last-mentioned street; and thence along the said city boundary, to the corner of Goswell-street; shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the police court called "Worship-street Police Court."

LAMBETH-STREET POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), from the Tower-stairs, on the river Thames, in a line running northward along the boundary of the city of London, to the corner of Wentworth-street; thence eastward along the centre thereof, and of Old Montague-street, Princes-street, and Northampton-street, to Cambridge-road; thence northward along the centre thereof, to Old Ford-bridge; thence to and along Old Ford-road, to and including Bow; and thence to the river Lea; thence southward along the river Lea, to the north-east corner of the East India-dock; thence westward along the centre of the East India-dock-road, and of the Commercial-road, to the corner of Cannon-street-road; thence southward along the centre thereof, and of Cannon-street, to Ratcliff-highway; thence westward along the centre of the same, and of Parsons'-street, to East Smithfield; thence southward to and along the centre of Nightingale-lane, to Hermitage-dock; thence westward along the boundary of the river Thames, to Tower-

stairs, including the Tower of London, and the liberty thereof; shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the police court called "Lambeth-street Police Court."

THAMES POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), from the river Thames, at Old Gravel-lane-stairs, in a line running northward along the centre of Old-Gravel-lane, and extending to and along the centre of Cannon-street and Cannon-street-road, to the Commercial-road; thence eastward along the centre thereof, and of the East India-dock-road, to the north of and including the East India-docks, to the river Thames; thence westward along the boundary of the said river, to Hermitage-dock; thence northward to and along the centre of Nightingale-lane, to East Smithfield; thence eastward to and along the centre of Parsons'-street, and of Pennington-street, to Old Gravel-lane; thence southward to and along the centre thereof, to the river Thames, at Old Gravel-lane-stairs; shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the police court called "Thames Police Court."

UNION-HALL POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary (that is to say), from Dock-head, in a line running northward to the river Thames; thence westward along the said river to Waterloo-bridge; thence southward to Vauxhall-bridge; thence south-eastward to and along the New-road and Bridge-street, to the Oval at Kennington; thence to and along the New Camberwell-road; thence eastward to and along Church-street, Camden-terrace, Paradise-place, and High-street; and thence to Ebenezer-place; thence northward to and along Pomeroy-street to the Dover-road; thence to and along the Kent-road to the boundary line between the parishes of Rotherhithe and Bermondsey; and thence along the said boundary to the river Thames; and thence along the river to Dockhead aforesaid; shall constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the police court called "Union-hall Police Court."

And whereas by an Order in Council, bearing date the third of October in the present year, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, did order

that certain parishes and places in the counties of Surrey and Kent, therein expressly mentioned, described and set forth, should constitute a police court division; and that a police court for such division should be holden at Greenwich, in the county of Kent; and that certain other parishes and places in the county of Kent, therein particularly mentioned, set forth and described, should constitute a police court division, and that a police court for such division should be holden at Woolwich, in the county of Kent; and Her Majesty, by the said Order in Council, did order that the magistrates thereafter to be appointed for the said divisions respectively, should attend at the said respective police courts, on the days and at the times, and in the manner therein particularly expressed and set forth.

And whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, has deemed it expedient to rescind and vacate the said order, and to make and give such other order in lieu thereof, as is hereinafter contained, ordered, and set forth.

Her Majesty is pleased, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the said Order in Council hereinbefore particularly mentioned, be vacated, revoked, and rescinded.

And Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the parishes of Greenwich, Saint Nicholas Deptford, that part of Saint Paul's Deptford which is within the county of Kent, the parishes of Lewisham and Lea, in the county of Kent; Rotherhithe; that part of Saint Paul's Deptford which is within the county of Surrey; and the hamlet of Hatcham, in the county of Surrey; shall henceforth be constituted a police court division, and that a police court shall be established for such division to be holden at Greenwich, in the county of Kent; and that the parishes of Plumstead, Woolwich, Charlton, Eltham, the liberty of Kidbrooke, and the hamlet of Mottingham, in the county of Kent, shall, from henceforth, be constituted a police court division, and that a police court for such division shall be holden at Woolwich, in the county of Kent.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the magistrates who shall have been, or shall hereafter be, appointed for the respective divisions of Greenwich and Woolwich, shall attend

daily at such respective courts, excepting Sundays, Christmas-day, Good Friday, or any day appointed for a public fast or thanksgiving; and that one of the magistrates appointed, or to be appointed as aforesaid, shall attend at the said Greenwich police court, from ten of the clock in the morning until half past one of the clock in the afternoon; and that one of the said magistrates shall attend at the said Woolwich police court, from half-past two of the clock in the afternoon, until five of the clock in the afternoon, and longer if (in the discretion of the magistrate) it shall be deemed to be necessary for the dispatch of business.

And the Most Noble the Marquess of Normanby, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE Right Honourable the Viscount Palmerston, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, having received a dispatch from Captain Elliot, Chief Superintendent of British Trade in China, dated the 24th of June 1840, inclosing the copy of an official notice, dated the 22d of the same month, issued by Sir James John Gordon Bremer, C. B. K. C. H. Commander in Chief of Her Majesty's ships and vessels of war on the East India Station and Seas adjacent, that a blockade of the river and port of Canton, by all its entrances, would be established on and after the 28th of the said month of June: notice is hereby given, that, from and after the said time, all the measures authorised by the Law of Nations and the respective treaties between Her Majesty and the different Foreign Powers, will be adopted and executed with respect to any vessels which may attempt to violate the said blockade.

Captain Elliot has likewise transmitted a further official notice, issued on the 22d of June 1840, by the said Commander in Chief, stating that, with a view to the convenience of British and other Foreign merchant ships resorting to the coast of China, in ignorance of the blockade of the river and port of Canton, the Senior Officer on that station had been instructed to permit them to repair to, and remain at, any anchorages in the neighbourhood of the port which he may see fit to indicate from time to time;

and that, until further notice, it was to be understood that the anchorages of rendezvous for such purposes of convenience would be Cap Suymoon and Macao Roads.

