**A**T the Court at *Buckingham-Palace*, the 5th day of *February* 1841,

PRESENT,

The *QUEEN's* Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by the late Act of Uniformity which establisheth the Liturgy, and enacts that no Form or Order of Common Prayer be openly used, other than what is prescribed or appointed to be used in and by the said Book, it is, notwithstanding, provided that, in all those Prayers, Litanies, and Collects, which do anywise relate to the King, Queen, or Royal Progeny, the names be altered and changed from time to time, and fitted to the present occasion, according to the direction of lawful authority. Her Majesty was pleased this day in Council to declare Her Royal Will and Pleasure that, in all the Prayers, Liturgies, and Collects for the Royal Family, the words, "The Prince Albert" be inserted immediately after the words "Adelaide, the Queen Dowager." And Her Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed, but with this amendment; and that in the mean time, till copies of such edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates, within this Realm, do (for the preventing of mistakes), with the pen, correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books, according to the foregoing directions; and for the better notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith

printed and published and sent to the several parishes, and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take care that obedience be paid to the same accordingly.
