

and also to assent or dissent from the said assignees applying to the Honourable Insolvent Court, by way of motion or otherwise, for the rehearing or re-examining of the said insolvent; and also to assent to or dissent from, if the said Court should think fit, for bringing up his uncle and all other parties to be examined by the proper Officer of the Court; and particularly as to the disposal of his household furniture, stock in trade, good-will, and other effects, to certain other persons, also to be named at such meeting, and there- upon to commence, prosecute, and carry on such action and actions at law as they may be advised as necessary or proper to recover such effects and property; and also to assent to or dissent from the said assignees defending any action or actions which may be brought against them in consequence of their proceeding to recover such property and effects; and also to assent to or dissent from the said assignees submitting to any arbitration or reference as they think best; and on other special affairs.