DISPATCHES, of which the following are copies or extracts, were yesterday received at this Office, addressed to Richard More O'Ferrall, Esq. by Admiral the Honourable Sir Robert Stopford, G. C. B. Commander in Chief of Her Majesty's ships and vessels in the Mediterranean:

*Princess Charlotte, D'journe Bay, near
SIR, Beyrout, October 1, 1840.*

I BEG leave to enclose, for their Lordships' information, copies of four letters which I have received from Captain Collier, of Her Majesty's ship *Castor*, whom I had directed, in conformity with my instructions, to embarrass the Egyptian forces in possession of the towns on the coast from Beyrout to Jaffa, and encourage and support the faithful subjects of the Sultan; detailing his proceedings at Caiffa, Jaffa, and Tsour, of which last we still hold possession; in the execution of which duties that zealous Officer, and all concerned in these active operations, as particularized in his letters, have shewn themselves worthy of their Lordships' favourable attention.

It is pleasing to observe, that all this service has been performed without the loss of a man; but I regret Lieutenant Macdougall, and Mr. Gill, carpenter of the *Pique*, were severely wounded by accident, though both are now doing well.

*Her Majesty's Ship Castor, off Acre,
SIR, Sept. 20, 1840.*

IN compliance with your orders of the 14th instant, I have the honour to acquaint you that the *Castor*, with *Pique* and Ottoman frigate *Dewan*, appeared off Caiffa on the evening of the 16th; and the following morning, about six o'clock, a boat was dispatched with an Officer of the Turkish frigate, accompanied by Lieutenant Shadwell, in one from this ship, and both bearing flags of truce, to demand the surrender of the place to the Sublime Porte; the flag was refused, and peremptorily warned off; the ships took up their berths, Lieutenant Wellesley of this ship ably assisting in placing the Ottoman frigate, and a fire was opened on the batteries, *Castor* commencing, which were manned and ready to receive us, with five hundred men in the town, but such was the effect of the first few broadsides, that the troops abandoned their posts, deserted the town, leaving their arms, knapsacks, &c. in all directions. The Ottoman flag was soon planted on the ramparts by Lieutenant Patey, accompanied by Lieutenant Winthrop, Messrs. Connolly and Boyd, mates, Mr.

Hare, midshipman, and Mr. Cole, second master, who were immediately joined by Lieutenants Carey and Macdougall, and a party of seamen and marines from the *Pique*, and the whole party proceeded to spike and destroy by knocking off the trunnions and burning the carriages of the 5 guns on the ramparts; a quantity of arms, stores, and munitions of war, were found in the magazine, all of which were either brought off or destroyed, amongst which were two-thirteen inch mortars, which were put on board the Ottoman frigate.

The following morning, the 18th, the *Castor* shifted her berth, to cover the entrance to the Acre gate, at the distance of one mile from which, five hundred troops were distinctly seen drawn up. Towards the middle of the day, an Officer with a few men had planted themselves in a castle, mounting five guns, in the rear of and commanding the town, but the well directed fire of the *Pique* and *Castor* soon wounded the Officer and dislodged the men, some of the latter seeking safety on board this ship. Considering the destruction of this castle and its guns most desirable, I ordered the marines of the two frigates, with their respective Officers, Lieutenants Varlo, Moubray, and Hamley, Lieutenant Wellesley, Messrs. Cockburn and Gibbard, mates, Mr. Foley, midshipman, and Mr. Ramage, clerk, with a few seamen, and all under the command of Lieutenant Patey, senior Lieutenant of this ship, on that service, which was gallantly and completely executed, by the guns being thrown out, and the walls shook to their foundation, and this in full view of five hundred of the Egyptian army.

I am pleased to observe, that this service has been performed without the loss of a man, although I am grieved to say that Lieutenant Macdougall, of the *Pique*, has been severely wounded by the discharge of one of the enemies guns whilst in the act of spiking it, and also Mr. Gill, carpenter of that ship, by the same explosion.

To my much valued friend Captain Boxer, who has been unceasing in his exertions, both on shore and on board, in the execution of this service, I am much indebted for the success of the enterprise. The destruction of the defences of the town has been most complete; some prisoners have been taken, and many deserters have come over to us. I have great pleasure in apprizing you that the zealous co-operation of the Ottoman frigate *Dewan*, on the service, has been highly meritorious to all on board, and calls for my warmest approbation.

To Mr. Young, the Consul of Palestine, I am much indebted for the assistance he has rendered me by his knowledge of the people, and localities of the country.

Captain Boxer speaks in the highest terms of the conduct of Lieutenant Galway, who commanded the boats of the *Pique* both days, Messrs. Morris and Heath, mates, Messrs. Hawkins, Kenley, and Bridge, midshipmen, and Mr. Partridge, volunteer, first class.

I consider it my duty to recommend to your notice Lieutenant Patey, senior Lieutenant of this ship, as well as Mr. Cockburn, the senior mate, employed on shore, for their officer-like, cool, and steady conduct; indeed, too much praise cannot be given to every Officer and man employed on this service, for

the manner in which they have conducted themselves through three days of arduous and fatiguing duty.

IN addition to my letter of this day's date, I have to inform you that the Turkish frigate detained a brig of the Pacha's, and by her I send these letters.

I have put on board her our Consulat Agents of Acre and Caiffa, with their families, and others, who by remaining here after the cannonading we have given Caiffa, would not be safe. The inhabitants are certainly favourably disposed to the Sultain; but the Emirs and Sheiks will not expose themselves without the appearances of a protecting force.

I HAVE the honour to inform you, that Her Majesty ship Castor, under my command, accompanied by the Pique, anchored here on Thursday evening last, the 24th. We succeeded in driving out the Egyptian troops, said to amount to five hundred men, that evening; the following morning we took possession of the town, which we still hold.

A further detail of my proceedings shall be forwarded by the next opportunity. I cannot, however, resist the occasion of informing you that all have nobly performed their duty.

A great quantity of grain has been found in the Government stores, as well as ammunition; part of the former, and all the latter have been brought off.

I HAVE the honour to acquaint you, that agreeably with the arrangements I had made, the Castor appeared off Jaffa on the 22d; the following day, calling again off Caiffa, from whence proceeding in the further execution of your orders of the 14th instant, Pique and Ottoman frigate Dewan in company, I beg to acquaint you that Her Majesty's two frigates took up their positions off this town about noon on the 24th instant (having ordered the Ottoman frigate to take a position in the South Bay, which the badness of the anchorage prevented her doing, and from calms and light winds she did not rejoin until yesterday), the town was summoned by an officer, bearing a flag of truce, to surrender to the

Sultain, to which the civil authorities readily consented; but as five hundred Egyptian troops still kept possession, I directed the inhabitants to be warned to quit the town immediately, as it was my intention to dislodge the soldiers, and having given them sufficient time to do so, a fire was opened by both ships, at the distance of about five hundred yards, which soon accomplished the object. At daylight the following morning, Captain Boxer, having gallantly landed and reconnoitered, to prevent surprise the marines of the two frigates, with a few small-arm men, under the command of Lieutenant Patey, Senior Lieutenant of this ship, landed and took possession of the town, which we still hold. Two guns were found mounted on the works, the trunnions of which were knocked off. Also a vast quantity of grain in the public stores, and some munitions of war. A brig has been loaded with part of the former, and the latter brought off.

