THE following Address, of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, having been transmitted by Robert Montgomery Lord Belhaven, Her Majesty's Commissioner, to the Most Honourable the Marquess of Normanby, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to the Queen; which Address Her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, convened in this General Assembly, have received, with deep gratitude, the gracious Letter, conveying the renewed sanction of your Majesty's royal authority to the annual meeting of the General Assembly of this Church; and we trust that, through the blessing of God, our proceedings will be regulated by such wisdom as to be conducive to the spiritual interest of the Scottish people.

We humbly trust that, through the influence of Divine Grace, we may be enabled to treat the various subjects of solemn deliberation that may come before this venerable Court, with that calmness, moderation, and charity which is alike consistent with our character, and calculated to secure the respect and love of all your Majesty's subjects.

We fervently hope, that in our hands the cause of true religion will be upheld, and the spirit of Christian love and toleration cherished and diffused throughout the land.

We respectfully assure your Majesty, that it will be our constant study to inculcate on the flocks com-

mitted to our charge, those lessons of good order and obedience to the Constitution, along with those principles of piety and virtue which have been established by the Divine Author of the Christian Faith.

We unite with your Majesty in earnest prayers to Almighty God, that He may over-rule our proceedings for the good of the Church, and the prosperity and happiness now and hereafter of your Majesty's Scottish subjects.

We hail with gratitude the re-appointment of Lord Belhaven as the Representative of your Majesty's Person in this General Assembly, a Nobleman who, from his known attachment to the Church of Scotland, his prudence and courtesy, cannot fail to be acceptable to us in the execution of the important trust committed to his care.

We have received, with becoming gratitude, your Majesty's Royal Warrant for two thousand pounds for the reformation of the Highlands and Islands, and we will faithfully study to apply this liberal donation to the advancement of the sacred purposes for which it is destined.

That the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who ruleth over the kingdoms of men, may ever remember your Majesty with the favour that He beareth to his chosen, and visit you with His salvation; that He may multiply to you the comforts of this present life, and enrich you with all spiritual blessings in Christ; and that, after a long and prosperous reign over a loyal, pious, and happy people, He may exalt you to a state of ever-lasting blessedness and glory, is the earnest prayer of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most loyal, and most obedient subjects, the Ministers and Elders of this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for the assignment of a district to Saint Mark's Chapel, in the parish of Saint Mary, Whitechapel, in the county of Middlesex, under the 16th section of the 59th Geo. 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 1st day of April 1841, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each

of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or acquired under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of

salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriages shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapel shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty, in Council, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the 1st year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's commission for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Saint Mary, Whitechapel, in the county of Mid-

dlesex, and diocese of London, contained a population of 30,733 persons:

"That besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to 1500 persons, including 500 children, there is one chapel in the said parish, called Saint Mark's Chapel, recently erected, which affords accommodation to 990 persons, including 400 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

"That the said last-mentioned chapel has been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the said last-mentioned chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named "Saint Mark's District," with boundaries as follows, that is to say:

"That the said district should be bounded on the north by Great Alie-street, Little Alie-street, Goodman's-stile, and part of Church-lane; on the east by Back Church-lane, part of Castle-street and Shorter-street, the boundary line being the boundary line of the parish in Well-close-square; and on the south and west by the parishes of Saint John Wapping, Aldgate, and the Holy Trinity in the Minories, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and therein coloured blue:

"That marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized and performed in the said chapel; and that one half of the fees arising therefrom should, until the first avoidance of the said parish church of Saint Mary, Whitechapel, belong to and be received by the Minister of the said chapel; and that, from and after the first avoidance of the said parish church, the whole of the said fees should belong to and be received by the Minister of the said chapel:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of London has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony of which the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan therunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to

order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

NOTICE is hereby given, that, since the introduction into Parliament of a Bill, intituled "A Bill for maintaining and repairing, as turnpike, a certain road, commencing at or near the north west gate of the Woodside Hotel Stable-yard, in the township or chapelry of Birkenhead, and terminating at or near the Punch Bowl Public-house, in the parish of West Kirby, in the county of Chester, and for levying tolls for that purpose," an extension has been desired to be made by the promoters of the said Bill (and the same is intended to be applied for by them) of the line of road to be so maintained and repaired as turnpike as aforesaid; which extension commences at that part of the said road lying at or near to the Punch Bowl Public-house aforesaid, where the turnpike powers sought by the said Bill were intended to terminate, and passing in direct continuation through the township of Hoose, terminates at or near the cottage now occupied by Henry Berry, on the road in that part of the township of Little Meols commonly called or known as Hoylake, and being in the parish of West Kirby aforesaid.

And notice is hereby further given, that a plan and section of such proposed extension on the same scale, and containing the same particulars as the original Parliamentary plan and section deposited with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Chester, together with a book of reference thereto, has this day been deposited with the said Clerk of the Peace for the county of Chester, at his office at Chester; and a copy of the said plan and section, so far as the same relates to the parish in which such extension is proposed to be made, together with a book of reference thereto, has been also this day deposited with the parish clerk of such parish.—Dated this seventeenth day of May 1841.

back of certain premises belonging to Mr. Bell and Mr. Tassell, and partly by the public highway fronting the sea; on the south by Mortimer-street; on the east partly by premises belonging to Mr. Cobb, and partly by premises belonging to Mr. Crundell; and on the west by Beach-street, or some part thereof, for buying and selling all and all manner of fish, flesh, fowl, vegetables, roots, herbs, and other provisions of victual for mankind; also all and all manner of corn, grain, hay, and straw, and other provisions of victual for cattle; together with all goods, wares, and merchandizes, and other commodities usually bought and sold in markets, together with reasonable toll, stallage, piccage, and all other liberties, privileges, emoluments, remedies, and incidents for the full enjoyment of the said market; and if it will be to the damage or prejudice of us, or of any other, or to the hurt of the neighbouring markets or fairs, then to what damage or prejudice of us, or of any other, or to what hurt of the aforesaid markets or fairs, and of whom and how and in what manner, and that you return the inquisition thereof distinctly and plainly made, without delay, into our Chancery, under your seal and the seals of those by whom it shall be taken, together with this writ.—Witness ourself, at Westminster, the 17th day of May, in the fourth year of our reign.
