AT the Court at *Buckingham-Palace*, the 8th day of *December* 1840,

PRESENT,

The **QUEEN's** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, that the several ports therein in that behalf mentioned shall be free warehousing ports for all the purposes of the said Act; and it is thereby further enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time, to appoint any port in His Majesty's possessions in America to be a free warehousing port for all or any of the purposes of the said Act, and that every port so appointed shall be, for all the purposes expressed in such Order, a free warehousing port, under the said Act, as if appointed by the same:

And whereas Her Majesty doth deem it expedient to appoint the port of Hamilton, in Bermuda, a free warehousing port under the said Act, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained:

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities in Her Majesty by the said Act in that behalf vested, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it

is hereby ordered, that the said port of Hamilton, in Bermuda, shall be a free warehousing port for all the purposes of the said Act:

Provided always, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall exempt any goods, wares, or merchandize imported from the said port of Hamilton, into any of the British possessions in the West Indies, or on the Continent of South America, or into the Bahama Islands, from the payment of the duties now chargeable thereon in such places under the said Act:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on

petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing, that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying, that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the divisions of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs, in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the county of Denbigh, assembled at the general quarter sessions of the peace, held at Denbigh, in and for the said county, on the twentieth day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty, have presented their petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the said county is found to be insufficient, and therefore praying that Llansilin may be a polling place for the said county:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act of the seventh year of His late Majesty's reign, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that Llansilin shall be a polling place for the said county; and further, that the justices of the peace for the said county, assembled in quarter sessions or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His late Majesty's reign, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide the said county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

NAVIGATION OF THE THAMES.

CAUTION TO PILOTS AND OTHERS.

Trinity-House, London, December 8, 1840.

IT having been represented to this Corporation,
by direction of Her Majesty's Board of
Ordnance, that great inconvenience is occasioned to
the public service by the disregard shewn to the
marks which are set up on both the Kent and Essex
banks of the River Thames, in the lower part of
Galleon's Reach, for the purpose of denoting the
limits of the range of fire from the artillery practice,
in Woolwich marshes; and that, on a recent occa-
sion, the arrangements which had been made for the
trial of some newly invented shells, could not be
carried into effect without endangering the safety of
a brig and other vessels which had been anchored in
the direct line of fire, and that similar interruptions
are constantly occurring; the attention of Masters of
vessels, Pilots, and other persons navigating that
part of the River Thames, is hereby directed to the
notices which have been previously issued upon this
subject, and they are cautioned and strictly
enjoined not to stop tide, or come to anchor for
any purpose whatever, within the limits denoted
by the aforesaid beacons.