The arduous duty of levelling large sand-banks, ten feet high, thrown up by the enemy, to cover the approach to the town from the fire of ships, loading grain, and in gun-boats by day and night, all in the full view of fifteen hundred of the enemy's troops, who are two miles off, will, I hope, sanction my recommending to your notice every individual officer and man of the two ships, for each one has nobly performed his part in like manner as at Caiffa.

To my gallant friend, Captain Boxer, I am deeply indebted for the assistance he has afforded me on every occasion in the execution of this service; but particularly for his vigilance each day in preventing surprise on the troops landing. He speaks in the highest terms of Lieutenant Curry, Senior Lieutenant of the Pique, who had charge of the party employed levelling the approach to the town.

It affords me much pleasure to say we have not lost a man on this service, and I am much gratified in being able to state that none of the inhabitants have been hurt.

I feel myself called upon to recommend especially to your notice Lieutenant Patey, of this ship, as an officer of great merit, who has highly distinguished himself on this service, as well as at Caiffa.

IN forwarding you the enclosed copy of a letter from Commodore Napier, I have great satisfaction in drawing their Lordships' attention to the rapidity and gallantry displayed by the Turkish troops under His Excellency Selim Pasha's personal command, and of General Jochmas, the Chief of the Staff, and Lieutenant Bradley, who were at the head of the skirmishers in this brave attack, which was crowned with complete success. Between four and five hundred, out of seven hundred of the enemy, posted on a most advantageous position, on the crest of the mountains, having been killed, wounded, and taken prisoners, and the others dispersed; most of whom

have since come over, as deserters, to the standard of the Sultan.

SIR,

IN obedience to your directions to drive the enemy from the position they had been fortifying for some days on the left of Kelbson (Dog River), I marched out of our cantonments at daylight of the 24th, with four Turkish battalions under His Excellency Selim Pacha, the second battalion of Royal Marines under Captain Fegan, and an Austrian rocket detachment under Alfiere di Vasielli Baldisiretto.

The ground on either side of Kelbson is very high and precipitous, and offers great advantages to the defending, and very considerable danger to the attacking party; to secure against this, a Turkish battalion descended unseen near the entrance of the gorge, through which Dog River runs, and gained the heights on the other side; the Marines and Austrian rocket detachment, covered by this battalion, crossed higher up, crowned the heights, and advanced on the enemy's position about two leagues off: the Turkish battalion remained in position to cover our right, in the event of Soleyman Pacha advancing from Beyrout to disturb our operations.

Three Turkish battalions, who descended into the gorge before the marines, pushed their way up the river, and advanced in a mountain path to turn the enemy's left: this being perceived they abandoned their entrenchments and occupied a new position on the heights of Ornochojquen, about a league to the right of their entrenchment.

The Turks arrived with great rapidity and gallantry. General Jochmas, the chief of the staff, accompanied by my Aide-de-Camp, Lieutenant Bradley, of the Powerful, put himself at the head of the skirmishers, and showed a noble example, which was as nobly followed by His Excellency Selim Pacha at the head of a battalion: the country people also joined and were not the last in advancing. The enemy's skirmishers were speedily driven in, and their main body, consisting of about seven hundred men, fired two volleys, and retired in great confusion, the Turks following them up with so much vigour that between four and five hundred prisoners were made, and the rest dispersed.

The enemy moving from their first position, on which the marines advanced, threw them out, and the work was done entirely by the Turks: the marines were however most anxious to try their strength, and I hope an opportunity may soon offer.

This operation opened the whole district of Kata, and the mountaineers who had been driven from their homes, flocked down in great numbers, and were immediately armed.

I have great reason to be satisfied with the conduct of His Excellency Selim Pacha, and with General Jochmas, who fearlessly exposed himself in front, accompanied by my young friend Lieutenant Bradley.

We have had a Turkish officer wounded, and two men killed.

Inclosed is a list of Turkish officers who particularly distinguished themselves, and who, I trust, will meet with some mark of favour from the Sultan.

SIR,

Considering the possession of Sidon as of great importance to the success of the Sultan's cause, by giving confidence to his faithful subjects, and very much embarrassing the measures of Ibrahim Pasha, I directed Commodore Napier to proceed thither, and after summoning the place, to make the attack. I have great satisfaction in communicating, for their Lordship's information, the most complete success of this enterprise, as detailed in the Commodore's letter herewith sent.

Our loss, as their Lordship's will perceive by the return herewith transmitted, has been comparatively small, but still much to be regretted, the only officer killed was Lieutenant Hackin, of the Royal Marines, a young man of great promise, who had only arrived in the Strombole, with a detachment of Royal Marines, in time to take part in the enterprise.

The place is still in our possession, and its capture seems to have been an unexpected blow to Ibrahim Pasha, and has much paralyzed his measures.

It is a very pleasing duty to me to call their Lordship's attention to the excellent and judicious manner in which the plan of the attack upon Sidon was laid by Commodore Napier, and the spirit and gallantry with which it was accomplished.

The ships employed upon this expedition were as follows: - Thunderer, Captain M. F. Berkeley; Guerriere, Austrian frigate, His Royal Highness Prince Frederick of Austria; Gorgan, Captain Henderson; Cyclops, Captain Austin; Wasp, Commander Mansel; Hydra, Commander Robinson; Strombole, Commander Williams; Gul Sefide, Turkish corvette.

The Commodore expresses himself much obliged to Commander Mansel for his intelligent and active services; amongst several individual acts of bravery, it appears from every account, that the most prominent one belongs to Mr. Cummings, Mate of the Cyclops.

After the Commodore left Sidon (Captain Berke-

ley has been left for its protection, with as many other vessels as can be spared, including the Guerriere Austrian frigate), much skill and judgment have been displayed in putting the place into a good state of defence against an attack by Ibrahim Pasha, who is in that neighbourhood; and Captain Berkeley mentions the ready assistance he at all times receives from His Royal Highness Prince Charles Frederick of Austria.

I embarked at sunset of the 26th instant in obedience to your directions, with a Turkish battalion under Commandant of Battalion Homchild Aga; and the first battalion of Royal Marines under Captain Morison, of the Princess Charlotte, in the two steam ships Gorgon and Cyclops, and proceeded off Sidon; at daylight Thunderer and Austrian frigate Guerriere, Gul Sifide, Turkish corvette, and Wasp joined, as also the Stromboli, from England, with 284 marines, under Captain Whylack. The wind being light, the Cyclops towed Thunderer to her position, previously fixed by Captain Berkeley; Stromboli towed up the Guerriere, and the Turkish corvette, who were placed by Captain Berkeley abreast of the town. The Wasp and Stromboli anchored more to the southward, to flank it. The Gorgon and Cyclops, and Hydra, who joined from Tyre, with Walker Bey, took up their positions both northward, close to the castle. The enclosed summons was sent to the Governor, which he refused to comply with.

The Turkish battalion was now put into the boats, and rendezvoused round the Cyclops, a few shot and shell were fired from the Gorgon at the castle and barracks, and shortly after the whole of the squadron opened their broadsides to drive the troops from the houses, and the entrenchments they had thrown up to prevent a landing: in half an hour the firing ceased, and Captain Austin landed the Turkish battalion in the castle, which is joined to the town by a narrow causeway; this was effected with some loss, as the enemy still stuck to their entrenchments, the fire of the ships was again opened, and the houses in front battered down.

Commodore Mansel, of the Wasp, was directed to seize the first favorable opportunity of throwing the detachment of marines, brought out by the Stromboli, and the Austrian marines, into the castle, abreast of him, which he did with great gallantry and judgment.

Lieutenant Hockin, of the marines, and several men, were killed and wounded; they were directed to work their way to the upper castle, which commanded the town. The 1st Battalion of marines were now landed by Captain Henderson, of the Gorgon on the beach to the northward of the town, when they formed and advanced to the walls: all being now ready, the Turkish battalion, headed by Walker Bey, and Captain Austin, pushed along the causeway, and entered the town,

I put myself at the head of the British marines, and broke into the barracks. Captain Henderson, and another party, lodged themselves in a house above the barracks; this done, I marched the battalion along the line wall to the upper gate, broke it open, and seized the castle. All seemed now quiet below, and, leaving a guard in the castle, we descended through several streets arched over, where occasional skirmishing took place with detached parties of Egyptian troops, who were easily driven, and finally took refuge in a vaulted barrack, where we found upwards of a thousand men laying ready for a sortie, should occasion offer, or to lay down their arms, should they be discovered; the latter was their fate.

I congratulate you, Sir, on the success of this enterprize, the garrison consisted of nearly three thousand men, and not one escaped: our force was under one thousand.

Our loss, which I enclose, has been trifling; one marine officer and three seaman killed, two mates, a boatswain, and thirty seamen wounded.

I have much reason to be satisfied with the conduct of the captains, officers, and men under my orders, all showed the greatest zeal; English, Austrian, and Turks, vied with each other.

Commander Mansel is an old officer, well deserving of promotion. Messrs. McGuire and Price, old mates, are both severely wounded, and behaved most gallantly, as did Mr. Cummins, mate of the Cyclops, whose conduct was seen by Captain Berkeley, who wrote him a strong letter on the occasion, and I trust their Lordships will promote them.

My Aid-de-Camp, Lieutenant Bradly, was also forward on all occasions.

The Archduke Frederick placed his ship well, and kept up an excellent fire: Walker Bey, Turkish Rear-Admiral, who was there by accident, was the first who advanced along the causeway.

My thanks are due to the Honourable Captain Berkeley, who assisted me on all occasions, as well as Captains Henderson and Austin, Commanders Robinson and Williams, and to the Captain of the Turkish corvette, to Captain Morison, who commanded the marine battalion, and to Captain Whylock, who commanded the marine detachment.

I am also much indebted to Captain Lane, of the Prussian service, who is attached to my staff.

SIR,

I TRANSMIT herewith to be laid before their Lordships, the copy of a letter which I have received from Captain Houston Stewart, of Her Majesty's ship Benbow, with the enclosures therein referred to, detailing his proceedings at Ruad and Tortosa, the attack upon which last was not attended with the results fairly anticipated on account of a reinforcement of Egyptian troops thrown in early the same morning. I lament the casualties attending it, but am gratified with Captain Stewart's representation of the gallant conduct of the captains, officers, and men engaged, most particularly Lieutenants Maitland and Charlewood, who had a prominent part in the attack.

Her Majesty's Ship Benbow, off Ruad,
26th September, 1840.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to acquaint you that the Benbow, Carysfort, and Zebra, anchored here on Sunday last, the 20th instant.

We found the island without troops or arms of any kind, but an immense population just arrived from Tripoli, Tortosa, and other parts of the coast, at present menaced with military operations.

About two hundred cavalry and two field pieces were encamped at the watering place on the main land, immediately opposite to the island, and I was informed that two squadrons (each of two hundred men, with two field pieces) were stationed about nine miles distant to the north and to the south, with orders to prevent any persons taking water, and to obstruct all communication between the inhabitants of the country and the ships. We also learned that the whole of these troops depended upon the stores in Tortosa for subsistence, and that these stores were very considerable, consisting of grain, rice, &c. The Island of Ruad is very small, and dependent on tanks and cisterns for water, which are generally quite sufficient for its ordinary population, said to amount to fifteen hundred; but, in consequence of the influx of refugees, there cannot be less than five thousand souls upon it just now, and therefore an extra supply of water became necessary; but the cavalry prevented any boats from the Island approaching the watering-place. We therefore, at daylight next morning, dislodged them, by throwing a few shot and shells, and the ships were moved nearer the watering-place, and every precaution being taken, all Her Majesty's ships were completed with water; and ever since the place (being under our guns) has been quite free to the people of Ruad to water.

My attention was now anxiously turned towards Tortosa; all information concurred in representing its great importance to the enemy's troops, and all agreed in declaring that, could we destroy the provisions, the troops must shift their quarters, and thus leave the communication with the mountains, (whose

inhabitants were most anxious for arms) comparatively open. We were also informed that the chief storehouses were situated close to the sea,—that a breach might be made in the outer wall, and immediate access obtained to them.

I therefore directed some large bags of powder, with hores and fuzes, to be prepared, and ordered the Carysfort and Zebra to anchor close off it, which they did within five hundred yards. Four successive deserters from the enemy's cavalry (each arriving on different days) stated there were *no soldiers* quartered in Tortosa; but a party was regularly sent down every night to bring away sufficient provisions for their different detachments, and the last deserter who left Tortosa, so late as the night of the 24th, stated confidently that there was not then a soldier in it,—that even had any come in after his departure, they could only be dismounted cavalry, with short carbines,—that a sort of council of war had been held to days before, when it was resolved,—that, *as they had no infantry*, cavalry alone could not protect it, and that they must get camels, &c. to remove the stores from it as speedily as possible: and he offered, if we would give him an axe, to land with a single boat's crew, and break the corn store door open; and the three other deserters likewise offered to go.

This determined me to make an attempt either to take the town, or at least to destroy the stores, and the following plan of operations was decided upon. The boats to rendezvous on board the Carysfort, and she and the Zebra to cannonade the walls, and especially a large built-up archway in the centre, until sufficiently opened for entrance. Lieutenant Charlewood being prepared with the necessary means for blowing up stores, buildings, &c., and, accompanied by Mr. Turner, gunner of this ship, with eight steady men as pioneers to land in the cutter, and be immediately followed by the portion of marines at present on board the Benbow, together with those of the Zebra; and twenty seamen of the Benbow, under Lieutenants Maitland, R.N., and Harrison, R.M., and that all the boats (after the disembarkation) under the command of Lieutenant Stevens, of the Carysfort, should lay off, prepared to cover the landing party with their guns and small arms, and to re-embark them.

The space from the margin of the sea to the breach, does not exceed sixteen yards. We could perceive only a few loopholes commanding that spot, and I concluded, that even should a fire be opened from them, the advance from the boats would be too rapid to admit of its being effective,—and that, being once within the breach, our men would easily make good their way.

Accordingly yesterday, at one, fifteen P.M. the Carysfort and Zebra commenced an admirably well-directed fire, and very soon opened the archway, and showed us a large clear space within, and the boats shoved off. The beach under the town appeared so smooth and deep, and so similar to all the other parts where we had landed, that a doubt of the heavy boats being able to reach it never presented itself until they went in, when a ledge of rocks or ancient building was found to extend itself across at some distance from the shore, with such deep water inside, that no man could land, and keep his ammunition dry, only the light boats, of which there were but two, could pass

over it. Thus the marines (in the launch barge, and two pinnaces) were unable to land; had they done so, I feel confident that we should have completely succeeded in destroying the magazines of provisions, and have driven the enemy out of the vaults, and even from the town, although not without loss, as subsequent intelligence has reached me, that two hundred infantry (from the northward) and one hundred dismounted cavalry, had entered the town *the same morning*, three hours before daylight. Lieutenant Charlewood being in the cutters with the pioneer's powder, and the three deserters as guides, landed at once, and proceeded towards the breach, and had nearly reached it before a shot was fired, but the moment the large boats touched the rocks, they became exposed to a destructive fire from every minute loop and crevice, and even from the holes which our cannon shot had just made. Lieutenant Maitland succeeded in getting about fourteen of his men with himself, landed by another turn of the same cutter, and my only reason for not instantly recalling the boats when the fire opened was, that I could not know what these officers were doing inside, and I entertained great hopes that they might be able to find out, and blow up the provision stores, and thus effect our principal object. The guides who had landed, fled back to the boats at the commencement of the firing, but they are now all on board, and free from any suspicion of treachery. Lieutenant Charlewood, proceeding with his pioneers, broke open several stores, and at length reached one filled with rice, and another with corn, when he immediately ran back to inform Lieutenant Maitland, and get more hands forward. Unfortunately, during his momentary absence, his men had hewn open another door, when, to their surprise, they found it entered upon a place filled with *infantry* soldiers, a struggle ensued. Two soldiers were killed by the three pioneers, but having nothing but axes, they were obliged to give way, but Mr. Charlewood's return checked the enemy's advance, and they never followed him.

Becoming anxious at the delay, and seeing Lieutenant Maitland still in the breach, I hastened in my gig, and hailing that officer, I learnt from him that there was no longer any prospect of success, his ammunition being expended, and much of that of the marines wet (from the attempt to get out) and I immediately ordered all to retire, and succeeded in getting every man off. Lieutenant Charlewood even bringing his exploding apparatus away.

It is now my duty to allude to a more grateful theme—the merits of the officers and men employed, where *all* did their duty, it is a difficult and somewhat delicate task to particularize, but I should be very unjust did I not bear my cordial testimony to the very gallant conduct of Lieutenants Maitland and Charlewood, the latter officer was the first man on shore, and one of the very last off, and his quiet determined resolution, was the theme of praise with every person.

I annex a list of the boats employed, with the names of the officers commanding them, together with a return of the casualties in each boat. The first cutter being a light boat was extremely serviceable, and much and constantly exposed. Mr. J. C.

Dalrymple Hay, midshipman, and his crew deserve every credit for their very spirited conduct.

The jolly boat of the Carysfort (the only other light boat) commanded by Mr. W. H. Stewart, midshipman, was also very useful; and Lieutenant Maitland speaks in favourable terms of that young officer's proceedings.

To Captain Martin and Commander James Stopford my grateful thanks are justly due; all that was done was in perfect concord with them, and from both these officers I derived the most cordial support and assistance. The precision of the fire from their ships *over the boats and men*, during the whole of the attack, was *quite astonishing*, and by rendering the aim of the enemy unsteady, must have saved many lives.

I BEG to transmit, for their Lordships' information, a letter from Captain Austin, of the Cyclops, and two from Captain Collier of the Castor, detailing their proceedings on the Coast of Tyre and Sidon, and have great pleasure in noticing the gallant conduct of the Officers and men therein mentioned.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report, that in accordance with your directions, I took on board two thousand stand of arms, and thirteen mountaineers of the villages between Beyrout and Sidon, and accompanied by Mr. Wood, I proceeded on the morning of the 20th instant, arriving off the village of Swaiffat at daybreak. We landed two of the mountaineers for the purpose of communicating; shortly after a body of infantry, consisting of from five hundred to six hundred men, were seen approaching from the direction of B  yrout, which obliged the villagers to return.

These being received on board, and the troops having been observed to take up a position in a caravanserai near the shore, the Cyclops was made to near it; after some little detour, and as soon as the object was discovered, the occupation of the building was resigned and a quick retreat commenced, when a few shot and shell obliged all to return and take cover under a bank behind the building; a restricted cannonading was opened, and the troops not showing we proceeded to the southward.

Shortly after our departure the troops were observed flying in a most irregular manner, only to be described as a flock of wild goats. When opposite to the Khann of Unis, a body of Lancers was observed too distant for shelling, but sufficiently near to prevent any communication with the villages opposite. As we proceeded along shore we drove from their position two outposts of perhaps twenty men each, anchoring at Luntel, near to the point joining the north-east part of the bay of Sidon. After dark a messenger was landed with a proclamation and letter to the Sheik of Darel Kannah, and at the break of day two others were landed for a similar purpose to the other villages. At daylight, observing a bark at anchor in Sidon, and the messenger's return not being expected until the night or next morning, I proceeded to Sidon. Having discovered the stranger to be the "Billiante" French Corvette; we examined the south-east side of Sidon, to ascertain its strength in that direction, and shortly after returned to the anchorage, requesting the French Commander to announce through his Consul, whose flag was flying, my determination to dislodge the troops from the barracks and fort, but to assure the inhabitants that their houses should not be injured.

Shortly after the troops were in full activity raising a breastwork of sandbags and baskets across a

principal street near to the beach. Two shots served to put an end to these operations and the soldiers to flight. The French boat returning, a short cannonade was opened upon the barracks and fort which had the immediate effect of dislodging the troops and drawing them into the centre of the town. This being effected the firing was discontinued, the people of the town shortly after proceeding with their occupations, but not a soldier attempting to show himself. During the afternoon three gay horsemen* left the town, but one shot put them to such flight that no others attempted it again. We now communicated with one of the vessels of the port, the master of which took on shore some proclamations with an address to the troops, he returned at dark, stating that there were one thousand one hundred soldiers in garrison at Sidon, five hundred of whom were sick in the hospital, and unable to take arms, that they were ill provided with provisions, but were much discontented with their service, that the people of the town were praying for the termination of Mehemet Ali's oppression, and were resolved to exert themselves in bringing over the Egyptian troops. He also stated that the effects of our shot had been the loss of two killed and five severely wounded, and that camels laden with provisions for the troops would leave during the night for Beyrout. It being dark the Cyclops proceeded to her former anchorage to await the arrival of the despatched messenger. At daylight a number of camels were discovered to have passed the ship, and knowing that there was an outpost with an armed guard near them, I considered there was a great risk of the whole going into the interior, if I proceeded after the first division, but I allowed the guards to cross a hill, and the last division of camels (fourteen in number) to pass beyond the outposts before closing with them, when a few shell arrested their progress and put their guards to flight. The boats under the direction of Lieutenant Grenfell, assisted by Messrs. Cumming, Butler, and Glinn, mates, landed and succeeded in bringing off, in a most expeditious and satisfactory manner, thirty-six bags of barley, with four of the camels, thinking they would be most useful in easing the labour of the troops encamped at D'journie. A letter was left with the remaining camels, to the effect that if the proprietor would drive them into the mountains, and send or repair to D'journie, he would be paid the amount of the four taken on board. On our return several mountaineers were received, two of them men of some importance, from the village of Idjee near the anchorage of Nabouis, and another being the bearer of a letter.

The result of this little effort induces me to state that two steamers, having not less than eight hundred soldiers on board, the most, if not all of them, Turks, with about four thousand stand of arms, and each steamer being accompanied by two ship's boats for the purpose of disembarking the troops, would, by taking up a position about a mile to the southward of the River Damar, be the means of safely distributing the above-mentioned quantity of arms in the course of about two days.

You will perceive that I am borne out in this belief by the statement and observations of the two or

three intelligent people I have brought with me. This service having been accomplished, and a ship of the line appearing before Sidon, this force could be made available for summoning it to surrender, I am induced to touch upon Sidon as I have every reason to believe that town to be the great receptacle and outlet for all the supplies for the enemy's forces. I should also state, that we were severally informed that the towns of Jaffa and Caiffa had surrendered to a force composed of three ships. I beg leave to crave your indulgence for the hasty manner in which this report of proceedings has been drawn up.

SIR,

SINCE the date of my letter of the 27th September, I have the honour to acquaint you the Cyclops joined on the morning of the 30th ultimo. The enemy, then about eight hundred infantry and sixty cavalry, occupying a hill in front of this town, about three miles distant, and throwing out their outposts so as to cut off all communication between the town and country. I ordered the Cyclops to take a position in the south bay, and, under her protecting fire, sent out a few countrymen who had taken up arms for the Sultan, with such a disposable force as the service would admit of from this ship and the Ottoman frigate under the command of Lieutenant Patey of this ship, and I soon had the pleasure of seeing their pickets move in, and the main body retreat behind the hill. The mountaineers behaved with great spirit, and our little force succeeded in bringing in forty prisoners and deserters of the Egyptian army. I cannot speak too highly of the officers and men employed on this service, for their steady conduct in the face of so superior a force. The roads are now open, and there is free communication between the town and country. The inhabitants are returning with confidence to their houses.

On the second occasion Commander Worth volunteered his services to conduct the party under Commander Hastings of the *Edinburgh* to the magazine, from which the rest of the powder was taken and thrown into the sea. I have great pleasure in referring their Lordships to the encomiums bestowed upon the officers concerned in these gallant achievements by Captains Henderson and Lawrence.

I HAVE the honour to acquaint you, that this morning Captain Lawrence, of the *Hastings*, sent me a message that two Turkish gunners had come off on the preceding evening, with information that a train was laid from the town to the centre castle in which were 200 barrels of powder, and they had volunteered to cut it off, that he had sent his boats, and requested assistance.

The launch and pinnace with their guns were immediately despatched with Lieutenants Clarke and Hawker, who took up an excellent position to cover the party who had landed from the *Hastings*. The ship was sprung, and a fire kept up from both ships.

I beg leave to enclose Captain Lawrence's report, and to express my admiration of the manner in which Commander Worth performed this service, he speaks highly of the conduct of all the officers and men employed on it. I regret the loss of Mr. Luscombe, of the *Hastings*, master's assistant, and two seamen wounded, and one of the Turks who volunteered and behaved very well, also a seaman of this ship wounded with a slug shot, who I hope will do well.

There are thirty-one square cases of powder covered with canvass, and three barrels, and I have to request you will be pleased to inform me how they are to be disposed of.

I HAVE the honour to inform you, that last night two gunners belonging to Beyrout came on board, and gave me the information, that one of the castles contained two hundred barrels of gunpowder, and that a train was laid from the town to it, which powder and train they had laid themselves, and volunteered, if I would give them a boat, to destroy the train, and point out where the powder was placed; I therefore judged that it was quite practicable to accomplish this under the guns of the two ships, without much risk, and sent Commander Worth and Lieutenant Charles Schomberg, with three boats, with directions to destroy the train, and bring off as much powder as they could in the boats, and throw the remainder into the water; the train was destroyed, thirty-one barrels of powder brought off, and about sixty or seventy thrown into the water, but the troops coming down in great numbers, and being sheltered in the houses, Captain Worth thought it advisable to return with the boats, and, doing so, I regret to state that Mr. Frederick Luscombe, a most promising young man, was killed, two seamen wounded, one dangerously and the other slightly, and one of the gunners was also slightly wounded, whose information was found to be perfectly correct, the conduct of Commander Worth was most gallant, who speaks in high terms of the officers and men employed on this service.

SINCE I had the honour of forwarding you the account of the affair of the boats of the *Edinburgh* and *Hastings*, on the forenoon of the 2nd instant, I beg leave to acquaint you that I was desirous to disconnect the bridge from the castle to the town, conceiving it might be of service in the event of an attack on it. In the afternoon, some guns were directed on it, but we found it so strong, that we could not effectually accomplish the object before dark, and as I was anxious to destroy the powder remaining in the castle, which I thought might be done promptly, with little or no risk, I directed Commander Hastings to take the boats of this ship and *Hastings* to effect it, and to take some one with him who knew how and where the powder was stowed.

Commander Worth handsomely offered his services. The boats pushed off under the cover of the fire of both ships, which nothing could exceed the precision of.

The entrance to the castle was effected through a hole on the east side of it, at some height, exposed to a galling fire of musketry from the walls of the eastern castle; but such was the coolness and gallantry displayed by Commanders Hastings and Worth, assisted by Mr. Campbell, boatswain of this ship, that every obstacle was overcome; unfortunately, only one person could work at a time, in

getting the powder up. A great number of cases were thrown over into the sea, but as the evening was closing in, I made the boats recal, and I think from the time they left to their return, could not have been more than forty minutes.

The boats of this ship were under the orders of Lieutenants Clarke and Ogle, assisted by Mr. Norman, mate, and Messrs. Herbert, Boys, and Owen, Midshipmen; those of the Hastings, under Lieutenant Morshhead and Messrs. Bedford, Davidson, and Chimmo, mates. Nothing could exceed the steadiness and bravery of every Officer and man in the boats, who were exposed to a heavy fire from the marine and houses, to which the enemy rushed in great numbers, probably supposing the town was to be attacked. The Commander of the Turkish cutter joined in his boat, and was very active.

In bearing testimony to the gallantry and coolness displayed by Commanders Hastings and Worth, and the Officers and men engaged in this affair, I am happy to say that there was only one slightly wounded; a marine of the Edinburgh. I have heard, from good authority, that the enemy had fifty-one killed, in the course of the day, amongst whom were six Officers; they had also a great number wounded.

SIR,

I TRANSMIT for their Lordships' information a letter from Commodore Napier, describing a very spirited and successful attack made by the Turkish troops, under his orders, upon a very strong position occupied by Ibrahim Pacha, on the mountains, near Beyrout. This march of the Commodore's was ordered by me for the purpose of attacking Soleyman Pacha's army in his position before Beyrout; in which he was to have been seconded by the marines of the squadron, embarked in the steam-vessels, to meet the Commodore, when he descended from the mountains.

I came to Beyrout, in the Princess Charlotte, to superintend the attack. On the night of my arrival the 9th instant, Beyrout was evacuated by the Egyptians, leaving their tents and twenty-six field pieces. On the same day two thousand Egyptians came in with their arms, delivering themselves up as prisoners.

It is necessary to mention that Colonel Sir Charles Smith joined me on the 9th, with the Sultan's firman, to command the Turkish troops; but as the march of the Turkish troops, under Commodore Napier, had already begun, he did not deem it expedient to interfere in its operations.

On the surrender of the town of Beyrout, and the object of the expedition being thereby attained, directions were sent to the Commodore, by Sir Charles Smith's desire, to fall back upon his original position.

The Commodore, however, finding himself unexpectedly in the presence of Ibrahim Pacha's troops,

could not fall back without risk to his own troops, and the attack took place as above described.

The Turkish troops came subsequently into the town of Beyrout, and were placed under the command of Colonel Sir Charles Smith.

SIR,

AFTER the great advantages gained by the Emir Bechir over Osman Pacha, at Marouba, it became necessary to move on Souleman Pacha defeat him, and obtain possession of Beyrout. I, in consequence, directed the Emir Bechir to join me on the heights of Ornschojouen on the 9th instant, and on the 8th, General Jochmas marched with four battalions, and was followed the day after by the Arab battalion, composed of the Turkish and Egyptian deserters.

On the 9th, two steam-boats anchored in Saint George's Bay, with a Turkish and marine battalion ready to disembark when necessary; and at nine in the morning, I arrived on the heights, and found that our piquets had been driven in by an enemy we did not expect in that quarter.

A Turkish battalion, and the mountaineers sent them back; and on reconnoitering, I found, to my surprise, between two thousand and three thousand men in a position that appeared unassailable.

No time was to be lost, as the deserters assured me they expected a reinforcement of two thousand men the next morning.

My own position was strong, being on a long narrow range of hills; my left almost inaccessible, and my right protected by a deep gorge, at the head of which, the hills on which I was posted, after a considerable descent, turned off to the right. This part of the hill the enemy occupied in force, amongst rugged and apparently inaccessible rocks. A road, considerably below the top of the mountain, wound round it; above the first position there was a second still stronger, and above that again a third.

In the course of the day I learned that the Emir Bechir had crossed Dog River, and arrived at Beskintee in the enemy's rear.

I desired him to continue his march, and I directed Omen Bey, who had been left with four battalions in our lines, to march at night with two on Argostoun, descend into the deep gorge of Dog River with great caution and secrecy, and cross over to Beckfega in the rear of the enemy, and effect a junction with the Emir Bechir; this movement was executed with great skill by Omar Bey, and about two o'clock we were delighted to hear a firing in the enemy's rear. By this time the other two Turkish battalions, who were ordered from our lines, were in sight, and another that I had passed over the gorge on our right, was rapidly advancing on the enemy's left. All being prepared to the best of my ability, I directed the armed peasantry to throw themselves among the rocks, and advance on the enemy; and two Turkish battalions and the Arab were held in readiness to march along the winding road. The

peasantry took a long circuit on the enemy's left, and advanced unseen to the heights without firing a shot. A Turkish battalion now advanced *en tirailleurs* in front, which they did with caution, but great gallantry, under a very heavy fire, and as they advanced they unexpectedly found much good cover under the rocks.

A second battalion was directed to advance along the road in columns, headed by General Jochmas but they broke into skirmishing parties. The Arab battalion was then advanced up in column, but they also broke into skirmishers, and the whole advanced with so much rapidity, that I thought it best to keep my last battalion in reserve to cover their retreat in case of disaster. This was a most anxious time, for our success depended on the steadiness of the Turks when they come in contact with the enemy on the top of the hill, but it was soon over; the moment the hill was crowned the firing ceased, and the Egyptians laid down their arms.

The reserve was now brought up, and the battalion which had crossed the Gorge was making great progress on the enemy's left. A heavy fire was kept up from the second position, and I succeeded in getting the troops to make a second attack. The example of Selim Pasha, General Jochmas, and the Turkish officers, who all behaved well, brought them up again, and in less than half an hour it became a complete rout, the enemy leaving all their baggage, ammunition, and provisions in the second position.

Night put an end to the pursuit. Ibrahim Pasha, who commanded, escaped with a few men, and the rest dispersed, leaving between six and seven hundred prisoners.

On the heights, at the end of the battle, our Arab battalion, seeing a force coming forward, took them for the enemy, and placed themselves in position under a wall, that had been thrown up to resist Omar Bey; he, on the other hand, took them for the enemy, and a sharp fire was opened on both sides. I, however, arrived in time to prevent mischief, which might have been serious.

A green Turkish standard was taken.

I have not been able to get the returns of killed and wounded, but I believe it to be under fifty; that of the enemy, from their position, must have been less.

The first effect of our forward movements, as you already know, has been the evacuation of Beyrout; the effect of our victory over Ibrahim, the entire disorganization and submission of the army of Souleman Pasha, to the amount of nearly three thousand men, and the whole of his artillery and stores.

I landed at D'Jouni on the 10th of September, with the army you did me the honor of putting under my command, consisting of fifteen hundred Turkish troops and marines, which has from time to time been reduced to half that number, and, by the 10th of October, we have made about five thousand prisoners, and nearly five thousand deserters have come over. The whole of Lebanon is nearly free; Tripoli alone remains to be taken, which I am of opinion will be an easy conquest if attacked immediately.

It is now my pleasing duty to express to you Sir, how much reason I have to be satisfied with the conduct of Selim Pasha, General Jochmas, Omar Bey, and, indeed, all the Turkish Officers,

Lieutenant Brady has accompanied me on all occasions, and has been everywhere forward, and I beg strongly to recommend him for promotion. Mr. Pearsé, the Master of the Powerful, and my old companion in arms in Portugal, joined me as a volunteer, as did Lieutenant Duncan, whom I sent to lead the mountaineers. I was also much indebted to Her Majesty's Consul General, Lieutenant Colonel Hodges, who did me the honour of serving with me in this action.

I have requested Selim Pasha to forward the names of the Turkish officers who particularly distinguished themselves, and which shall be forwarded as soon as possible.

On giving up the command of the army to Sir Charles Smith, I beg to return my thanks to you for the confidence you have placed in me, and to assure you that I have spared no pains to render all the service in my power to the cause of the Sultan.

P.S. I forgot to mention that the Emir Bechir did not come up in time, but did good service in checking the reinforcement of two thousand men that were intended to join Ibrahim.

SIR,

REFERRING to the letters which I have had occasion to transmit on the various occurrences which have taken place here since my general letter of the 20th ultimo, it gives me much satisfaction to state, that great success has attended the Sultan's arms, and those of his allies. Our position at d'Jouni being no longer necessary, the troops are quartered at Beyrout, Tyre, and Sidon, now putting in a proper state of defence. I have just heard from Captain Collier at Tsour, that the inhabitants are returning to their houses; the Governor has taken up arms for the Sultan, and his example followed by many influential people: and that the inhabitants attacked, and beat back a body of one hundred cavalry. Deserters coming in daily.

Two thousand mountaineers have received arms, and urgent applications are hourly making for more.

Five thousand prisoners have been made, and a like number of deserters have come in, and continue to do so, as the country is cleared from all interruption to their doing so.

In two divisions of five thousand each, ten thousand more troops are expected from Constantinople, and on their arrival, they can maintain their positions without the aid of the squadron, in the event of bad weather.

A very great advantage to the Sultan's cause has arisen from the defection of Emir Beschir, of the mountains, from Mehemet Ali, of whom he has been for many years apparently a firm ally. He has surrendered himself of his own accord, after a written assurance from me of his personal safety, and is now in the Cyclops, for Malta, also at his own request, putting in at Sidon, for his family and suite. I am told that his influence restrained the Druzes, who are now expected to make common cause with the other inhabitants against Mehemet Ali: but I

have just learned that Ibrahim Pacha, at the head of five thousand men, is taking his revenge on the villages, and marching to attack the Emir's palace and pillage the country.

BE pleased to acquaint their Lordships that since my letter of the 15th, No. 122, Tripoli, Tortosa, and Latakia have been evacuated by their garrisons, and are in possession of the loyal inhabitants of the country, in whose aid some Turkish troops have been ordered. The Talbot arrived here yesterday, conveying part of the reinforcement of troops from Constantinople, of whom twelve hundred have arrived, nine hundred were landed at Cyprus, awaiting an opportunity of conveyance hither, and a considerable portion more are now on their way, and I am told twenty thousand in all are to be sent.

The greater part of the sea-coast is now clear of the Egyptian troops, the mountaineers in free intercourse, and the inhabitants of the towns following up their usual occupations.

The Vanguard arrived yesterday bringing their Lordships despatches, and provisions and stores for the squadron.
